Dallas-With Homecoming Week at Bishop College in Dallas starting on Monday, November 11, candidates for the title of "Homecoming Queen" are already busily campaigning for the coveted honor. Each class has selected its own candidate. They are: Miss Evelyn Boulard, representing the Freshman class, from China, Texas; Miss Brenda Sessley, representing the Sophomore class, from Columbus, Ohio; Miss Johnetta Johnson, representing the Junior class, from Fort Worth, Texas; Miss Mary Mason, representing the Senior class, from Daingerfield, Texas.

Dr. Vernon McDaniel, Director of Development at Bishop, who is chairman of the homecoming committee, said that every indication is that the 1968 homecoming will be one of the most exciting in Bishop history. He said that it is hoped that about 5,000 people will attend the various events, which will include dedication of a major building on the Bishop campus which is to be named "The Joseph J. Rhoads Educational Building" in honor of the late Dr. Rhoads, who served as Bishop's first Negro president from 1929 almost until the time of his death in 1951. The building has hitherto been known as "The Administration Building" or "The All-Purpose Building".

The homecoming football game, too, will be a matter of great interest. Playing the strong team from Jackson State College, from Jackson, Mississippi, the Bishop "Tigers" will place their record (at this writing) of six wins against no losses on the line.

The Air Force band and choral group, "The Singing Sergeants," fresh from a successful world tour, will provide the music.

Representatives from six foreign nations—Great Britain, Belgium, France, Italy, Israel and Mexico—will join in a symbolic torch ceremony during the program.
