## Lubbock Man Assessed Heavy Penalty

A Lubbock man, Robert Turner of 607 Avenue D, was assessed the maximum sentence prescribed by law Monday afternoon in County Court Law 2 after he pleaded guilty to an aggravated assault charge.

The 30-year old Turner was sentenced to serve two years in county jail and assessed a fine of \$1,000 by Judge Pat Moore.

Turner was accused of breaking into a house in the 200-block of East 36th Street last September 11, and dragging a 15 year old girl out of the house while she and her 13 year old brother fought with him.

The girl's screams were heard by a Lubbock policeman who had been called to the house to investigate an attempted breakin report.

The scream frightened the attacker away, but Turner was later identified in a police line-up as the man who had broken into the house and attacked the girl.

Both children told police that the man had been by the house earlier in the day and had tried to get inside on the pretext of selling them a newspaper subscription and wanting to buy a table. The children, who were alone in the house, did not let him inside the house at that time. The breakin occurred about 1 a.m.

### WHAT A DIFFERENCE YEARS MAKE

The men of the famous 9th and 10th Cavalry regiments held a 100th anniversary reunion last Thursday in Fort Leavenworth. Thier meeting recalls the glorious war records made by these Cavalrymen and the 24th and 25th Infantry regiments which in yesteryear were the only Negro outfits in Uncle Sam's segregated Army.

Though in separate units, the 9th and 10th and the 24th and 25th fought valiantly for their country. Their victories and decorations were many.

With the end of World War II and the integration of the integration of the Army, the famous units were broken up. Most of the men who fought in the four Negro units have now reached retirement age. Hundreds of them assembled at Fort Leavenworth last week with their families to renew friendships and to recall the exploits that they had enjoyed together.

The reunion occurred during the same week that Whitney Young, executive director of the National Urban League, returned home from a trip to Vietnam where black Americans and white Americans are fighting side by side in the strange guerilla war.

In the days of the segregated Army, Negro soldiers seldom reached the front lines. Constant complaints during World War II by the Negro press helped bring about a change and the Korean and Vietnam wars have seen Negro military men taking their places in every phase of the war.

Young pointed out on his return from Vietnam that he found the morale of Negro soldiers extremely high as compared to other wars such as World War I and World War II. He said that he found great improvement in the Negro's situation although there is still room for the promotion of more Negroes to officer rank.

The military forces now are almost completely integrated—a far cry from the days when the 9th and 10th were headquartered at Fort Riley, Kas.

The years have brought about many changes in all phases of American life. The Armed Forces stand out for their complete about-face from complete segregation 20 years ago to full integration today. We continue to move forward.

### FORMER RIGHTS CHIEF ON WAY TO RED CHINA AFTER FLEEING U. S.

Moscow--(NPI)--A former NAACP official was on his way to Red China after fleeing the United States, where he was charged in the kidnaping of two whites during a North Carolina race riot in 1961.

Robert F. Williams, a Monroe, N.C., said he intends to return home when his case is cleared up.

Williams, a Negro, said he was erroneously charged in the kidnaping. He lived in Cuba for four years before leaving for Red China.

contributions of Negro Cavalry regiments organized in Fort Leavenworth in July 1966.

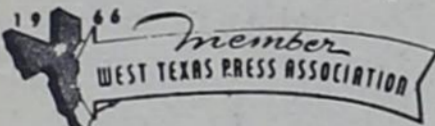

Last week, Hanley represented the firm at the National Funeral Directors convention in Houston, Texas.

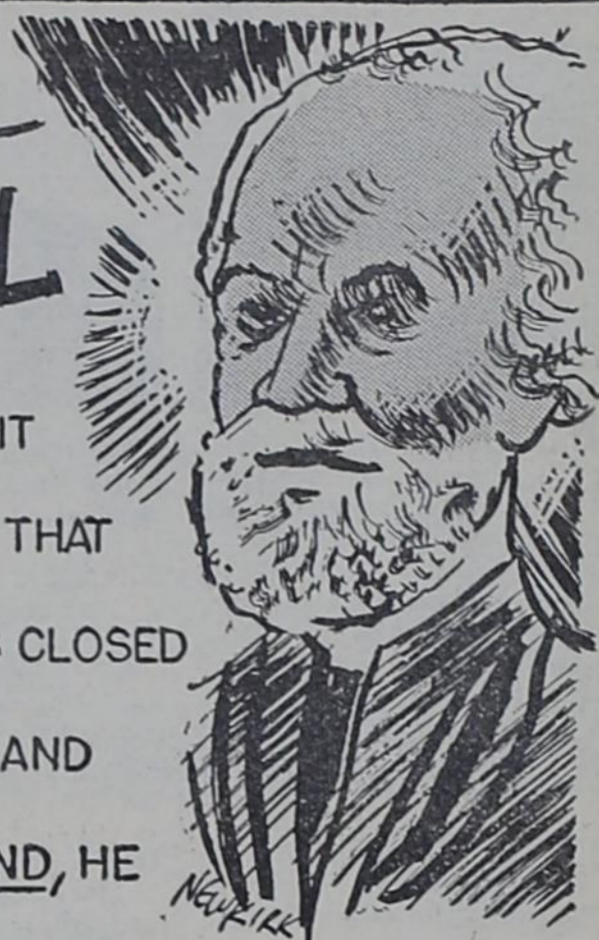
Hanley has a rich background to draw from, having serviced the Negro market for funeral directors in 14 states in the midwest and southeast since April, 1961.

**MOUTH WASHES**

Authorities are pretty well agreed that although mouth washes do no harm, they are greatly overrated. Granted they would be well worth what they cost if they did all the things the promoters claim they do, but the simple truth is that they don't.

For example, it is true that millions of germs inhabit the mouth but these are harmless varieties and their mere presence in such great numbers discourage some disease germs in the same way that a yard full of dandelions leaves less space for grass.

It is also true that such antiseptics as iodine, cholrine and phenol can kill the germs--disease germs and harmless germs alike--in the mouth, but it is equally true that there are always survivors and these survivors can replace their killed brothers in a surprisingly short time.

The saddest truth in this matter is that if one has a sore throat, a gargle or mouth wash do nothing or relieve it. This is because the causative germs are not on the in-

flamed surface but are too deep in the tissues and, although this will not cure, any benefit felt is due entirely to the heat.

If a gargle that would reach the deeply imbedded germs were available, it could not be used because it would damage the normal tissues of the throat. Therefore, for a sore throat don't reach for the gargle--reach for the phone and call the doctor.

Authorities in this field have little faith in the ability of any mouth wash to prevent or cure halitosis. Halitosis may be due to a variety of causes.

One of the chief causes is the decaying of food particles between the teeth. To remove such particles, a mouth wash is no better than rinsing the mouth with plain water, but proper brushing of the teeth is much more effective.

If, on the other hand, halitosis is caused by some disease of the mouth or other parts of the body, the only effective treatment is to remove the cause.

If one has developed a great liking for the flavor of his or her favorite mouth wash, it should be used solely as a luxury and not in

the belief that it will prevent or cure any ills.

Beginning in September, an interesting new program will offer teachers with three or more years' experience, an opportunity to earn a Master of Education degree in Inner City Studies. Interested teachers will be guided in research work on the life needs of selected minority groups, educationally, socially, and economically.

Specifically, the course work will be focused on problems of disadvantaged cultures: Negroes, American Indians, Mexican Americans, and Puerto Ricans. Of tantamount importance will be the exploration of the history, culture, language problems and problems of emotional and physical health.

Outstanding lectures in the field of disadvantaged groups will provide additional insights into the problems of the selected minority groups, and suggest possible solutions.

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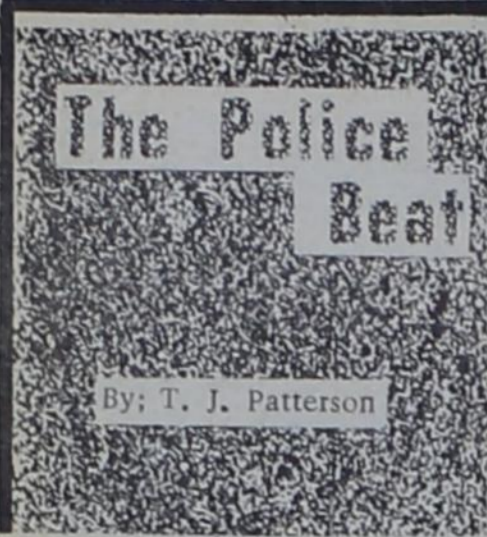
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**NEEDED POLICE BADLY**

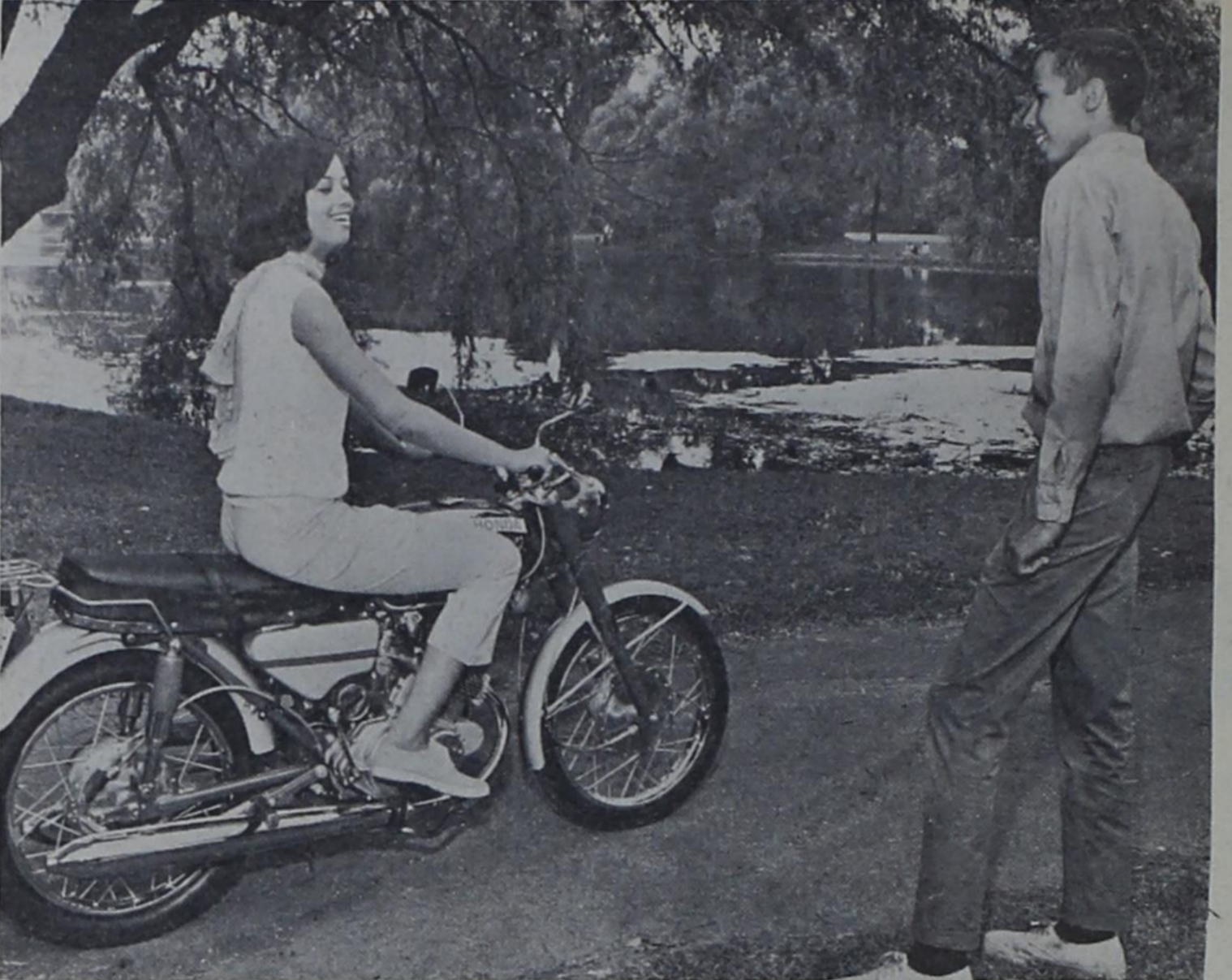

**Gets Grant for "Snoring" Research**

Tallahassee, Florida--(NPI)--Dr. Marcus H. Boulware, professor of speech pathology, Florida A and M university, has been awarded a grant from the Carnegie Grant committee to conduct research on the problem of stertorous breathing, according to Dr. George W. Gore, Jr., university president.

Dr. Boulware has been engaged in serious research on the subject of snoring for the past 18 months. He has been using himself as a research subject and has developed experimental techniques for the control of snoring problems.

The grant will enable Dr.

Boulware to compile data for a forthcoming book, gather information on 300 anti-snoring gadgets, and retain the services of foreign language translation services to translate articles on snoring written in German, French, Japanese, and Polish.

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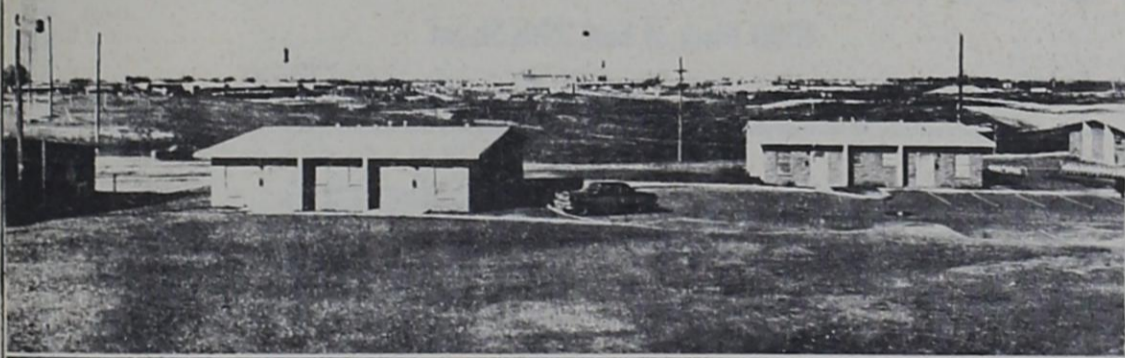
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## YOUNG MARRIED COUPLE ENJOYS LIVING IN CRESTHAVEN

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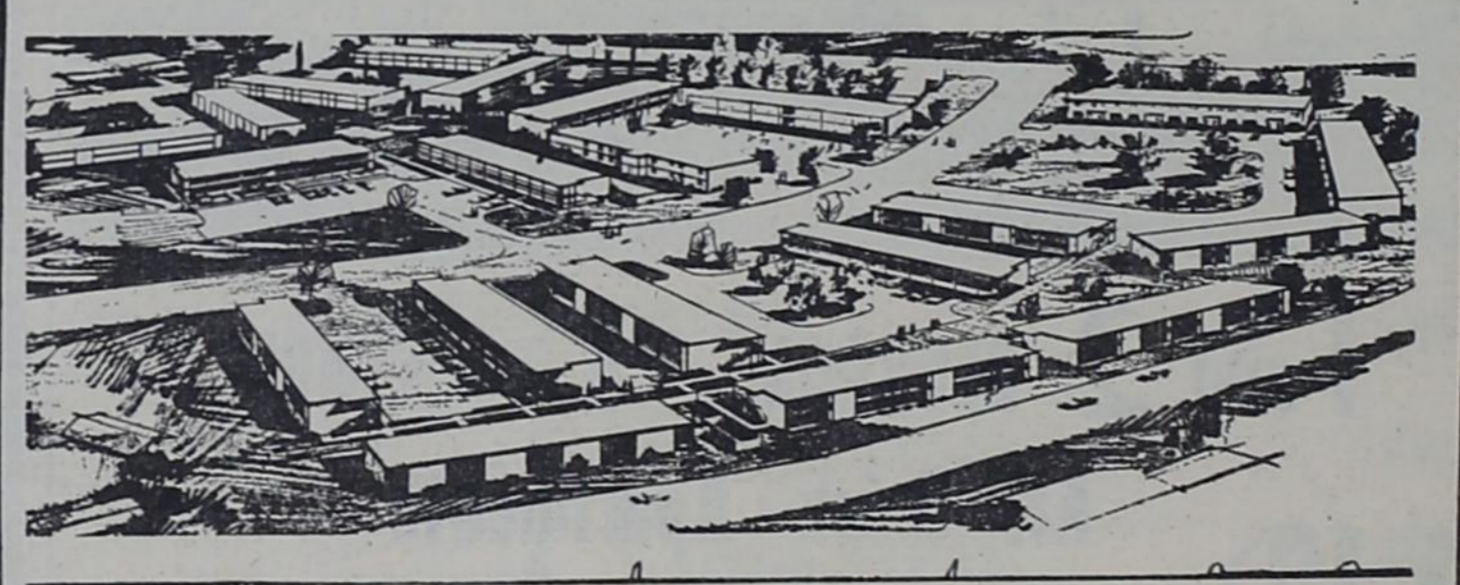

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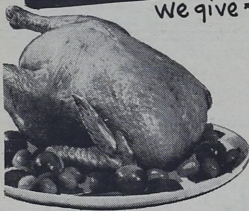
