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

Preston Smith: Images of Another Race

The walls of former Gov. Preston Smith's office are lined with newspaper cartoons from highwater marks in his political career. The newspaper cartoonists send the etchings to court the favor of the powerful and even those mildly critical are displayed with pride. Most commemorate the trials of seeking elective office.

One cartoon shows Smith in cowboy attire, lariat at his side, speculatively eyeing a wild horse on a distant mesa. "Now if I can just sneak up on him—easy-like," the governor's caption reads.

Preston Smith is not sure he

wants to try and sneak up again. As he sits at his desk, cartoons to his left, flags at his back, he fidgets, resting his cheek on a Texas Tech ringed-hand as he looks to the right, toward windows that aren't at eye level.

They say he might run for governor again. That he could, like a number of the cartoons on the wall depict, toss his businessman's Stetson into the ring again, against Atty. Gen. John Hill and Gov. Dolph Briscoe, by then a six-year resident of the Governor's mansion.

"We have never ruled out the possibility," Smith says, "We're getting a lot of encouragement. The only reason I would seek the

office is that I believe I could do a great deal better job in a leadership position."

"I don't mean that as personal criticism of governor Briscoe," Smith adds as he scores Briscoe's staff for a lack of leadership. "In order to really resolve the problems, a governor must select outstanding administrative assistants."

This Smith feels, Briscoe has not done. If rulings adverse to the state were handed down from the federal government during his tenure, Smith remembers that his aides would be "on the next plane to Washington."

"A good staff makes a good executive," he said, "if you're a

coach, good assistant coaches make you a good coach."

The words are right, those initial verbal salvos politicians unleash, to prepare for the barrages to come. But there is a hollowness. Not insincerity—just a feeling that the saber has been rattled before, and that it is rattled now because it is expected, because, in a sense, the cartoons demand it of him.

There is little of the passion for the race you find in most hopefuls. Little of the thirsty drive to power. Perhaps because the thirst was quenched years ago ... perhaps because it was the wrong day to ask.

I never consider myself

retired," the former governor says, "if you're active, you're never in a position to retire. There will always be some unfinished business."

He recalls two programs—Texas Communities Tomorrow and the Texas Film Commission—begun during his tenure. There is a tinge of regret that he didn't see them through.

Another cartoon shows Smith and his 1968 run-off opponent trying to nudge a slow-eyed cow labelled "voter apathy" to its feet.

Running a campaign for governor, Smith says, "is not one of the simplest tasks one can undertake." He acknowledges

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Abortion in Lubbock Local Clinic Offers Pregnancy Termination

In Lubbock each week approximately 40 women seek legal abortions. If they don't have money, or are in the later stages of pregnancy their search will most likely end where it began. But, if they have money, their search may end at Planned Family Clinic, a privately owned facility in southwest Lubbock.

Thursdays through Saturdays the clinic waiting room is filled with women of all ages, all economic levels, all educational backgrounds. Twelve-year-old girls, housewives, career women, college students sit side by side in the antiseptically clean surroundings.

The abortion rate usually goes up prior to Christmas and summer vacations, when many college students decide on abortion before returning home, but many of the women come from neighboring towns, some as far as Abilene and Hobbs, New Mexico. Along with the doubts, fears and questions these women

often bring with them to the clinic, they bring one thing more—\$175 in cash.

"There's no problem at all getting an abortion in Lubbock if you have the money," explained clinic director Susan Olbekson. Abortions performed during the first trimester cost \$175 and include a pregnancy test free (if abortion is not chosen) counseling session, abortion, antibiotics, and post-operative exams. If a woman waits until 11 to 14 weeks after her last menstrual period, an abortion costs \$375.

Some women who come to the

clinic know they want an abortion before they walk in the door. For them the procedure is a brief one, involving preparation for the abortion, the 10 minute abortion and a one and a half hour recovery period.

But for those women who come to the clinic with doubts about abortion, the decision making process can be dangerously slow. It begins with counseling sessions guided by a trained counselor. During counseling sessions, alternatives are discussed, feelings are clarified and questions are answered. The abortion procedure is explained in detail while the counselor remains entirely non-judgemental in discussing the problem pregnancy.

Fear is the most common emotion expressed, not only of the abortion itself but of the aftermath, noted Olbekson. "Abortion is one decision the woman has a right to make for

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West Says He'll Draw Line at Arts Tax Hike

Mayor Pro Tem Dirk West favors more attention to crime control and Lubbock's depleting water supply before the city spends tax money to promote the arts.

Under the Labor Bill, passed by the Legislature during regular session, a city may collect up to four per cent room occupancy tax, and part of that money may be spent on the promotion of the arts.

Previously in Lubbock the money has been used for civic promotion, and helps to pay off the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

The City Council may decide to raise the room occupancy tax at its next meeting, and Councilman Alan Henry has said he will try to earmark some of the funds for arts promotion if the tax is raised.

West said Lubbock had "plenty of taxes right now" and he was "negative as hell" about raising the room occupancy tax without

further discussion among the council members.

While some argue in favor of the arts as a profitable industry (Councilman Henry has said for every \$1 spent on the arts by the city, another \$2 is spent on gas, clothing and restaurants) West argues that Lubbock will grow as a matter of course, because of migration to the Sun Belt from the north.

"With those Yankees freezing in the dark and looting, they're going to be taking a good long look down here."

Works of Art

Oh, I know what you're going to say. You're going to say that "Art" is weird paintings and bearded intellectuals and skinny women jumping around in tights and fat women watching them. You'll say "Art" is fancy dress, tight collar, sit-in-your-chair-for-hours-'til-you-wonder-if-you're-gonna-leave-something-behind dull.

You can say that. But you're wrong. Sure, some art can be that way. But it doesn't have to be. When your kid gets up and goes through three acts without flubbing a line, to your immense relief, that's art. When you read a newspaper story that makes you laugh or cry, that's art. When you look at a photograph or a TV show that says something to you, that talks to you about your life, so you never forget it—that's art.

Somewhere along the line, maybe when they tried to make "Art" the exclusive province of the very rich, the word got a bad rap. The Lubbock City Council could change a lot of that by broadening the financial base for Lubbock arts with an increase in the hotel/motel tax. Under legislation passed in Austin this year, the city can devote the slight increase to "the encouragement and promotion of the arts."

Oddly enough, the early opposition to such a move comes from an artist—City Councilman Dirk West. West argues that with all the problems a fledging urban area like Lubbock faces, the city can't afford to piddle away its money on luxuries like the arts.

Now, now. First off, that begs the question. Under the law, the hotel/motel tax can be used for a limited number of things. The receipts can't go to rid the streets of crime or rid the golf courses of prairie dogs. They can be used for civic promotion or civic centers or the arts.

But even if the money could be used for those things, let's turn the argument around for a moment and grant that

Lubbock is becoming an urban area with all sorts of urban problems (which it is). Well, then, why have all the problems of urban living without any of the amenities? Lubbock is long past being an overgrown farm town. It's become an agronomy center and an education center. It is hoping to become a medical center. It should now be a cultural center as well. Matter of fact, with one of the largest universities in the state almost spitting distance from city hall, Lubbock has a cultural responsibility.

Ah, yes, but what of the problems? The crime? The urban blight? No one can dismiss these, but perhaps with some city help for the arts, the problems can be solved. Councilman Alan Henry, who will propose the tax support, argues that a dollar spent on the arts generates two. With increased tourism, the city stands to gain more money from the taxes it can apply to local problems.

It's ridiculous to build a civic center, then refuse to help those events that fill it. The city council should make its commitment not only to the arts, but to the city as well.

It's About Time

Obviously adhering to their ancient credo—"The early worm gets the bird"—the Lubbock school board thumbed their noses in the general direction of bleary-eyed spectators who wanted the board to meet anytime but 7:15 in the morning.

Carolyn Lanier, president of the League of Women Voters, had raised the issue at an earlier meeting, but this time the board didn't give her—or anyone else, for that matter—an opportunity to say anything.

Evidently, that goes along with the majority's feeling that parents should neither be seen nor heard. Parental involvement with the decisions of the trustees at their meetings would just muddle things up, anyhow. And besides, some members of the board argued, it would be inconvenient to make a night meeting.

"I would not have run for the board if it had met at night," Trustee Harold Harriger wisecracked. That's probably the best excuse for night meetings yet.

Congressional Flag Trade Becomes Big Business

WASHINGTON — If there's anything more patriotic than flying an American flag from your window, it must be flying a flag that once fluttered over the U.S. Capitol.

That seems to be the opinion of a growing number of Americans who have ordered starspangled banners from their senators or representatives. Or it could be simply a matter of finding a good bargain: the flags are extraordinarily cheap.

Although the cotton bunting flags—with embroidered stars—sell at manufacturer's cost, essentially the whole enterprise is subsidized by tax dollars.

Booming Business

Whatever the reason, business is booming for this curious sideline Congress has developed since it sold its first six flags in 1937. Last year legislators turned over 62,860 banners. That was a quantum leap over 1975, when the volume was 34,000.

Of course, last year was the Bicentennial. "It was touch and go" then, admitted William F. Raines Jr., who works for the Architect of the Capitol. That is the office responsible for certifying that each flag has flown over the building—usually for only a moment or two before being reeled in to make room for the next one in a waiting stack.

"For a while it looked as if we would have to put a limit on the number of flags each congressional office could order," said Raines. "But we managed to supply everybody who asked for one."

In fact, they flew a total of 10,471 flags in the 24-hour period of July 4, 1976. A crew of 50 worked with military precision around the clock in shifts, running the flags up 20 poles, letting them flutter for a few seconds and then packing them in mailing cartons.

This last Fourth of July was a breeze by



comparison. A crew of four working on an obscure portion of the roof near the Capitol dome flew 550 flags during the day.

Bargain Prices

Anybody can buy a flag from any member of Congress. The cost is about one-third the amount charged in retail stores in the Washington, D.C. area: \$5.10 for a 3-by-5 foot flag and \$11 for a 5-by-8 foot one. (Those are Senate prices. House members charge a dollar or two less, because the House buys them cheaper in greater bulk.)

The suppliers are lucky if they make a profit at those prices, according to Joe McIntyre, vice president of the Detra Flag Co. of Oaks, Pa. "It's mostly good advertising," he said. "It also keeps our sewing machines running during slack periods."

The only people who seem to be upset are retailers, who sometimes write their congressman if they feel he has been advertising too heavily and cutting into their business.

The cost the taxpayers pick up is in handling. Besides labor costs for hoisting, a pool of five secretaries with salaries ranging from \$9,000 to \$16,800 a year work full time grinding out the certificates.

Raines said it probably takes secretaries in individual congressional offices an average of a half-hour to process each request. A request often involves an exchange of letters to explain to the constituent the cost and procedure for ordering.

At a conservative estimate, the cost to taxpayers of running the service comes to \$139,200 a year—not counting mailing costs and overhead such as office space and supplies.

No Complaints

However, Raines says no member has ever complained about the cost because "it's a patriotic gesture."

It's also a nice campaign gimmick. Raines said the busiest seasons besides the Fourth

of July and Flag Day are the month or two preceding elections, when members often advertise the availability of flags in newsletters they send to constituents.

Members of all political stripes take advantage of the practice. Last year liberal Sen. Hubert H. Humphrey (D-Minn.) sent out 2,500 flags.

Conservative Sen. Strom Thurmond (R-S.C.) receives a lot of requests from people who don't live in South Carolina because of his identification with patriotic and military themes, according to aide Fran Dickey.

Steady Customer

One of Thurmond's constituents orders six or seven flags per month. The 63-year-old tool and die grinder hands them out to friends and institutions he comes across—such as schools—that don't have flags.

"It makes me feel good," said Woodrow Britton of Charleston. "I just love my country and I'm sorry to see things look as sad as they do. More people ought to speak up, and I guess this is my way."

P.S.: Some members of Congress are becoming irritated because reporters write about benefits they find around Capitol Hill without admitting that they themselves sometimes take advantage of them.

So, in the interests of full disclosure, let it be known that this reporter received from Sen. Robert Morgan (D-N.C.) a 5-by-8 foot flag flown on June 17, 1977. The flag arrived just in time to go out the window for Independence Day, and it looked fine.



Somewhere in the almost-cool early morning...somewhere under what would become glaring hot sunlight...somewhere, as grim-faced Lubbockites streamed down the street in pursuit of timeclocks and fortune...somewhere, the body of an antitrust lawyer twirled in its grave.

For, right here on your very radios, Bill McAlister, the city councilman, who runs a television station and used to run radio stations, was on the air at another radio station, talking by phone, to his old colleague, Lew Dee, who was on the air at another radio station.

Eat your heart out, FCC.

There was something of history in the moment. McAlister and Dee, the sidekicks from the old KSEL "T.T.O." (This, That and the Other) morning radio show, ready to trade barbs once again. Burns and Allen, Lone Ranger and Tonto, Bergen and McCarthy.

McAlister, after the phone hook-up has been arranged and he knows that Dee is on the other end of the phone, hails his long-lost colleague.

"Who is this?" Dee's voice crackles back.

"Who is this? What do you mean 'who is this?'" McAlister shouts in mock alarm.

McAlister explains that on this particular Wednesday, in the almost-cool early morning...but we've been through that, haven't we?...that he's filling in for Jerry Coleman, KLLL's morning drive-time DJ who is, McAlister frequently takes pains to comment on, vacationing in Hawaii.

"I told them I cannot do a morning show without talking to you," McAlister tells Dee.

Good-humored insults are traded, then Dee launches into a remembrance. "This is getting very emotional," McAlister cuts him off, then says he has heard Dee will be running for Congress.

"Everybody's running," Dee waves.

More chit-chat. McAlister rings off.

While a commercial spot plays, McAlister intently asks whether Steve Sever, the KLLL disc jockey who is "running the board" (pushing the buttons and flipping the switches), has kept up with his log of commercials to be played.

"I'll be quiet," McAlister offers.

You know he won't. He relishes in it.

When Bill McAlister, son of the late broadcasting magnate and legislator R.B. McAlister, is nervous, he sits in a "disk jockey lean" he hunches forward like he's

addressing a microphone, rips out sentences in a radio station, eyes dart in search for a clock. But sitting in the tiny KLLL control room, there is no nervousness. He addresses the microphone like an old friend and eases back in the chair as he talks in the phone, first to Dee then to Sheila...

Sheila. Now there's old times. Sheila used to call the T.T.O. Show to give opinions on a range of subjects as broad as the horizon. Sheila tells him that there's nobody good to listen to since he went off the air. McAlister is properly appreciative. He tells her likewise she is missed.

From Sheila, attention turns to a wake-up call. A "wake-up call" is a funzapoppin' prank, conceived by a "farm shift" jockey and penetrated upon the unsuspecting, and Sever, knowing McAlister's old format, has prepared a tape of sound effects. A young boy calls in and wants to wake up his brother, who, in response, knows nothing of the goings-on surrounding his slumber.

McAlister carefully instructs the boy to place a radio by the bed. That done, Sever pushes the button for the sound effects, and he and McAlister holler for the slumbering sibling to wake up.

Later, a sleepy-voiced 14-year-old will call back to inform them that their efforts were in vain. He slept through it, head buried in a pillow. Nothing, not even reunions, are dead solid perfect.

As the morning progresses, McAlister receives a call from a buddy from junior high school days as Sever plays "Can't Shake the Sands of Texas Outa My Shoes" then handles a live commercial from Diana's Doll House. Diana Karvas, while telling about specials in the shop, says "I really miss your radio show." Larry Corbin, who purchased KLLL from McAlister's father, stops in to talk about television. McAlister pulls out trade gossip in an expanded version of his "Inside Television" program.

"You're gonna be pretty good when you get some experience," he jokes with McAlister, who has been on radio since his junior high days.

The morning show ends. It is evident McAlister enjoyed himself. "I like radio," he explains, "You can do a whole lot more with it. Of course, I like television, too."

As McAlister shakes hands with Sever, and greets other staff members who congratulate him on his encore, he remarks off-handedly, "You know, they never did ask me anything about city council..."

Heat, Tension Strike Out Lubbock Girls

Local Team Defeated in Hurst Tournament

HURST—It was smoldering hot as Diana Lampe grounded her shoe into the dust, tucked a few stray hairs under her cap, aimed and threw the ball in the direction of home base. Beads of sweat and sun blisters danced across her nose and cheeks.

Shouts of "You can do it, lets see you all win this game," bounced off the baseball diamond. An hour later the taste of defeat coated each player's mouth—for players

like Diane, it was the first sour taste she had in her mouth in a long time.

The girls playing with the Lampe construction team of the West Texas Girl's Softball Association, were undefeated when they headed for the State Tourney in Hurst. The team of girls ages 15 through 18 years, were confident they would do well at the state finals, they were prepared for the competition—after all they hadn't lost one yet.

But what they weren't prepared for was the sticky weather with temperatures

racing past the 100 mark, some downright sharp teams, and the tension that stretched through every game.

Their first shot at the tourney prize came at 8:30 a.m. Saturday, and ended an hour later when the Falcons lost. Their second game, played several hours later was tight, in fact, the Falcons had a two run lead during the last thirty minutes of the game. Then during the last few minutes, the opposing team slipped ahead, when the whistle blew the score was 8-7.

Trying to catch her breath between sentences, pitcher Diane Lampe talked about the defeat. "We played as hard as we could, it just wasn't good enough," she said. "I was excited and nervous, but I was confident, I'm not sure what went wrong."

Mary Tevis, short stop, attributed the loss to the heat and the one hour time limit for each game. "We just didn't get quite far enough in an hour to come out ahead," she said.

But Rhonda Spoiles, right fielder, said the team was plagued with more problems than just the weather. "We didn't play the best we could, we just didn't look as sharp as we usually do," she explained. She added that she thought some of the umpires didn't look fairly on the team.

Kenna Cantrell agreed, "I felt like the umpires were a problem, but the teams we played seemed to play fair."

Said Coach Ed Lampe, "We just beat ourselves." Although he said he didn't expect to win every game the team wasn't anticipating they would lose both games and be eliminated from competition so quickly. "It was a fair game but the heat hurt us," he said.

There were sad faces, a few outbursts of sharp remarks, a few tears as the team left the field. But after showers and a few cold drinks, the girls were ready for a good time. Thoughts of fly balls, stolen bases and home runs neatly stored away—at least until next season.

that a campaign is comes down to physical endurance, "especially when you go out to see the people as we have always done."

"I doubt we would have the support of the special interest or the big money. We have always been fortunate to have the support of the people," but he adds that a campaign today would be different from his first gubernatorial race in 1968.

"I think for good or ill, we have acquired broad name recognition factor. So many people never have a chance to meet a candidate for governor. Some go in and see a name on a ballot and vote for it. I don't think that's good, that's just what happens."

No cartoon on his wall deals with the Sharpstown scandal. His connection with the stock fraud is the major reason he ran fourth in a field of four in the 1972 Democratic primary. At the mention of the word, he tenses.

"I doubt if any incumbent could have won (in 1972). The mood the voters were in, they were ready to remove any elected officials."

Would Sharpstown be an issue if he did seek the governorship? "I don't think so. Not after 6 years."

In one drawing, a battered Smith caricature, along with figures representing the House and Senate, emerge from a door

marked tax session. The Smith caricature on crutches is tired and cross and scolds his colleagues as they descend Capitol steps.

Smith says he has been contacted by two of three hundred people from other parts of the state who want him to run again, mostly because Briscoe has snubbed them or their causes. "Usually," he says, "there is unhappiness on the part of somebody."

Most of his calls from West Texas are from former supporters who seek his help. "I get a tremendous number of requests for assistance. Like writing a letter of recommendation for a daughter or son who wants to get into medical school or law school."

"Sometimes it helps. Sometimes it doesn't. If two students have equal grades, maybe a letter from a former governor will help."

In fact, Smith would like to get a little money from the state to defray expense of answering his mail. "After four or five years, it trickles off. But we answer every piece of mail. A former governor has a responsibility."

There is one cartoon that shows Smith looking into a mirror. The mirror image shows him with a crown. Whether the image will hold true in 1978, only Preston Smith knows.

down here, and Lubbock will have an increase in crime, rising taxes and a depletion of our water supply," the councilman said.

"When these tough problems get the attention they deserve, then you can talk about the arts," West said.

He also added after the "tough" problems are solved, the city can move on to the "non-critical" problems, such as promoting arts programs.

"Being in advertising and commercial art (West runs West Advertising Agency) I support the arts personally," he said, "but they must take a lower priority."

Councilman Bill McAllister believes the tax money should be used for convention promotion, but he thinks the council "needs to really study and see if it (the tax increase) would be a benefit to our economy."

McAllister said the council should not raise the tax "just for the heck of raising it."

Mayor Roy Bass would like to adopt the tax increase "fairly soon," he said at Thursday's work session, because the tax money could be used both as a revenue for civic promotion and would "give us a chance to get into the arts and humanities in such a way as we have not been in before."

The mayor cited such cities as Atlanta, Boston and Houston as examples of cities "into this type of activity in a substantial way," and said he thought it was the "ideal time" for Lubbock to start in this type of program by "rounding out" the cultural affairs of the city.

"If properly handled, an arts program can create as much economic impact as bringing in another industry," Henry said at the work session.

The council will discuss raising the hotel/motel tax at its next meeting, when Councilwoman Carolyn Jordan is present. During Thursday's meeting she was taking the State Bar Exam.

herself, not for her parents, not for her boyfriend," she explained.

If a girl is under 18 years, she must have parental consent before an abortion can be performed. A counselor will discuss the pregnancy with the parents while the girl is there. If a woman wants a husband or boyfriend to attend the counseling session, he is welcomed, according to Olbekson.

When a woman needs more time to make her decision, counselors advise her to go home and think about it. Making a hesitant decision can be dangerous but equally as dangerous is stalling too long before having an abortion. Often by the time a woman discovers she's pregnant it's the third month and she has very little time to make a decision, noted a social worker.

Also discussed during the counseling sessions are various methods of birth control. Some women get pregnant not so much because their contraceptive failed but because they didn't use it properly. Clearing up the reasons why a woman did not use a contraceptive or did not use one properly is part of the counseling procedure.

Another reason for some unwanted pregnancies centers around morals. "Some women think that if they use a contraceptive they're planning to have sex which is 'bad', but without contraceptives sex just happened by accident," explained Olbekson.

Occasionally lack of education contributes to the problem. One nurse noted a case where a young girl thought she "couldn't get pregnant because her mother always told her that only happened when you slept with a man. She, on the other hand, never slept with a man, she always got up and went home."

After counseling is done and contraceptives are suggested, a woman who elects to have an abortion pays her money and is examined by a physician. A dilatation insertion is performed, a simple procedure that causes the cervix to dilate overnight.

The next day, the woman comes in for the abortion. A local physician, a staff of nurses and the counselor are with the woman throughout the abortion. The room is antiseptically clean, with emergency equipment available.

A uterine aspiration is performed on women in the early stages of pregnancy. It involves gently removing the tissue from the uterus by means of a suction type apparatus known as the vacuum aspirator. There is some pain involved during the 10 minute operation, usually between 30 seconds and a minute of severe cramping. The woman at no time sees the fetal remains.

After the abortion, the woman is taken to the recovery room where she can recuperate. Nurses as well as counselor are on hand to answer any questions, take care of any problems. Most women spend one and a half hours at the recovery room, then return home. "Some women go right back to work, but we advise taking the day off, if for nothing else than a psychological rest," said Olbekson.

Most women express relief after the procedure is completed. "It's as if a big burden had been lifted off their shoulders," said Olbekson. Women are given antibiotics, pain killers and warned of possible complications—high fever, cramping, heavy bleeding.

Most women return to their normal lifestyle without any complications. The incidents of women suffering from psychological difficulties is only two per cent, even lower is the incidence of dangerous infections.

And so, with "West Side Story" and next week's Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey Circus, most "live performances in the city are going to go "underground" until the Lubbock Theatre Centre unveils its annual musical production, "Kiss Me Kate," in September. Thus for the next few columns I am going to try and introduce you to some local people whom I have met and, in some instances, whose performances I have enjoyed over the months, so that you can get to know them, too, and perhaps, on occasion, share their contributions with me.



This particular column will appear on July 29 and is thus dedicated to a very nice man whom I have only met once and that in a casual conversation. I found him a delight and most engaging and a man with a little "vignette" kind of story out of 1928 Texas that I want to share with you.

I dedicate this column to him for on July 31 he retires as professor in the College of Agriculture of Science at Texas Tech University after no less than 40 years of teaching and Service. He is a man who is gentle, soft-spoken, native Texas (Chillicothe) and says he knows nothing about music at all, that it is Mrs. who knows everything about such things. I don't think Professor Cecil I. Ayres was telling me the whole truth in that brief visit we had.

Prof. Ayres (he and Mrs. Ayres live at 3517 44th St., in case you'd like to congratulate a man on a dedicated and very long-serving teacher in his field) grew up in Chillicothe and then went north to study for the field which he has distinguished for so long in our midst. He came back to Texas and here he has been since.

He doesn't seem at all professorial or an academician as so many savants do, just a nice, easy, warm man to talk with. He said Mrs. Ayres was the one who kept up with all the cultural activities in the home and that he was really totally unversed. I harbored then, and I harbor now, a little skepticism.

For example, Professor Ayres told me a little story which I asked him if I could repeat on this weekend which is HIS weekend.

It seems back around 1928 or so when he was attending the high school in Chillicothe, he and other members of his class got onto a bus and headed off for the Big City, Wichita Falls. The event was concert to be conducted by the aging grand master of composer-band leaders, none other than John Phillip Sousa. It must have been one of Sousa's last visits to Texas for he died in Reading, Pennsylvania, on March 6, 1932.

At any rate, for a man who is a professor and professes to know little or nothing about music, he does have a valuable and treasured memory of having seen the "March King" conducting in the latter years of a most distinguished life.

Professor Ayres, thank you for permission to tell about you and your John Phillip Sousa moment and, on this weekend of your retirement I know that I and all who have read these words join in wishing you the best of everything and a happy, leisurely life. You might even be persuaded by Mrs. Ayres to listen to some music now and then. As if you did not. Happy days, Professor.

I haven't really had time to mention such about the forthcoming visit of the Silver Train and the Ringling Bros. and Barnum and Bailey Circus. By now, you know that this "Greatest Show on Earth" (and it is, too) is headed for another Lubbock-South Plains and all other places visit at the Lubbock Municipal Coliseum on August 5-7. I shall be talking about the Big Show (this is the 106th annual edition) in the column next week. I hardly need to sell this one. I've been a dyed-in-the-blood fan for many years and I hope to repeat once again next weekend. More later.

I want to touch on two movies before I wind this edition up. One is: Dino di Laurentis presentation through Paramount Pictures (a Showplace 4) called "Orca." Ever since "Jaws" made its outstanding impact a couple of seasons ago, we have been subjected to a variety of seafood, from imitations of the shark film to the Moray Eel in "The Deep" and now "Orca."

In case you don't know, di Laurentis is the man responsible for the grotesque "King Kong" remake and he seems to think the bigger the monster the better the film. Not so. The story is based on fact that the giant killer whale is very friendly to man, lives with his "wife" and "children" faithfully through life, but is a heller if you cross him.

In this one, Richard Harris makes the sad mistake of shooting a harpoon into Orca's rear end and that, of course, is unforgivable to Orca—and to the audience, I suspect. From then on Orca never forgets. He is tracing Harris and he means business. There are upset boats, all kinds of disasters and the ultimate end of harpoonist Harris, who never did a worse job of acting(?) in his life. Charlotte Rampling, the British actress, is the sole survivor but that is questionable at the closeout.

I don't think we need mention anybody else in the cast. Like Avis they tried harder, but in this instance it was to no avail.

But all on the movie scene is not amiss. If you did not get to see my full column remarks about the new Walt Disney Productions animated full-length feature, "The Rescuers," now unspooling at the Fox 4 Theatres, then I shall hasten to say what I said at the start of Wednesday column remarks.

Pack up the kids, yourselves, the neighbors and their kids and any strays along the way and head directly for on of the most enchanting experiences in many a moon. It has been four years ("Robin Hood") since we have had a full-length animation film from Disney and this one takes its place along with "Bambi," "Dumbo," "Pinocchio," "Snow White" and all the other "greats." It is a superlative job from start to finish, a film of one hour and 16 minutes (G, of course) that has more entertainment for kids and adults than the whole passel of films of the past year put together.

It has humor, pathos, beauty, music, and excitement and is a craftsman's honor piece. The story of two little mice pitted against the angry witch Madame Medusa, to rescue little orphan girl, Penny, is a winner all along the line and the individual characterizations by drawings, the backgrounds, the voices of such stars as Eva Gabor, Gerslindine Page, Bob Newhart Jim Jordan ("Fibber McGee") and others make the whole outing a total delight. You simply cannot go wrong with "The Rescuers," whether you've got the family or are in the dating process. Don't miss it, for heavens' sake.

Tempest in a TV-Pot Report Sparks Comedy of Errors

There are times when television dramas are a bit too real, and then there are times when the six o'clock news runs more like a segment of the Gong Show. The latter came close to happening on KCBD-TV (Channel 11).

If it struck you as odd that somewhere between the local news and ther weather there was a black man talking about television made a hit comedy (of errors) script in itself.

It all started when Channel 11 decided to do an investigative consumer report on television repairs. Bob Rooker, who incidently doubles as a Tech prof., reported the events that involved taking a TV needing only a test tube repaired to ten stores in Lubbock. After the television was repaired, Rooker took it to an independent expert who then analyzed what repairs had been made, whether they needed to be made and the cost compared with other stores.

About Rooker's fifth go-around with television shops he landed at Twenty-Twenty Television Repair, disguised as a Conoco Service station in East Lubbock.

The trouble began when Rooker was charged \$59.17 for the replacement of the power transformer, two test tubes and labor. In addition, Rooker reported, "The orginial test tube was still in the television although the owner had said he replaced it."

A few weeks, later, after the research was completed, a registered letter was sent to store owner Ray Nichols, explaining his store was investigated during the series. Nichols said he never got the letter but he was later

contacted by KCBD news director Dick Bendedict, who read a copy of the letter to Nichols. Nichols then asked the show not be aired; later he asked for a retraction. In both instances Benedict refused, but he did give Nichols a chance to speak his piece on television. According to Nichols, the damage had already been done, but he decided to tell his side of the story anyway.

Nichols claimed there were two identical model television sets at his shop, one belonging to Bob Rooker the to a Bob Robbins. The reason Rooker's bill was so was because there had been a mix-up—Nichols' ten-year-old son had given Rooker the wrong ticket Nichols said the bill should have been \$11.20.

Nichols discovered the error while looking through the tickets that evening and tried to contact Rooker, but the reporter had not left a phone number. Nichols further explained that the ticket the boy had made out had no name, date or serial number on it. Also Rooker had told the boy to put his name on his copy and mark it paid.

The story really gets complicated when you consider that Nichols had told Rooker by telephone that bill would be \$59 earlier that same day. In addition, the set had taken unusually long to fix and Nichols had said it was because he ordered a power transformer from Dallas. Nichols said on two different occasions the bill would be \$59.17, according to Rooker.

Rooker asked for the used parts when he picked up the television set. Since Nichols wasn't there, Rooker returned an hour later

and Nichols handed him a sack of parts including a used power transformer.

Nichols said that he gave Rooker the wrong used parts because he thought Rooker was Robbins. "I was busy that day and I didn't know who I was talking to," said Nichols.

And so the case of the \$59.17 television repair bill ended with Nichols' appearance on television earlier this week. He gave his side of the story, KCBD gave their side and then it was time for the weather.

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



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Hill Blasts 'Decade Dolph'

AG Hints Race for Governor's Chair

State Atty. Gen. John Hill, on what he called a "grassroots tour" of West Texas and the Panhandle, told reporters in Lubbock Thursday that voters don't want Gov. Dolph Briscoe to hold office for ten years.

Hill has all but announced his challenge to Briscoe. After an appearance in Amarillo and tour

of other parts of the South Plains, the attorney general said, "there is an increasing awareness on the part of the public that he (Briscoe) will be serving a ten-year term."

Hill cited two polls which he said, demonstrated Briscoe's vulnerability. One poll showed that 58 percent of those responding felt the governor should not serve a decade.

Briscoe was elected to a two-year term in 1972 and, after a change in the state constitution lengthened tenure for governors, won a four-year term in 1974.

With control over appointments to the state's commissions and boards over ten years, Hill said, "one man would determine the course of government until 1985."

Hill said his own poll showed he had name recognition with 82 percent of the sample group, which he claimed was extremely high for an attorney general.

On other matters, Hill said that his office is briefing the in anticipation for a court challenge of the President Carter's controversial energy program.

He said that Briscoe had been unable to rally opposition to the "anti-Texas" portions of the Carter package. "Frankly, if the Governor had any chips to cash in Washington, it's long past the time they can be cashed in."

Stay Cool with Swimming Pool

But Don't Order One Until ... Say ... November

During these hot summer days, you may discover there are visions of your own backyard pool swimming in your head. Before you make the big splash, consider the cost, maintenance and time involved in owning a swimming pool.

You should invest no more than 30 percent of your property value in the pool project, explained Marty Treelikes, co-owner of Empire Pools. If you invest more you can't expect to get a fair return on your investment if you sell the home.

It's also wise to contact the tax accessor for an estimate of your tax increase with the home improvement.

After you've got those basics out of the way and you consider a pool a good investment, it's time to decide on what kind of pool you want.

The basic types of pools are above ground with vinyl liners, in-ground concrete, fiberglass and gunite.

Above-ground pools with vinyl liners are usually the least expensive and easy to install. They have some disadvantages, for one thing they last only about three years. They also can be difficult to maintain.

Concrete, the pools most commonly found in Lubbock, have the advantage of being underground. They also can be shaped anyway to fit your yard. But, they, too, have disadvantages since concrete cracks. According to Treelikes, as the concrete is poured, water holes are created,

and when water evaporates you're left with a void in the concrete. That void can later become cracks.

Gunite pools, give the same appearance as cement pools but they have an added advantage. Gunite is sprayed on and the mixture is kept dry until it actually hits the pool walls. This makes the mixture stronger, with little chance of creating cracks. "The longer the material stands wet the weaker it gets," noted Treelike.

Although new to the Lubbock area, fiberglass pools are fast growing in popularity. These pools are installed in one piece and are known for their durability. They have the advantage of having a smooth surface, which cuts down on cost because algae and other foreign substances can't cling to the sides.

"As much as 90 percent of the chemical costs are cut," noted one

pool saleswoman at Pools West. The major disadvantage is the pools come in a limited selection of shapes. There are seven models to choose from, and those don't always fit a person's yard, she noted.

Once you've decided what kind of pool you want, your next step would be to determine shape. "The kidney shape is very popular but it's not very practical," said one woman. In addition to having wasted swimming space you have the cost of maintaining area you don't really use. The yard's size and how much money you want to invest should be key considerations in deciding on a shape.

Now you get down to what's a necessity and what's a luxury in equipping a pool. You have to have a filter and pump that suits the pool's size.

The pump should be capable of turning over water over a six hour period, and the bigger the pool, the bigger the pump. The filter should be capable of handling the volume of water the pool holds.

You should also question what kind of piping is used on a pool. The best plumbing is plastic, noted Treelike. A galvanized pipe

will rust, and a copper pipe will be destroyed by too much acid.

All electrical parts and wires should be water tight. If you plan to get a heater, get one that will increase the temperature at least 25 degrees over a 24-hour period. A heater is not a necessity, in fact it can only increase your swimming time by about two months at the beginning and end of each summer season.

If you decide you want a heater, consider the added cost, since the longer you run a heater the higher your utility bill will be. Examine the heater and make sure you chose one that will heat the pool in the shortest amount of time.

Probably the biggest disadvantage, for some people, when it comes to owning a pool is maintenance. If you don't have automatic equipment to do the work for you, the job can be a demanding one. If you plan to do it yourself you can expect to vacuum the pool twice weekly, and the water must be tested daily, and chemicals added accordingly.

If you'd rather have a machine do the work for you it can cost as much as \$600 for an automatic sweep. This device moves along the surface of the pool, cleaning any debris that accumulates. It eliminates between 80 to 85 percent of the maintenance work.

Chemicals are another area where you can cut the time spent on maintenance, with an electronic chlorinator. One product produces chlorine from rock salt, water, and electricity. The initial cost for this gadget is about \$400, but, according to Treelike, you avoid the expensive costs of chlorine, and can save money in the long run. However, if a lot of people swim in your pool it might be necessary to supplement the rock salt with chlorine, he added.

There are extras that can add to your pool cost. Depending on how many people swim, pool size, shape and how it is heated your maintenance cost can run anywhere from \$30 to \$100 monthly.

That's without the added extras many people opt for extras like slides or diving boards can take an additional \$200 to \$500 to the cost. If you can't afford landscaping, patio heater, extra concrete or a sauna the first year you buy a pool these extras can always be added later.

Finally, when it comes time to install the pool be sure the contract spells out the type and extent of work, the completion date, size of pool in square feet of water, a complete description of material and equipment to be installed and the warranties on each. The contract should include what accessories are to be installed by the builder and a list of extra costs, for instance labor.

Some pool manufacturers promise a life-time guarantee on gunite pools, while fiberglass manufacturers promise nothing. Fiberglass pools have only been on the market for about 15 years, even less in Lubbock, and their longevity has not been determined.

If you expect to buy a pool now to get you through the summer months you may be better off planning for next year. It takes between 10 days and eight weeks to complete a pool, and orders for pools begin as early as January.

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
