These tests will be conducted the first Tuesday of each month to check the operation of sirens, to make sure that they will actually work in the event they are really needed in an emergency. You must remember that there

two different and distinct siren signals: one a steady sound 3 to 5 minuets is your alert signal. When you hear this alert signal, tune in on radio or television for information and instructions.

Siren signal number two (sounded only in case of enemy attack or nuclear disaster) is a wailing of 3 to 5 minutes on all sound sirens. When you hear this take cover signal, go immediately to the best available shelter. Stay put until emergency is over.
