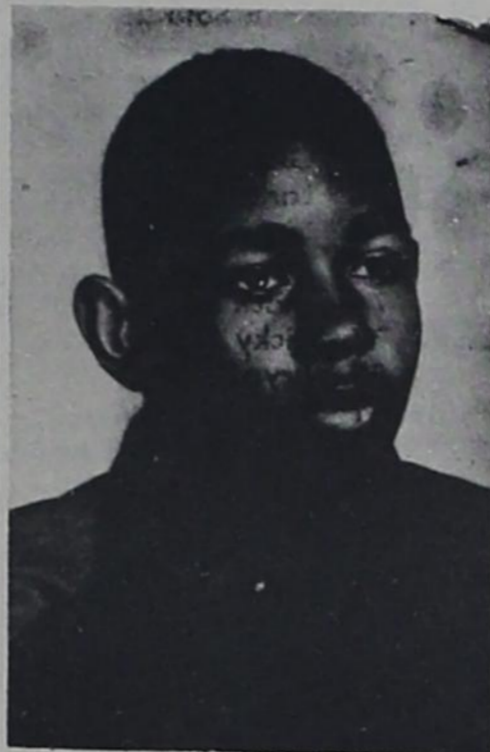
Two more leaders of Dunbar High School are Linda Lusk and Bobby Vernol Thomas.

Sirens Tested Here

The Lubbock Civil Defense sounded their regular siren tests Tuesday morning at 10 a.m.

These tests consisted of three to five minute steady blast of the sirens.

These tests will be conducted the first Tuesday of each month to check the operation of sirens, to make sure that they will actually work in the event they are really needed in an emergency.

You must remember that there are two different and distinct siren signals: one a steady sound 3 to 5 minutes is your alert signal. When you hear this alert signal, tune in on radio or television for information and instructions.

Siren signal number two (sounded only in case of enemy attack or nuclear disaster) is a wailing sound of 3 to 5 minutes on all sirens. When you hear this take cover signal, go immediately to the best available shelter. Stay put until emergency is over.

You don't have to be a parent of Panther, but you must be willing to work for the Panthers.

The club meets each Monday night at Dunbar High School at 8 p.m. If you are willing to become a member, then please be present Monday--our next date.

NEW HOUSING PROJECT

Washington---(NPI)---Something comparatively new in housing projects--a mixture of low, middle and upper income families --is being planned in the nation's capital.

President Johnson ordered the General Service Administration and the District of Columbia government to build a new community for 25,000 residents from all income groups on a 335-acre tract of surplus federal land in north-east Washington.

In the development, 1,500 units would be for the poor, 200 for middle-income people, and 800, for the well-to-do.

The government is also considering the possibility of constructing similar developments on other federal land,

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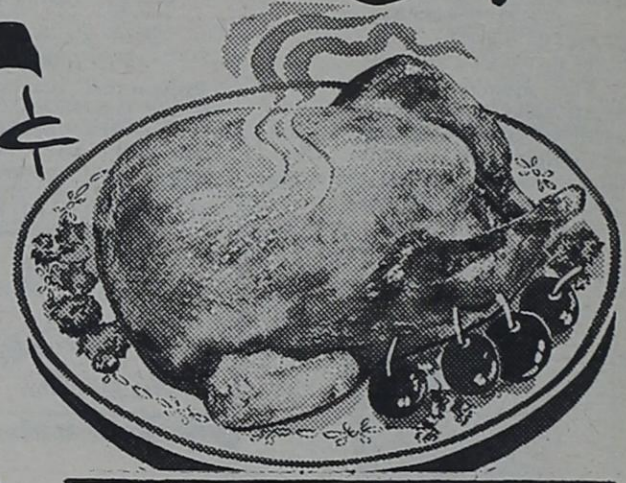
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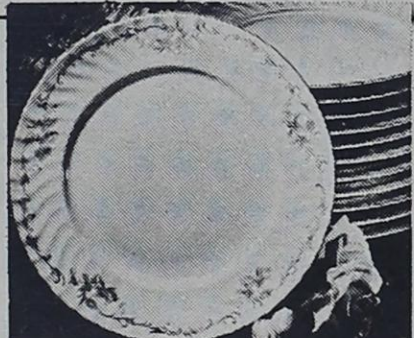

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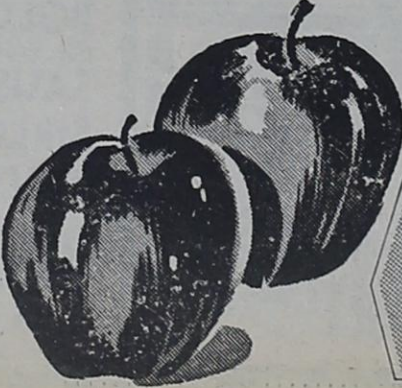
