
Bryant Rites Read Ex Panther Wiley Wildcat

A fifteen year old Lubbock girl died in a one car turnover on East 19th last Sunday night, and a 51 year old man was killed by a car on a county road east of town the same date bringing the total of traffic deaths to a hard striking 76 for the South Plains area.

The teen-ager, Patsy Sue Evans, 2406 Cedar Avenue, was d e a d on arrival at Methodist Hospital shortly before 8:45 p.m. last Sunday from injuries recieved from the car in which she was a passenger overturned and hit a light pole about 250 feet west of Oak Street on East 19th.

Two other teen-agers, Lawre-nce B. Garner, 18, 1714 Walnut Avenue, the driver of the car, and Cora Houston, 16, 504 Webber, suffered minor injuries in the crash and were taken to Methodsit Hospital for treatment and later released.

According to officers, the car was going east on 19th Street when it skidded out of control on gravel. went off the street, overturned and smashed, top first, into a city light pole. Evans-who was riding on the right side of the front seatwas fatally injuried.

The death was the 20th traffic fatality in Lubbock this year, and t h e 76th to occur on the South Plains compared to 65 at this same period last year.

Willie Newton, 51, 114 Nutmeg, was the 75th death on the Plains when he was pronounced dead at the scene of an accident nearly one and one half miles east of Lubbock on a county road.

According to a highway patrolman, Newton was struck by a car driven by Lucius Porter, 38, 2610 Webber Drive, as he attempted to avoid an accident with another


It was learned that the car driven by W.A. Adams, 608 Avenue A, had become stuck in a ditch and that Newton had stopped to help him. Porter--who was traveling north on the paved road--saw Newton's car parked on the east side of the road and attempted to avoid a collision by taking the ditch between the two vehicles.

Newton, who had gotten out of the pick-up and was standing between the vehicles, was hit by the swerving car.

Porter continued on down the ditch after hitting Newton and collied with a telephone pole and overturned.

Newton's body was taken to the South Plains Funeral Home, where funeral services were pending at press time .



Teenagers - The Way They Are

"If youth but knew; and if old age could." Adolescence is the swinging bridge over which the child must pass as he crosses the yawning chasm between childhood and adulthood. G. Stanley Hall, the first psychologist to study the adolescent period of life seriously has stated that, "The adolescent might be said to be still in the nest, vainly attempting to fly while his wings have only pinfeathers." This sounds suspiciously like the plaintive lament of old age over carefree days of bygone youth when life was unmarred by the realities of living.

How many of you parents really know your teenager? Does he or she seem baffling at times? Does he or she do things that are hard for you to understand? Is your teenager quite grown-up at times, and at others just a child? Does what the 'other kids do' seem to matter more than anything you can say? Do you seem to be vetoed? Can you fathom your teenager's moods? Do you always agree on everything or even a few things? Now really isn't your teenager a really fine person? Come on now, be honest. Isn't he or she someone you are quite proud of most of the time? Isn't he or she full of promise, potentials, a real challenge to you? Wouldn't you like to be a bit closer? Do you yearn for more communication - getting through to each other? Well parents, the key to all this is understanding, and until this comes you'll continue to wonder and have a gap between you.

All teenagers are alike in that they must grow up and become mature men and women. The second decade of life is long, and there stands before the child a bridge. He enters this period as a child, he leaves at the end of the second decade of his life as a young adult.

All teenagers are preoccupied with their own personal crossing into maturity. No one else can do their growing up for them.

All teenagers are faced with a number of interrelated tasks of growing up, and in brief these developmental tasks are:

Coming to terms with a changing body,
 Making new friends in new treath

Making new friends in new ways-with both sexes,

Stretching away from childish dependence upon parents,

Finding out what he or she can do, and training to do it, and Answering life's biggest questions-Who am I? and What is

These jobs of growing up are relatively easy for some, and very hard for others. It is normal for teenagers to struggle with their development tasks over quite a period of time. How successful the struggle to grow up is, depends in part on how understanding and helpful his parents, teachers, and leaders are, when he most needs them.

Teenagers are persons confronted with problems and needs, confusions, and frustrations, much as adults are. Some of these are;

- (1) A time of emotions—feelings seem to constitute the essence of their existence. Superlatives dominate their vocabulary. Everybody is a 'doll', 'chick', 'drip,' 'droop', square', an 'odd ball', 'shell-shocked', a 'real guy', a 'regular guy', etc.. For them life is either romantic or dull and unbearable. They are thrilled or on cloud nine or else in the basement. They are first a child, then an adult, close and then far away. Parents need to understand, to feel with him-his fears, his loves, his hates, his discouragements, his humiliations and his dreams.
- (2) A time of paradoxes-There are extermes of love and hate; generosity and selfishness; pleasure and annoyance; loyality and jealousy; thoughtfulness and forgetfulness. He is first up and then down.
- (3) An age of problems—Can you actually agree on so many of his problems? There are such things as the use of the car, the telephone, the TV, or money. Then the responsibilities around the house. His or her clothes become a subject of conflict and problems as to cost, style, and actual need. Of course there is the real problem of associates, dates, and the future course of life.
- (4) This is the age of great needs—These needs are varied and many. Teenagers need limitations, confidence and trust, guidance, communication, understanding, and above all else, they need their parents. This may not seem so obvious to many teenagers, after all, they are in the process of weaning and asserting their own indepen-

Teenagers need adults. They need parents, teachers, ministers, doctors, counselors, and other leaders outside the family. Not as much as they did when they were children, but in a special way now. They need worthy aduuts whom they can respect and follow. A boy needs fine examples of men who make him stretch upward in his dreams of self-realization. A girl needs women who bring the response, "when I grow up, I want to be like her." Both sexes need to identify with adult members of their own sex who are good examples of fine living. Teenagers need to learn to live in an ever widening community. For this reason, both parents and teenagers must learn to expand their

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
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HOUSE BURGLARY

OPEN SEASON

London -- NPI -- The recent assassination of Prime Minister H. F. Verwoerd seemed to have triggered another stabbing incident last week, when South African counsular official Johannes van der Poel, 55, was stabbed in the chest at the South African em-

The attacker, who made good his escape, was said to have inquired about a passport. He was described as being "colored" or "olive-skinned", bearded and about 25 years old.

IMPEACHMENT

Jakarta -- NPI -- A move is underway by a powerful group of Indonesian intellectuals to have President Sukarno impeached on charges that he betrayed the nation. Simultaneously, militant students in West Java have issued a demand that Sukarno's second wife, Hartini, be arrested and tried for financing Communist activities.

CAPITAL SHIFT

Blantyre, Malawi--NPI--The Malawi government has launched upon a \$30 million project to transfer the nation's capital from Zomba, in the south, 130 miles to Lilongwe, in the northwest. Buildings for two ministries—national resources and works-have already undergone construction at the new site.

Dallas -- The National Baptist Convention, USA, Inc., headed by Dr. J. H. Jackson, Chicago pastor and widely known Negro leader, last week condemned the term "black power" as a civil rights weapon, and called upon all Americans to seek redress for grievances "through the courts of the land."

The 5 1/2 million member organization, largest Negro group in America, adopted a resolution at its 86th annual session in Dallas, Texas, renewing its support of the supreme law, that is, the Federal Constitution.

Washington -- NPI -- Sen. Edward M. Kennedy(D.-Mass.) has come under the fire of the National Urban League for his proposal that the United States allow more workers come here from abroad.

"It is uneconomical and immorial to keep Negro and other minority workers unemployed or pushing brooms while making a strong recruitment effort 5,000 miles away," Adolph Holmes, League associate director of economic development, asserted in a letter to Sen. Kennedy.

In his letter, Holmes said, "We are seriously concerned with your proposal... which will ease the Immigration and Nationality Act and make it possible for persons from abroad to come into the country for jobs such as parking lot attendants, clerks, wiaters, sales clerks, typists, truck drivers, housekeepers, and launderers.."

"We can't understand why those companies are willing to spend

the money and the effort to bring a man 5,000 miles to this country for a job, while there is a source of willing labor right in their own back yard.

"The labor market may be a tight one for white workers, but Negro unemployment is still around the 8 per cent mark and shows no sign of declining.

"The money and energies used to attract foreign workers should go into training programs for unemployed and under-employed Negro workers," Holmes said.

In complaining about foreign workers being given job preference over Negroes, Holmes was echoing a charge which has long been made by Negro leaders. As far back as 1895, Booker T. Washington had called on Southern businessmen to "cast down your bucket where you are"-that is, use available Negro manpower in preference to workers from else-
