City-County Liason Panel Never Got Around to Meeting

Space Dust Carbonated Candy Causes Craving Kiddies Consternation

Supply was getting low, demand was getting greater. Clifford Igal combed store after store, trying to replenish the supply he kept hidden under his bed. But it was a futile attempt. Every store was cleaned-out.

Space Dust. It swept through Lubbock, with the same frenzy as the mysterious Lubbock Lights. It kept local classrooms hopping, it kept store owners hopping, and when the supply was gone, it kept kids like Clifford hunting for the "magical" candy.

Really that's all Space Dust is—the same old hard candy that's been sitting on store shelves for years—with one extra ingredient, Carbon Dioxide. It's the stuff that makes soda pop fizz and it's what gives Space Dust its bang.

Pour a little bit of the powder on your tongue and it starts to sizzle, millions of explosions bounce against the walls of your mouth, getting between your teeth, pop, snap and then after awhile, disappears. It comes in three fruit flavors, but some people claim it's tasteless—it's the popping that counts.

For kids like Clifford, Space Dust made them victims and entrepreneurs in a matter of months. Victims, because suddenly they were almost addicted to the candy they could no longer buy; entrepreneurs, because selling the magic powder, when they could find it, was an easy profit.

Take Clifford for example. He was one of the first to try the powder, and fell in love with it. Before long, the product had spread to the schools. More and more students were searching for powder. That's when Clifford lucked into his own private supply. He saved his allowance, and bought Space Dust by the case, at least \$9 worth.

And while he hoarded the supply carefully under his bed, he began realizing he was sleeping on a gold mine, of sorts.

So he returned to the store where he got his cache, and he went into business. Store owner Charlie Ther explained, "Clifford would sit in front of the store and sell the powder—that I sold him for 15 cents—for 25 cents." And for the young businessman, sales were booming, until the supply was gone. Now he is looking, but he can't find any. "Please," he begged, "Make them start selling it again."

The problem is, Space Dust was never supposed to be in Lubbock in the first place. According to Rhoda Kaufman, spokesman for General Foods, Inc., manufacturers of the product, "The product was distributed to Arizona, New Mexico, North Dakota and El Paso, Texas, as a market test." The popularity just spread to Lubbock—via a little profitable and apparently legal bootlegging.

According to several local store owners, they got their supply from El Paso, but even that supply was dwindled. Another

"Liason" can roughly be translated as "getting together", but the city-county liason committee, highly-touted as a ready remedy to "shared services" problems between the two governments, never "got it together."

The city council last week \$65-thousand contracted with the county commissioners court for mosquito and rat control in rural areas of the county. But the three-year contract wasn't the product of the liason committee.

Asked what results the liason committee has produced, County Judge Rod Shaw shot back, "None. It never met."

The committee was formed early this year, at the behest of county commissioners, to work out mutual problems between the two governments. There had been plenty of those in the past, partly because of strained relations between some members of the two boards and partly because of strained financial resources.

The liason committee, formed after some of those personalities—notably Commissioner Arch Lamb—on the commissioners court retired, ran into an early headwind-in-a-handbasket with the dispute over whether meetings would be open or closed.

City Councilman Bill McAlister wanted the public and press invited. Mayor Roy Bass said that was news to him. Shaw said the county delegation wanted to "let

their hair down" in a private session.

With the death of Pct. 2 Commissioner Max Arrants, Pct. 4 Commissioner Alton Brazell joined the four-member committee, and both county officials said they'd just as soon meet in open session.

Bass said that the problem of open or closed meetings is "not one, in my opinion"—it's just that the liason committee never got

around to getting together and the conflicts evaporated.

One conflict was fire calls—which Bass is quick to point out was not a "pure" shared services problem since the county contracted with the city for rural fire service. The council, faced with a tight budget, increased the charge per call 400 per cent. Commissioners balked, and decided to make do with volunteer

'Whatsoever the King Did ...' Lubbock Church Recovers from Lightning, Blaze

The congregation quietly filed into the church auditorium Sunday morning, ready to hear Brother Tom Weir preach his sermon.

No one paid any special attention to the beams inside, supporting the roof, or the black marks left along the roof from the fire.

The sun came in through the gouged ceiling behind the pulpit, and around the area undergoing massive rebuilding.

The congregation at Grace Baptist Church, a small house of

worship in Southwest Lubbock, is united in an effort to repair the damage caused when lightning struck the church May 26,

igniting a fire. Extinguishing the blaze left extensive water damage to the auditorium.

Weir, a large man who preaches with a voice full of fire and purpose, had been to the church earlier the day of the fire to pick up visitation cards. He planned to pick up his son at Little League that evening and call on visitors to the church.

When he heard about the fire later, he rushed to the church; the fire was out and he went inside the smoke-engulfed auditorium to pray.

The firemen told him the building nearly exploded; they punched holes in the roof to let the heat out.

"You don't know what I was doing (praying)," Weir said with confidence. "We weren't going to lose it."

Weir spoke from his pulpit Sunday morning, trying to ease the fears of members who wondered why this happened to them; why, after all, should lightning strike a church? What had they done to deserve this?

"(The fire) doesn't mean we were doing wrong," Weir preached, "A lot more people suffer from doing right than for doing wrong."

Citibus Drivers Plan Session On New Route to Unionization

Employees of Lubbock Transit Corp., which operates the Citibus system, may meet soon to determine their next step in a drive for unionization.

Citibus driver James Sterling, a leader in the union drive, told the Times he was to have been contacted this week by an official of the Amalgamated Transit Union to set up a meeting.

Drivers dropped their earlier union election petition with the National Labor Relations Board after representatives of Lubbock Transit's St. Louis-based parent firm argued that the drivers are

actually employed by the City of Lubbock, not Lubbock Transit.

The drivers had been working with a Lubbock meatcutters and packinghouse workers union to begin the unionization process, but the transit union intervened in the case. When management representatives raised the issue of city employment—which would take the case out of NLRB jurisdiction—the local group withdrew the petition and deferred to the transit union.

Sterling confirmed that drivers plan to continue their unionizing

It was one of those events on a Saturday morning, when the sun is a bit brighter and the air a bit clearer and the time a bit slower. It was the legacy of cracker barrels and goin' to the post office on the day before the Sabbath.

He came to look at an apartment. Young, but hard, with brows low over his eyes, he wore a kind of uniform, boots—a mesh golf cap over close cropped hair, long sideburns tracing his jowls.

He lost interest in the apartment. His dog could jump a ten-foot fence "on command", and the rickety barrier at the place would not hold the beast which had a taste for alleywalkers.

He turned to leave, but the conversation, as it is with young men roughly the same age, turned to women. He thought American women "spoiled" and preferred German women he had known while in the Army.

In fact, as the conversation turned to dogs, he'd trained his

dog in the service and the two had seen heavy action in "Nam." together.

"I see these stray dogs lying in the street somewhere," he said. His companion expected the obligatory closing, the "Gee-people-just-don't-take-care-of-their-animals" in "ain't it a shame?" tones.

"Shoot," the young veteran concluded, "They could all be trained to kill."

"All dogs have the killer instinct. It's just that man has dominated them so long, they lose chihuahua could be trained to kill."

The young veteran explained that dogs were used for two things in the service: "Neckrippers and sniffers." His dog was a "neckripper."

"I'll bet we lost half of our guys from our own men. Black dude gets mad at a white dude. Bra ta ta ta tat," he makes the child's play motion to indicate an imaginary rifle. "White dude gets mad at a black dude. Bra ta ta ta tat." Same signal, "out in the jungle, just list them as MIA."

"The only reason we have an army is civil defense. If we ever go to war with Russia we won't need an army, 90 percent of all our weaponry is computerized. They have this one laser-gun and one guy can take out a whole battalion of tanks—if he's in the right position.

"After I came back they trained me in civil defense—like if Russia ever sent an army over here. I can take the 12 best people on this

block and train them in three weeks and we could do a good job."

He climbs into his pickup. "But shoot, there won't be another war. Russia isn't going to start a war. China isn't going to start a war. What worries me is those third reich countries. That's what I call 'em—third reich countries. Like India. If they get the bomb...Like we say we won't give Israel the bomb, but we'll give 'em nuclear power plants.

And Egypt, the companion interjects and adds with cynicism, if the world gets blown up, it'll be American bombs.

"That's the American way," the veteran says as he guns the pickup.

Later, in a convenience food store, the somber companion overhears two young men, just off the tennis court, as they approach a video-pinball game. "What do you do?" one asks the other about little configurations of electronic dots shaped like humans, "shoot 'em?"

"No," replied his friend, "you run 'em over."

Agnew, Aching to Talk, Is Biding His Time

WASHINGTON—Ex-Vice President Spiro Agnew would like the same opportunity as Richard Nixon to tell his story to the nation. But sources close to Agnew say he won't talk until the statute of limitations runs out on possible criminal charges.

He has already started, meanwhile, on his memoirs. From his associates, we have learned some of the points he will make.

First, he will claim that he violated no laws. The money he accepted from contractors, he will insist, did not determine who got the contracts. He will also contend that it was common practice for contractors to provide expense money to state officials.

Agnew will accuse the White House of bringing "terrible pressures" on him to give up the vice presidency. He will blame Nixon for letting him down. In Agnew's view, Nixon feared Agnew would lose his fight to stay in office. This would have set a bad precedent for Nixon's own struggle against impeachment.

Agnew will also accuse then-Atty. Gen. Elliot Richardson of coveting the presidency for himself. Agnew believes that Richardson looked upon him as a rival and wanted him out of the way. Agnew will charge that Richardson threatened to put him behind bars. Agnew felt compelled to resign in exchange for a deal to keep out of jail.

In private conversations, Agnew has described the Nixon crowd as "ruthless." He has also hinted about personal pressures on him. Our own sources say that the Justice Dept. was holding sex charges over his head. The government prosecutors had received allegations that a Maryland contractor provided Agnew with a call girl in exchange for government favors.

Nixon's Vendetta: Sources close to Richard Nixon agree he was paranoid in the 1960s about the anti-war demonstrators. Shaggy hair was enough provocation to set him off.

Now we've learned that he hounded the shaggy-hair

generation not only at home but abroad. He assumed they were all drug users. So he brought enormous pressure on foreign governments to throw the book at American drug offenders.

The result was that young Americans, with long hair, were arrested and imprisoned from Bangkok to Bogota. Many were arrested for possessing only a pinch of marijuana. Others were jailed on purely circumstantial evidence which would never stand up in U.S. courts.

Often, their rights were blatantly violated. They were brutally beaten, tortured with electric prods and thrown into pig-sty prisons. Today, more than 1,800 young Americans are still stuck in foreign prisons.

Most of them could have been shipped home instead of convicted abroad. The British government, in similar circumstances, arranged for its citizens to be deported.

But Nixon didn't want these youthful offenders deposited back in the United States. They were deliberately left to the vagaries of the foreign legal systems. In fact, the Nixon administration actually helped to finance some of the foreign police who hounded the long-hair Americans.

President Carter is changing the Nixon policy. The State Dept. has now instructed its consulates to attempt to get small-drug offenders deported to America. Orders have also gone out to our embassies to protect the rights of imprisoned Americans.

Film Capital: Washington is in competition with Hollywood as one of the world's film-making capitals. The studios are hidden in the granite compounds of government. But they contain \$2 billion worth of equipment, employ 23,000 camera crewmen and produce \$500 million worth of film each year.

These government movies aren't going to win any Academy Awards, unless an award is created for the most boring movies. Films have been made on every conceivable subject from soil to soybeans.

The Agriculture Dept. sent a film crew all the way to French Guinea to film a movie about "Killer Bees." The officials wanted to show that the bees aren't as vicious as they have been portrayed. It cost the taxpayers \$10,000 to tell the bee's side of the story.

But we've got news for the government movie makers. We've just seen a private memo to President Carter. White House aides are questioning the huge outlay for films that few people ever see. There will be some cutbacks in government movies.

Broken Promise: Most federal employees are like the three monkeys who see no evil, hear no evil and speak no evil. But there is a special breed who expose waste and wrongdoing. They are called the "whistle blowers."

Some take their evidence to Congress. Others come to us. They usually demand confidentiality. They know what happens to a whistle blower who dares to make public charges.

He may be transferred to some far-off location. Or he may be stripped of his title and staff. He probably will lose the little privileges that used to go with his job. Suddenly, he also starts receiving bad efficiency reports. In some cases, these add up to charges that are brought against him.

Whistle blowers have no legal protection. Last year, Jimmy Carter made a campaign appeal for honest government. He proposed legislation to protect federal employees who expose malfeasance, misfeasance and nonfeasance.

But the proposal never got beyond his campaign speech. Last March, he received a letter asking him to intervene in the case of a Defense Dept. auditor, who charged that his audit reports had been tampered with to protect a major company. So far, there has been no response from the White House.

The whistle blowers still have no protection.

"I had an uncle once who made love by the church bells, and he'd be alive today if that firetruck hadn't gone by."

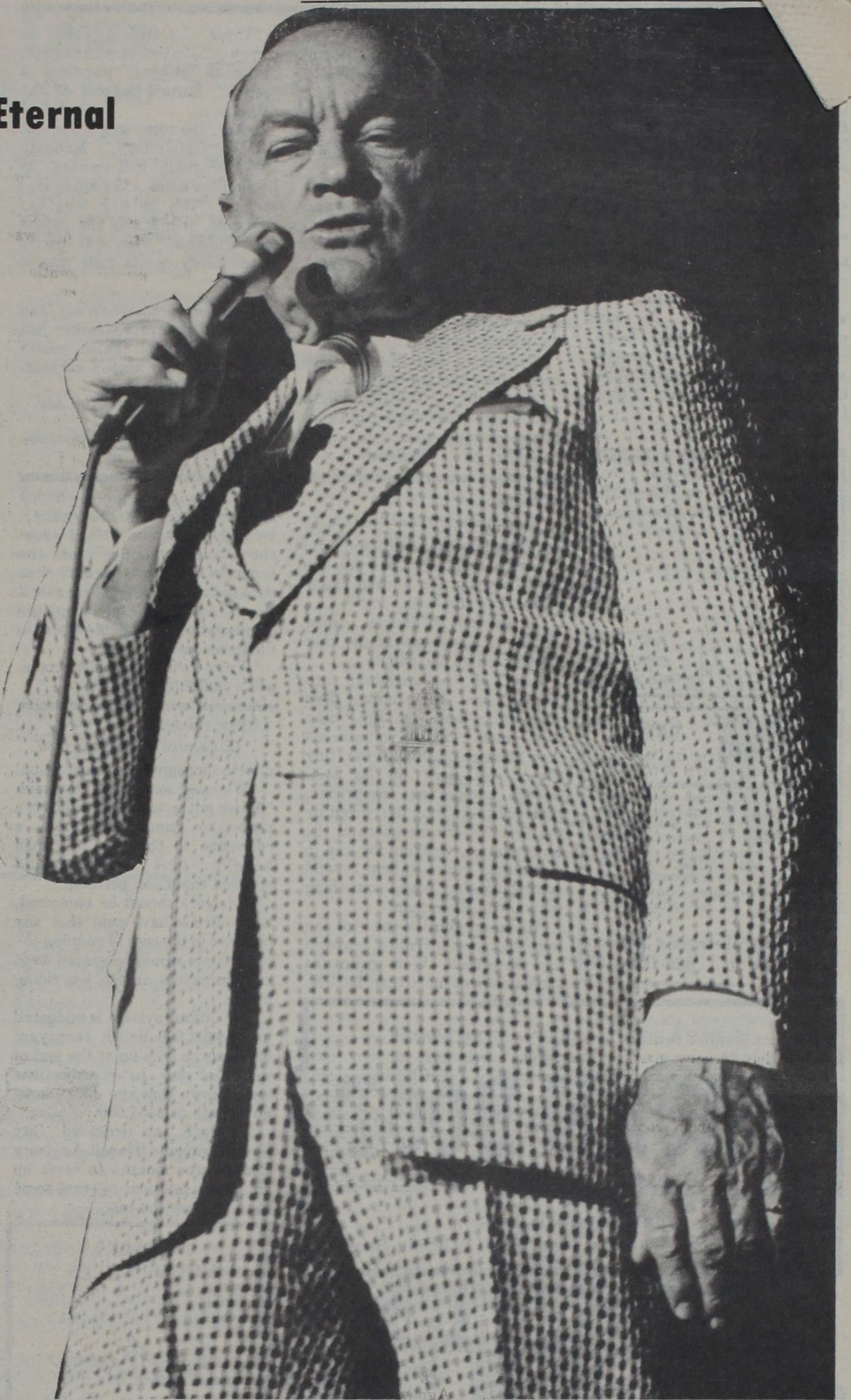

The girl from Arkansas clapped along with Bob as Miss Texas got



a saxophone from the Texas Tech Ensemble (the Arkansas girl thought they were real good) and played "Night Train" and "Yakety Sax." Played 'em fine, too. Mighty fine.

The girl from Arkansas loved Bob: she clapped and joined

The Weather as News — Even to the Veteran Newsman

Fat drops plunking on the windshield. Wind—out of the southwest—picking up the dust. Clouds rolling over the ground like a grey-black canvas shutting out the sun. You look up and you search ...

"Oh, God, not this time. Please ... just rain ..."

Don McBeath sits at the counter in the KSEL-Radio newsroom. He drags on a Benson-Hedges menthol with the studied boredom one professional reserves for another. The "I seen it all" posture. The hand with the cigarette falls casually on to crossed knees.

Still, he looks at the box on the map. The room is full of maps. Before 8 p.m.—two and a half hours away—the Weather Service says there'll be a tornado in the box that reaches from the Permian Basin to Kansas. There probably will be, too, he knows, because the weather boys have to be pretty certain about it before they'll put

out the advisory. Otherwise Washington calls them on the carpet.

Raining pretty good outside. Weather wire clatters. McBeath knows the bells will ring if it's anything more important than the Anchorage currents.

"This one's nothing. Tops're too low. Just a West Texas thunderstorm. Better not be anything more, I gotta catch a plane to Dallas at 7:30 ..."

Bells ring. 5:25 p.m. Tornado warning for Lubbock County. The television McBeath monitors runs a streamer across the bottom of the tube. McBeath rips the wire and eases into the electronic cockpit with microphone nudging his face. He presses the intercom that links the newsroom to the disc jockey.

"Bruce, how much ya got left on the record?" McBeath calls, "Thirty seconds? Minute? Minute-thirty?"

Bruce doesn't know for sure. "Well, see if you can find a break-in."

Bruce interrupts the record. McBeath's voice drops, as the electronic intro flashes out. "This is the KSEL News Center. A tornado warning has been issued for Lubbock County ..."

McBeath has been watching the winds and the rains for three years, even taking a meteorology course at Tech to augment the knowledge he has picked up about that most routine, yet most absorbing, news story—the weather.

Maybe it was the 1970 tornado that made us so sensitive to the weather. Maybe it is because the flat land offers no barriers to the rolling thunderboomers. Maybe it's because the weather can be so necessary yet so damaging, that it's watched warily, like an ex-wife at a dance with another man. Maybe it's because we've yielded to media hype: "Make 'em need us," one news director advises his crew.

For whatever reason, weather is news, with the controversies

attendant to any interpretation of events.

"You're going to do a story on KSEL?" one of the station's competitors asked, "They've been scaring people to death for years." McBeath echoes the charges, but directs them at a television station. "They issue a warning on their own."

McBeath is complimentary of the local weather service, especially this year, when, he says, "their batting average has been good."

"Initially we read what the weather service puts out," McBeath explains, "Right or wrong that's the best we got."

"We'll get accused of scaring people to death, but that's the weather burua. I'm not going to tell people to seek shelter, unless the weather bureau puts out. I'll tell 'em the facts—that it's moving in their direction—but seeking shelter, that's their business."

The rain continues. Pea-size hail. Golfball size in the southwest. McBeath, surrounded

by electronics in the cockpit, shakes out a Benson-Hedges as he describes the tornado observed by Amarillo radar near the Lubbock Regional Airport.

"Skip the headlines, Bruce," McBeath intercoms as the record resumes, "I'll be in and out for the next half hour."

McBeath rankles at some of the imperfections of the system. For instance, he urges, Lubbock County includes 900 square miles, and a tornado warning for the county could unnecessarily alarm city of Lubbock residents when other areas are more directly affected. In his discussion of the then-present warning, McBeath is careful to point out that the endangered area is the northeast quarter of the county.

"You have to apply a little common sense," he notes.

Another weather reform he'd like to see is a rating system for thunderstorm intensity.

As the rains continue, reports of street flooding crackle over the

 police monitor. Fire reports, first at O.L. Slaton Junior High (unfounded), then at Grace Baptist Church (well-founded). McBeath runs his hearing from scanner to scanner.

Phone rings. McBeath talks for a few moments, then hangs up. "That's my wife," he shrugs. "After three years in this town, she's decided to worry about the weather."

"We get the accusation that we're cryin' wolf," he says earnestly, "Skip (Watson, KSEL News Director) feels that we have an obligation to tell people. What they do with it after that is their business."

Still he argues, better to cry

wolf than to see one. "All you have to do is blow one off, and somebody's going to get killed."

"Streets are like rivers..." scanner barks.

"Engine Six and Engine Nine are stalled out in high water ..." fire department frequency.

Watson, departing from his child's birthday party, and reporter Keith Williams call in street reports. Watson from the fire. Williams about street flooding. McBeath has already ad libbed reports from what details he could glean from police and fire department radios.

"Gimme a level," McBeath orders over the two-way.

about what has happened. He views the calamity as a job-like test, bringing the church closer together in its faith.

He quoted 2 Samuel, third chapter: ... "whatsoever the king did pleased all the people."

Many of the members are helping now to rebuild. Two professional builders, Jim Camp and James Taylor, volunteered their services to help the tiny church get back on its feet. George Lampe, an electrician, replaced the wiring destroyed by the fire. All are members of the congregation, working for free in community effort to help rebuild something they love, something that needs their help.

About one-third of the roof had to be replaced, including supports and sheetrock. Weir estimates the damage at more than \$10,000.

Weir, standing amid the debris in a carpenter's bib, dusty, dirty, holding a hammer, talked about the "great people" of the congregation giving up their free time to help the church. He saw it all as an effort to bring the congregation closer together in Christian fellowship.

"We're trying to build a people, not a building," he said.

efforts through the transit union. "We need something," he said, "All we got to look forward to is a place to come to work"—a reference to the lack of fringe benefits that Sterling said spurred the union petition.

If drivers should be unionized, city officials have said that any increase in the cost of running the bus system would be passed on to city taxpayers or the bus-riding public.

The Citibus system is budgeted for a \$404,000 deficit taxpayers will have to pick up at the end of this fiscal year. Later projections have shown that the deficit may go as high as \$554,000.

In April, an irritated City Council gave its Transit Advisory Board three months to come up with some solutions to erase some of the excess red ink.

New 'Law Firm' in Town

Legal Services of Lubbock Aids Poor

A "law firm" on the 16th floor of the Metro Tower is out to prove that laws aren't written just for rich people and that the poor tenant and the poor consumer have rights, too.

But this law firm isn't like many law firms. It's Legal Services of Lubbock, federally funded through the Legal Services Corp. in Washington, D.C. Its services are available to help the poor, the underemployed or the people

units in surrounding communities.

Any negotiation to send Lubbock firetrucks back into the county is a "dead duck," Bass notes. Commissioners have bolstered the volunteer fire units, and appear satisfied with their performance.

Another problem was the county's withdrawal from the city-county health department, in exchange for taking on the then-city-county welfare department. While that eased the load on commissioners, it still left the county without a comprehensive health plan, Pct. 4 Commissioner Alton Brazell notes.

Shaw adds that the contractual arrangement—the county contracts for a sanitarian as well as vector control from the city health unit—may not afford the "respectability" of a shared services approach.

"A contract doesn't give it the stature of being a well-integrated program," Shaw suggests.

Ironically, mosquitoes — the prime target for the council-court contract last week — have long symbolized the strain between the two bodies. County mosquitoes fly into urban areas without regard to city limits signs, the argument went.

Bass mailed figures on mosquito and rat control cost to Shaw in April, but Shaw dealt directly with Tom Grimshaw, the health unit administrator, to hammer out the contract.

Both Brazell and Shaw say they'd like to brainstorm the possibility of resurrecting a joint health unit, but the liason committee is if not dead, on the critical list.

"I've been with Rod a couple of times," Brazell says, "and we'd run into the mayor. Rod would say we sure ought to get together for a meeting, and they mayor'd agree, but nothing would come of it."

Bass says that the council "hadn't felt the need" for a meeting. "Things are going along pretty smoothly."

McAlister, who says he'd like to see full membership of both groups meet, declares, "There's a feeling on the council that they want to stay away from the shared services approach" in favor of the contractual solution.

Both Bass and Shaw acknowledged that getting the committee together provided tough scheduling problems. "It seems like when I mentioned it (a meeting) to the mayor, he was going out of town," Shaw says. Adds Bass, "Rod got tied up in the jail suit."

with governmental benefits through legal tangles.

"People have rights they don't even know about," said Carla Crisford, a recent graduate of the Texas Tech law school, serving as community educator until she is formally licensed. "People have been oppressed for so long they're not aware of all the rights they have."

Crisford said the bulk of Legal Services cases have been in the area of family relations—"wills, divorces, paternity suits, child support and child custody."

But she noted that the agency could become involved in landlord-tenant disputes, repossessions, evictions and substandard housing cases.

"We can represent people before any governmental agency," she added. This allows clients to have legal expertise on their side when dickering over food stamps, welfare payments or social security problems.

While Legal Services can not represent persons accused of crimes, the attorneys may represent people in workman's compensation claims or other "fee generating" disputes if two local attorneys have refused to help the prospective client.

Crisford said that the group hopes to eventually become involved in "changing the conditions of poverty" through more political representation. "We're telling clients how they can use us to become involved in the democratic process."

Legal Services, organized in Lubbock by the Fort Worth office, is staffed by two full-time attorneys and a part-time lawyer who can help poor people. Crisford will join the legal staff when licensed, and she noted Legal Services hopes to have five full-time attorneys by the fall—including a full time director of the center.

Crisford said Legal Services has broken the language barrier for poor Mexican-Americans who can find Spanish-speaking professionals at every level of the attorney-client relationship — from initial interview through whatever legal aid is necessary.

Legal Services was established under the Office of Economic Opportunity in the mid-1960s, but because of opposition from the local bar association, matching local funds could not be found to start an office in Lubbock. In 1975, Congress passed the Legal Services Act, which provided for total federal funding.

explained, "I was getting my supply from a local wholesaler, but his supply is depleted—no one knows where to get it anymore."

Said one store manager, "I get a supply of over 1,000 units and they'd be gone within three hours." Another said, "At least 15 kids come to the store everyday asking for the stuff."

For kids like Clifford, son of Dr. and Mrs. Victor Igal, business boomed, at least for awhile. Space Dust took assumed names like Pop Rocks, Star Dust and Space Rocks. "Kids bought it in boxes and would sell it for an outrageous price—some as high as \$1.00," explained Robin Cottrell, store saleswoman.

The demand for the product was getting so out of hand that some stores limited the amount of the candy an individual could buy. That didn't stop anyone.

That's when the rumors began to fly. Like, it was taken off the market because it explodes in the packet during hot weather. Or the ingredients cause cancer.

The truth is, according to Kaufman, the product is still being tested in Arizona and other states, and will be placed on the market, most likely, after testing is completed. It is true the candy is heat sensitive, and melts in hot weather causing the carbon dioxide to be released. But that won't keep the product off the shelves.

As for cancer, the FDA is fully familiar with the product and it's perfectly safe, said Kaufman. The rumors are perhaps traceable to the imagination of children—children who no longer can get a little "magic".

Children like Clifford. He doesn't care where it came from or even what it's made of. He's just plain addicted to it. "I love it," he explained. "It starts fizzing and popping in your mouth the more you swallow the bigger the explosion."

And it's those explosions that have caused quite an explosion around town. Said one store owner, "I'm sick of Space Dust—if the kids weren't insane before they took it, they are now."

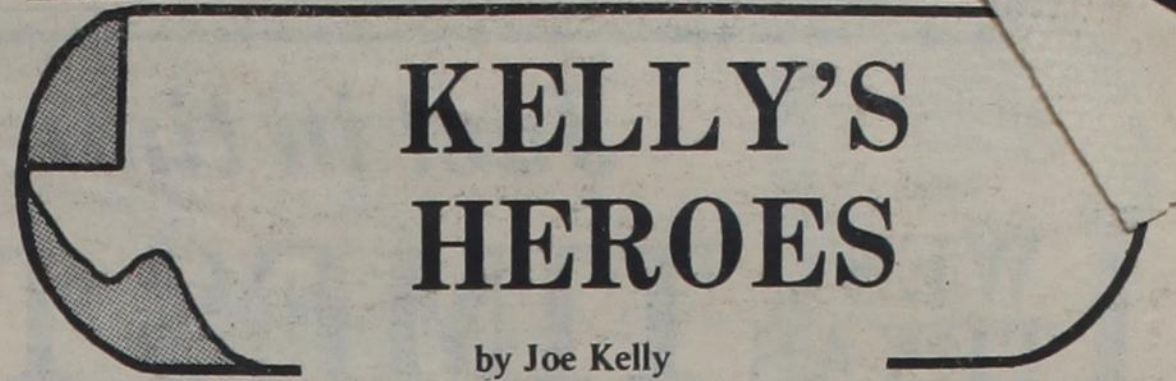

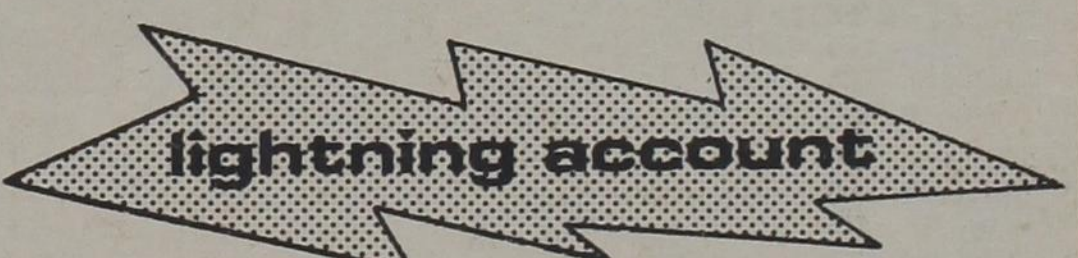

Lubbock Council Examines 'How Does Our City Grow'

Annexation. It means different things to different people. To some, it means becoming part of the city, eligible for city services; to others, it means having to pay more taxes. To some it doesn't mean anything, just something else for the City Council to do.

Thursday, the council will have a public hearing on the annexation of approximately 720 acres, from 98th to 114th Streets and from Indiana to University Avenues. The hearing will be at 1:30 p.m. in the Council Chambers at City Hall.

Something a little new will happen this time. City Manager Larry Cunningham and City Director of Planning Jim Bertram have drawn up an outline, a "checklist" for the council to look over when considering new property. The purpose is to set a standard for annexation, to look for the same things every time.

The three-page outline includes such things to be checked as the existing conditions of the property, the projected conditions of the property when fully

developed, annual operations and maintenance costs, how the land will be used, estimated annual revenues, the effect on growth patterns, and the Planning and Zoning Commission recommendation.

The Planning and Zoning Commission recommendation is another new Cunningham idea. The commission is concerned with long and short term growth of the city, and Cunningham thinks it should issue an opinion. The commission's role would be one of review and comment, without the power of veto.

Neither of the ideas have been officially adopted by the council, but they received widespread approval in last week's work sessions.

"I think it would be real helpful," Councilman Allan Henry said, referring to Planning and Zoning Commission advice. Presently "the people responsible for developing the land have no input in bringing it in."

"I think it will better co-ordination between the planning process and annexation process," Henry said.

"I think the council was in agreement (at the work session) that it would be a good idea ... their experience would be helpful," Councilwoman Carolyn Jordan said. "It would give us more input to make a wise decision."

Since 1970, the City of Lubbock has annexed eight and one-half square miles, the most recent addition last year with a little less than one square mile added.

The new annexation request came from Leroy Elmore, a prominent Lubbock realtor, in a letter to the council considered at the May 26 meeting. At the hearing, pros and cons for annexing the area will be weighed, and the council will listen to any concerned citizens who wish to speak to the issue.

In order for an area to be annexed, the proponent must make a request for a public hearing, either in person or by letter to the council. The council, if it decides to grant the hearing, sets a date and time, and publishes notice of the hearing in the local press. The council does

not try to contact the individuals in the affected area, Cunningham said, because of the difficulty involved.

The council considers, among other things, the difficulties of providing city services to the area to be annexed. A city has to provide full services within three years of annexation, and the city has to weigh if the additional taxes from the area will justify the expense of moving the services out there.

Developers generally favor annexation, because the people who buy their homes want city services—fire protection, for example. After a contractual squabble between city and county governments, the Lubbock Fire Department no longer responds to most calls outside the city

limits. Volunteer fire-fighters, or the departments in neighboring towns like Slaton or Wolfforth, have to be relied upon. The city also provides police protection, a sewage system, street paving and picks up your garbage. Electricity is provided by two companies, the independent Southwestern Public Service and city-owned Lubbock Power and Light.

Businesses and home-owners with their own utilities are generally opposed to annexation, because of the burden of city taxes. If a home or business has wellwater and electricity, is secluded enough to feel fairly secure from criminals and is unconcerned about fire hazards, annexation would just cost them more tax dollars, Cunningham said.

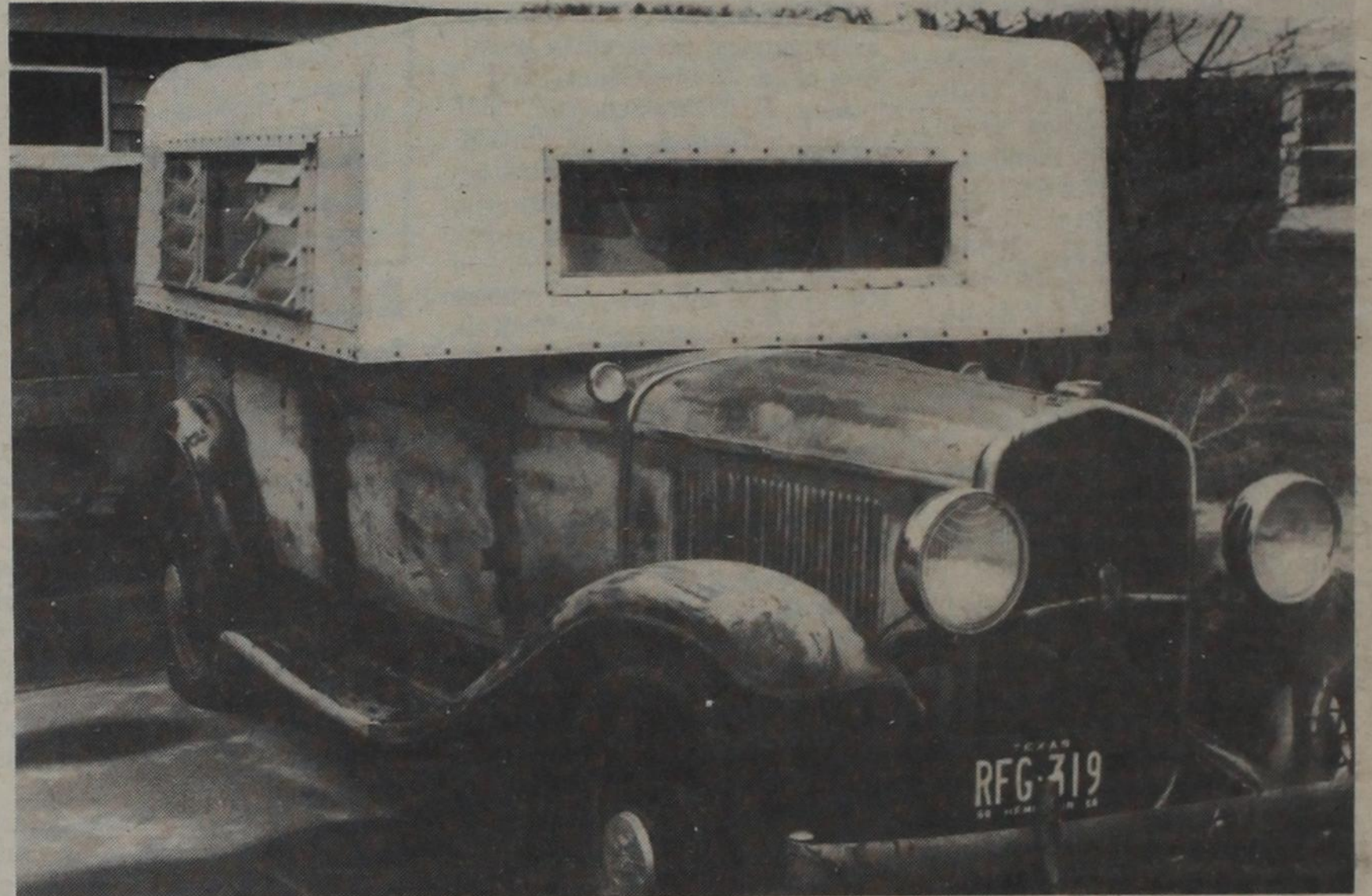
