REGISTRATION FOR BASKETBALL FEATURED AT BOYS' CLUBS

Registration for basketball opened Tuesday at each of the three Lubbock Boy's Clubs.

During the three day registration, Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday, clinics are being held at each club. Boys will receive instruction in fundamentals, shooting, dribbling, passing, screening, pivoting, and others.

Theodore R. Phea, Jr., Unit Director at the South Plains Lions Branch, 1801 East 24th Street, will have as his assistants: L. V. Moore and Horace Johnson. Each of these young people have played competitive basketball and have had experiences with the Boy's Clubs.

A near record of 504 boys participated in the 1965 program. There were three leagues of 46 teams participating in regularly scheduled games during last year. Plans have been made to accommodate even more boys this year.

After the registration and three day clinics, which will end today, the teams will be organized and regular league play will begin. Each team will play approximately two games each week. A delicious menu was served after all of the business of the meeting was discussed. The tasty meal which was topped off with a special dessert was enjoyed by all.

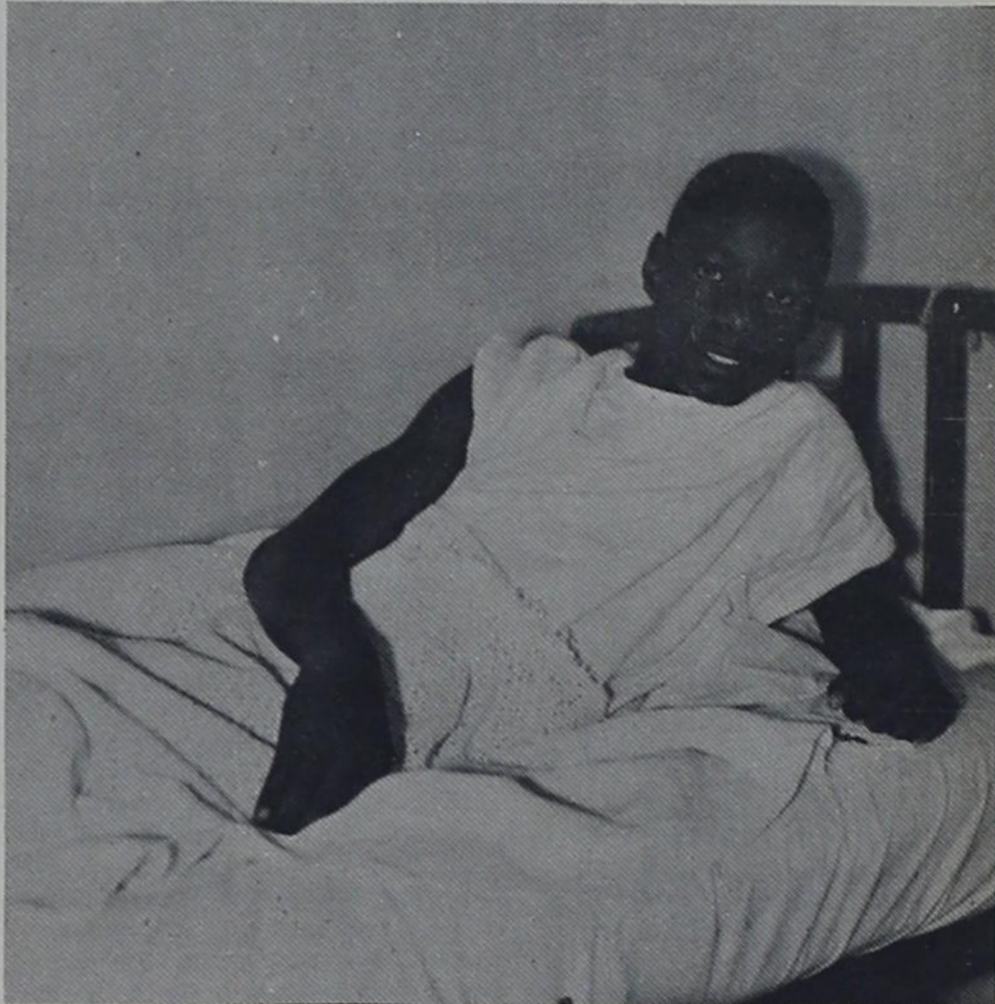
One of the main items on the list for discussion was the discussion of drawing names for their annual Christmas program. Each member did draw names in this regard.

Parliamentary Classes Here Tonight

Classes in elementary parliamentary procedure will begin at 7:30 p.m. tonight, Thursday, at Garden and Arts Center, 4215 College Avenue, sponsored by the Caprock Unit, National Association of Parliamentarians.

Dr. Charles C. Rahm, Lubbock, registered parliamentarian, will be instructor.

Speaking at Bishop College on November 4, addressing the social science class, will be Mr. Howard E. Haugurud, the number two man in one of the most important, if unpublicized, agencies of the U. S. Government. He is Deputy Inspector-General of Foreign Assistance. This agency, one of the smallest in the government, nevertheless is credited with saving American taxpayers hundreds of millions of dollars through discovering and correcting mistakes, and in countless other ways.

Mr. Haugurud will address his remarks basically to the social science students, according to Dr. Melvin Banks, who is Chairman of that Division, but his talk will be of general interest and all students are invited to attend.

The government official is scheduled for several other speeches in Dallas during his stay here. After his talk at Bishop, he is slated to address the downtown Lions Club, where he will be introduced by James Bond, Regional Director of the U. S. Department of Health, Education and Welfare. Mr. Bond will also host a dinner in Mr. Haugurud's honor at the Lancer's Club.

The Inspector-General will be in Dallas as the guest of Dr. and Mrs. Fred M. Lange. Dr. Lange,

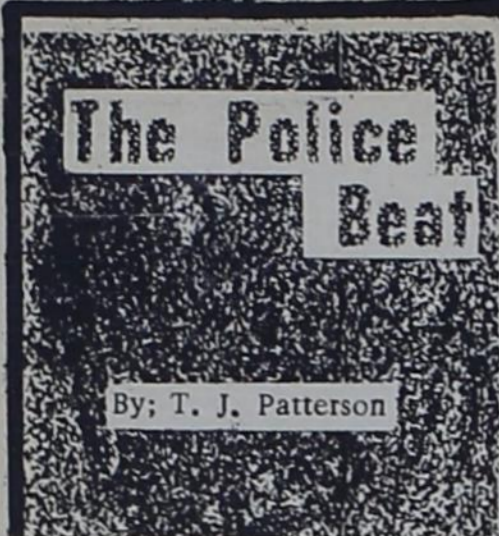
Wallace scored the only tally in the second quarter on a 25-yard run to pay dirt. This gave the Dunbar squad a 19-0 edge at half time.

She is the daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Tommie Lethridge.

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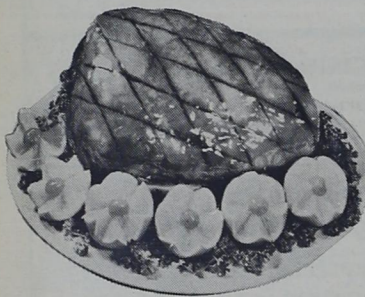
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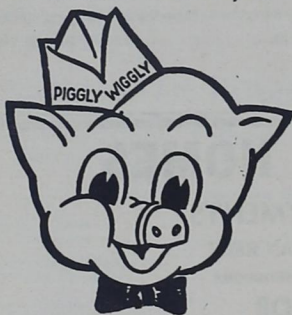
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
