# rivers Yield Union Petition; May Shift Gears Lubboch D

Citibus drivers may have to change gears in their campaign to unionize after the union representing them before the National Labor Relations Board withdrew its petition for local election.

The Meat Cutters and Packing House Workers District Union, after a conference with NLRB and management officials Monday in Fort Worth, bowed out of the

drivers bid, deferring to the Amalgamated Transit Workers.

Ronnie Brown, a Lubbock representative of the meat cutters group, explained that, as an AFL-CIO union, his local was "outside of this jurisdiction" in representing the drivers, and that he felt the drivers would be better represented by a transit union.

Brown said that the petition for a union election was withdrawn

"without prejudice" which means that the election petition may be resubmitted-this time under the auspices of the transit workers group-at any time.

Edwin Youngblood, a NLRB spokesman, said the petition was withdrawn after a representative of Lubbock Transit Corp's parent company, St. Louis-based American Transit Corp., questioned NLRB jurisdiction.

Under the National Labor

Relations Act, the NLRB has no jurisdiction over an employer which is a "political subdivision" of the state-such as the city of Lubbock.

The management representative argued since the city government pays Lubbock Transit a fixed fee to operate the bus lines, in effect, the city is the employer of the bus drivers, not Lubbock Transit Corp.

'We haven't made any

determination" on the union request, Youngblood said. "The union decided to withdraw and check it (the management assertions) out. They may refile next week."

City transit advisor John Wilson said that although Lubbock Transit Corp. managr Ernie Prenevost signs drivers' checks, the city may be seen as the employer and Lubbock Continued On Page Four



# **Goes Hungry for Support**

Lubbock School Trustees put the last nail in the coffin of a program that would make breakfasts available to school children at their Thursday morning meeting, deciding not to consider the program at the June meeting.

After hearing Cecilia George, Secretary of the First United Church and Dr. Floyd Perry, Chairman of the Education Commission of the NAACP's Lubbock chapter, the board voted down a motion by trustee Joan Ervin to place the federally-funded program on the June agenda. Board president Charles Waters sid a three-fourths majorityor four votes-was required to act on the program, since the board already voted it down in its March 17 meeting.

"Nutrition is as important to a child as school texts," Perry said.

Trustees did not discuss a bill recently passed by the Texas House of Representatives which would require participation in a breakfast program if 25 per cent of the students showed a need. Any future action by the Board of Trustees on the breakfast program would probably be under the guns of that bill, now awaiting action in the State Senate. The breakfast program has been riding on the rim of the Hub City since the middle of February, when Sister Regina Foppe of the Social Action Service for the Diocese of Amarillo first asked the board to institute the program. The breakfasts would be funded by the U.S. Department of Agriculture and coordinated by the Texas Education Agency (TEA).

# **Med School Fractured**

Before the Texas Tech School of Medicine's new building even gets a chance to be all its cracked up to be, it's already showing a few cracks.

The building's dedication is scarcely more than one week away, and Texas Gov. Dolph Briscoe is scheduled to address graduating seniors and open the new facility June 5.

But some concrete panels on exterior staircases on the building's east side are cracked.

"Typically, when you work with concrete, you're going to have some cracks," said Jack Nottingham, an architect with Harwood K. Smith architecture firm in Dallas, which designed the building, "You're going to get some hairline cracks. We just accept it as fact.'

Nottingham was also asked about uneven tiles on the second story portico he calls "the deck." Some tiles are not level and some masonry between the tiles is oozing out.

"The big deck is under repair," Nottingham said, "The waterproofing failed."

The architect emphasized that the repair job would not cost any more. "The contractor has to get it right. He'll fix it."

Perry spoke to the nutritional values of the program. Whatever the reason parents fail to provide a nutritional meal, Perry said, "it is not the child's fault."



# Of Hungry Children, Gored Oxen and the B-D

In a display of "rugged individualism" that would have made Herbert Hoover stand up and cheer, the Big Daily in town has come out "unalterably opposed" to a breakfast program for the city's schoolchildren.


"(I)t would push an entire generation of young people into the concept that the government 'owes' them their upkeep," the B-D (for "Big Daily") pontificated.

Well, gee, if you put it that way ... For sure, the government has better things to do with its money, but we didn't hear B-D complain when the Feds chipped in for the Civic Center — in fact, good ol' B-D was right up there leading the cheers.

And then, Federal loans are bulding that li'l old teaching hospital out on the Tech campus, and B-D is just pleased as punch that its business manager chairs the Lubbock County Hospital District when federal money wasn't enough, by the by, LCHD marched hat-in-hand to Austin for \$8 million from the state government to tail out the hospital. And, durn right, the federal government shouldn't have to feed kids at school since it's so busy keeping Reese Air Force Base open to pump money into the local economy.

"Rugged individualism", it seems, comes down to which rugged individual is reaping the harvest of federal largesse. The argument: If the money goes to feed people, it's Socialism. If it goes to build buildings, it's civic development.

One wonders if federal money is as big an evil as righteous, morally myopic hypocrites. -C.A.



Miseries, they say, come in threes, but for the Citibus system, the miseries seem to be coming in multiples of three. So much so, you tend to lose count.

First, the newly purchased buses arrived two months late, and the two months of revenue lost was critical to anything resembling a balanced budget (remember that the two months of revenue will, in effect, come off the tail end of the fiscal year when Citibus should reach peak ridership). Plus, the buses weren't getting the mileage they should, so it cost more for gas.

Then it was disclosed that the system would lose \$150,000 more than the \$404,000 it was budgeted to lose in the first place. The city council balked at upping the ante.

Now, Citibus drivers are in the midst of a move to unionize.

"Union!" That's not a favorite word among West Texans. It conjures images of ruddy-faced labor chieftains barring the door to increased profits and of messy strikes and of the loss of control over one's property.

But before your knee jerks up to your chin at the mere mention of the word, take a look at the benefits—or lack thereof—that drivers have. No retirement. No paid holidays. They provide their own uniforms. In fact, the city staff waved off any possibility of the city taking over the local operation, saying it would cost too much to bring driver benefits up to city standards.

Still, it's not the right time for drivers to unionize. The new system of buses is not yet a year old, but the costs of

meeting union demands could cripple or even kill the new system, if only because the financially-strapped city government will probably refuse to get stuck with the charge. It may be that a union will have to negotiate eventually for better benefits, but a move like that right now—with the attendant hostility on the part of public and council—might strip drivers not only of benefits, but of paychecks as well. No city council will pay drivers to drive buses that aren't running.


Rather, the drivers should wait until the Citibus system strugges to its feet—or wheels—and can survive the onslaught of apparently legitimate financial demands from labor. (In fact, better benefits might help the troubled Citibus System, since officials lay the blame for some of the increased costs on the doorstep of increased training expenses because of a high driver turnover).

The drivers might know the time is right when there's a change of management at Lubbock Transit Corp., the subsidiary of the St. Louis-based company that is hired by the city to manage the bus lines.

One of the problems is 62-year-old Ernie Prenevost who, according to one source intimately familiar with transit operations, has purposefully underbudgeted, fearing the council would chop off its contribution to bus operation. After the budget was through, Prenevost turned around in the middle of the year, and pinned the council for an increased subsidy, effectively putting the council over a barrel.

Indeed, Prenevost's lack of accounting finesse led the City's Transit Advisory Board to muscle in on the money game asking for monthly profit-and-loss statements so the deficit balloon won't be blown up any more. Some board members were openly stunned at the explanation—or lack thereof—of the accounting that predicted the deficit in the first place.

It's not time for a bus drivers' union—the Citibus camel needs no more straws on its back—but when it comes time, hopefully the drivers will negotiate with more competent Lubbock Transit management. -C.A.


WASHINGTON — No issue on Capitol Hill is being pushed harder by the Carter administration than the President's comprehensive energy program.

Some critics, particularly Republicans, think it is being pushed too hard and too fast.

The House Speaker, Massachusetts Democrat Thomas P. (Tip) O'Neill Jr., has given legislative committees only until July 13 to hold hearings and draft a bill on the massive, far-reaching package. He wants the House to pass a bill before adjourning Aug. 6 for its summer recess.

"The realities are that Mr. O'Neill has set some nearly impossible goals," said John Anderson of Illinois, ranking Republican on the new Ad Hoc Select Committee on Energy and chairman of the House GOP Conference. "I think to have an arbitrary timetable, as suggested, is nonsense. I'm afraid we'll act in haste and repent in leisure."

Even Democratic supporters of the legislation hint that the August deadline might give them problems. "The job of selling this program to the American people is very difficult," said Ohio Democrat Thomas L. Ashley, chairman of the ad hoc committee, as he opened hearings the other day. New Approach



The new committee represents a break with Congress' traditional way of dealing with legislation. Usually a bill is handled by a regular standing committee before it goes to the floor of either the House or Senate.

But, because of the extreme size and complexity of the administration's energy bill, it will go through the extra step of the House ad hoc committee after passing through regular committee channels.

Rep. Phil Sharp of Indiana, a Democratic member of the committee, described it as a means to "slug out the tough things by a small group that has a handle on all parts of the package."



Sharp's comment touched on another potential snag in congressional processing of Carter's vast program, which encompasses everything from oil and gas taxes to home insulation. House laders hope to enact one broad bill. The Senate may pass four or more. Agreeing on the final form of the legislation promises to be a headache.

#### **Hearings and More Hearings**

At the moment, though, final action is the least of anyone's worries, either in Congress or in the White House. Hearings are in full swing before three committees in the House, and they'll begin soon in the Senate.

Not all has gone well. When the House Ways and Means Committee opened hearings on tax-related portions of the program, for example, it heard a barrage of criticism of the proposed standby tax on gasoline and the proposed tax on gas-guzzling cars. Nevertheless, Democrat Al Ullman of Oregon, Ways and Means chairman, predicted after the hearings, "We'll get a good bill."

"In the main, it's a good bill," said the staff director of the House subcommittee that is holding hearings on the non-tax parts of the package. "The dimensions are sound and it deserves enactment."

But even the staff director doubts that the House can meet its August deadline. "The legislation itself was written at white heat," he said, "and as a result there are serious technical problems."

#### Democratic Emphasis

The energy package, a combination of conservation and tax proposals that will, if enacted, touch every American in some way, is the most important initiative of the Carter administration so far. Carter himself has gone out of his way to impress the public with its urgency. "Energy legislation is the priority of priorities," said Robert C. Byrd of West Virginia, the Democratic leader of the Senate. By the end of June, he said, the Senate will have acted on a new Energy Department, strip-mining regulation, offshore oil drilling and increased use of coal as an energy source.

But, Byrd said, "I can't say all of the package will be enacted this year." If it's not, he conceded, the more controversial aspects of the program would be harder to pass in election year 1978 than this year.

#### **Republican** Alternatives

Even at this stage in the legislative process, Republican criticism of parts of the Democratic package has been pointed. Already, GOP senators have issued a list of alternatives, criticizing the President for seeking "further regulation, further bureaucratization, further governmental intervention into every facet of the energy problem."

Byrd said the Republican plan was "a product of considerable division among themselves." He said that he doubted, when the Senate takes up the Carter package, "that there would be a solid position on the part of all the Republicans."

Although House Republicans have not produced a comparable document, Anderson said they might do so. "What is there in this bill that really creates incentive among producers?" he asked.

Further criticism of administration tactics came from Clarence J. Brown of Ohio, the ranking Republican on the House energy subcommittee that has been holding hearings. "In a political sense, the administration strategy is a disaster," he said.



Hap Padgett, the building's general contractor, refused comment.

"It's not finished," Nottingham advised of the building, "so don't worry about it."

"We're inspecting it. The contractor is inspecting it and the people at Tech are inspecting it. We've got everybody on it."

Short concrete parking curbs in the parking lot were apparently installed incorrectly. Spots on the parking lot indicate that the concrete curbs were bolted in then pulled up to be placed on alternating sides of yellow parking lines.

According to one workman on the site, the basement near the med school's loading platform was flooded when pipes apparently burst. "They were running around looking for the plumber," he said.

Dr. Richard Lockwood, vice president of Tech's Health Sciences Centers, said he "hadn't noticed" any complaints about the building, but when contacted by a reporter, said he would check on it.

The completed building, with furnishings and equipment, is estimated to cost \$40 million.

Transit as a "subemployer".

"Because the city taxpayers pay for any increase in the costs" of operating the Citibus system, Wilson said, "any increase in costs—if the union struck for example—would affect the city taxpayer."

The Citibus system began operating with city-owned buses in December of last year, and faces \$554,000 worth of red ink in its first year of operation— \$150,000 more than budgeted.

The Transit Advisory Board has about two months left to study the budget and either reduce service or increase fares, or both, to lop off at least some of the increased deficit, after the city council balked at picking up the tab.







# **Local Tennis Pro Courted** Variety of Other Rackets

Mel Carter always wanted to play tennis, but he never seemed to get the chance when he was growing up.

A young man, 6'4", growing up in Quitaque, Texas, about 95 miles northeast of Lubbock, was pushed in the direction of other sports. He played football, ran track, and went to South Plains Junior College on a basketball scholarship.

"I remember I always wanted to play tennis," the new pro at the Municipal Tennis Center said, "but I was always forced into other sports."

Carter became the tennis pro at the new center last July, after spending about 10 years coaching 4A high schools across the state. He came to Lubbock from Abilene Cooper High School where he had the state team champions the last two years. He gave part of the credit for the teams' success to Abilene's junior program, a program he hopes to start here in Lubbock.

Among his regular duties as a pro, giving lessons, running clinics and tournaments and operating a pro shop, Carter plans to start a junior development program. He already has separate classes of six-, sevenand eight-year old boys and girls. Carter hopes to train some future champs.

"The idea is to let them have fun, and if they enjoy it, guide them with more careful instruction," he said.

doubts about tennis as a career when he was in his late 20s.

"I got out of coaching for one year, from 1969-1970, and became a marketing representative for an insurance company. I went to Hartford for training, and when I came back I realized I didn't want to spend my life talking insurance. I found I had too much athletic blood."

"I always wanted to get in a municipal center rather than a private club," he said. "You have a larger range of students and programs and are free to develop teams."

The work started on the Municipal Tennis Center at 3030 66th 18 months ago, John Alford, the director of the City Parks and Recreation Department said. Completion is expected by July 4 and the estimated cost is set at \$225,000. The money came from a 1971 bond election.





carefully. Know what you'll get and make sure it's in print. Every trip has a cancellation policy, and if you don't read the fine print you may end up paying for a trip you'll never take.

"Most tours have cancellation dates about 10 days before a trip," noted Black. Cancel before then and you should get most of your money back.

A popular way of traveling this year is charter flights. Unless you plan ahead of time, a charter flight could be full of surprises.

For one thing you must pay as much as a month ahead of time, and if you decide not to go you could lose your money. You also have the problem of getting to where the charter leaves, usually Chicago or New York.

Once you're on the plane you're as safe as you would be on any other flight. "Most of the time it's on a Boeing, a regularly scheduled flight, that has a few passengers along with cargo," explained Muschalek.

One of the biggest dangers of chartered planes is people send money to charter a flight without ever seeing the plane. As a result, they may show up for take-off without a plane or pilot.

If you prefer to make the getting there more leisurely, a cruise could be the answer. You can cruise almost anywhere in the world, and while cruising you'll be provided with six gourmet meals daily, swimming pools, casinos, exercise rooms and entertainment. District any money, Sister Regina has said.

The board, evidently concerned with going into what trustee Harry Harriger called a "breakfast business", voted down the proposal 5-2 in its March 17 meeting.

"If we offer breakfast, why not offer supper?" Harriger said.

The eligibility requirements for the breakfast program would be the same used for the LISD lunch program, and the regular price of the breakfast would be about 30 cents. Those students eligible for reduced prices would pay 10 cents, and students eligible for free lunches would also receive free breakfasts.

The breakfast would include such foods as eggs, meat, pancakes, potatoes, cheese, muffins or rolls, toast and jelly, milk and fruit or fruit juices.

The bill, SB 1078, is sponsored by Sen. Carlos Truan, D-Corpus Christi.

Ed Irons, Superintendent of Schools, said the bill, if it passes the Senate, would be "taken under consideration." The vote could change, Irons said, "on if the bill dependant mandated."

Waters does not believe the bill is a lawful one.

The school district has the right to run the affairs of the school district," he said, adding the bill goes beyond the jurisdiction of the state.

'It's a dumb bill," he said.

Writing a column for two weekly newspapers, Wednesdays and Fridays, for the West Texas Times, sometimes imposes a problem. For

example, if I see a film or play over the weekend and I am so favorably impressed that I want all to know, I tend to want to repeat. It doesn't happen always, but it does happen.

So, what I do, is to try and re-phrase for the Friday edition my recommendation and my own personal enthusiasm so that I reach the fullest possible audience.

That is what I am about to do. In the Wednesday edition of West Texas Times I wrote an unqualified rave over a movie which has just opened at the South

Plains Mall Cinema and I hope plays on and on and on, so you will all have the opportunity to see and enjoy.

The film is the Brut production of "Nasty Habits." In case you feel that "Nasty Habits" implies an X-rated, sexy job, forget it. What "Nasty Habits" implies is that a Catholic nun's garb is traditionally called a "habit."

"Nasty Habits" concerns itself with the struggle for power on the succession of an Abbess in Philadelphia and the collision between the liberated younger set of sisters with the older, power strong members.

What the film is, really, is the entire Watergate scandal, cleverly and wickedly transposed into the convent community. Here we have the Nixon, the "plumbers," the Haldeman's and the Erlichmans, the defector who gets all the dirty work to do, the break-ins, the pay-offs, the cover-ups. It's all too marvelously done and, as I said on Wednesday, if I thought there was a laugh out of the whole Watergate mess, I would have said "no." But, there is, and it is all here in this brilliant, rocking comedy satire, the best of its kind to come along since I don't know when.

Adapted from Muriel Spark's novella, "The Abbess of Crewe," Robert Enders who is both producer and screenwriter has done a positively astonishingly good piece of work. He has cannily taken the scandal of our times and superimposed it on this framework, transferred his locale from Crewe, England, to the fitting background of the City of Brotherly Love and come out a triumphant winner.

The director is a first-time-out man and how he scores. His name is Michael Lindsey-Hogg and you will certainly be hearing of him time and again, happily.

Now the cast. Oh, what a triumph is this. Hand-picked, all-star, each of the ladies involved—and the men, too—could not be better. You have two-time Oscar winner Glenda Jackson, never better, as the newly-elected Abbess, with her henchmen, Sisters Wallburga, the cigarette-smoking love, played to perfection by Geraldine Page, and Sister Mildred, superb in the hands of Anne Jackson. There is Anne Meara and a flock more of marvelous players and finally, but certainly not last, is a stunning, award-winning performance by Sandy Dennis as the bespectacled and put-upon Sister Winifred. When you see Dennis in action, it will put aside everyone else in the cast. I never thought anyone could steal a film from the marvelous Glenda Jackson but Sandy Dennis does just that. She is simply terrific and worth the price of admission alone. And, you know, as soon as you realize that this is the whole Watergate mess played out against the cloisters of the Abbey, the whole thing becomes uproarious. And Glenda Jackson's final line in the flim is the kicker of all time. Oh, the others. Well, there is a new actress to us, Susan Penhaglion, who plays the wayward, rebellious, "defrocked" nun, to perfection. That goes, too, for Oscar-winner Merlina Mercouri as the Henry Kissinger-type missionary nun, flying from the North Pole to China on her works.

Many of the people the Shipps help are up in years, old folks, and some of them can't get around anymore. Shipp's mother helped him to appreciate their needs.

"I've always been interested in the elderly," Shipp said. "My mother was an invalid nine and a half years, and I took care of her at home. I just enjoyed elderly people and kept it up through the years."

He and Mrs. Shipp "kept it up" partly by their visits.

"I visit all the rest homes, but I try to confine it to shut-ins anybody in desperate need," he said.

Shipp said it was "just human instinct" that led him to those in need of his help. "I never mention it because there are too many people you miss."

they shook hands on a "nominal fee," Brock said, adding, "John showed up and mowed seven acres of grass - I felt obligated."

"But you can't talk about me without talking about my wife," Shipp said. "She's the other half."

Ship's "other half" keeps herself busy with church work, visiting and her intricate needlepoint. She needlepoints copies of famous paintings for her grandchildren, and several fine examples of her work are displayed in the Shipp home.

Shipp also tends the grounds in front of the Shallowater Clinic, and keeps up the yards for relatives of his and his wife who can't. In bad weather, he picks up the mail for them and for others who can't get out.

The men, too, deserve high mention. They include Rip Torn, Eli Wallach and Jerry Stiller, and you'll find real-life portrayals by Howard K. Smith, Mike Douglas and other media names.


So, remember "Nasty Habits." It's a living doll of a movie.
