

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UNANSWERED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT KENNEDY

Here are but a few facts revealed in a book, "T h e Unanswered Questions About President Kennedy's Assassination." This book is written by Pulitzer Prize-Winning author, Sylvan Fox, city editor of the New York World-Telegram, a Scripps-Howard newspaper.

Perhaps the most dramatic example of what has since been blamed entirely on police carelessness was the shooting of Oswald by Jack Ruby. This particular killing will go down in history as one of the most unusual slayings of man today.

Once again, we can read this incident in two ways. Either it is another demonstration of monumental ineptitude, and this the way the Warren Commission, chooses to understnad all of these incidents, or it was part of a scheme that reaches its culmination with Oswald's death.

More than seventy policemen weer present when Oswald, hancuffed to one detective on his right and flanked by another on his left, came into the basement of the station.

Despite these precautions, Ruby managed to enter the basement and at precisely the right moment, stepped from the crowd with a .38 caliber revolver in his hand and fired a single shot, which proved to be fatal, into Oswald's abdomen.

Not one of teh more than seventy policemen or the thirty or forty newsmen who witnessed the killing were able to tell the Commission how Ruby. got into the basement. Ruby himself said he entered simply by walking down one of the ramps.

The Leopards really had their hands full Saturday in the "Canyon" when they tangled with the unwarranting "Wildcats of Marlin, Texas." With Ten straight tiedowns, the Leopards came very close to a tieup for the season, but as usual the magnificent linemen came trhough

In the first half of play the Leopards haft several sustained drives and punctured Marlin's line several times. In the first half it seemed that our backs were reluctant about holding the ball and ufmbled twice deep in Marlin's territory, once on the 15 and again on the 20. The half ended on a 7-0 note.

In the second half of play the Leopards were stunned when the Wildcats opened a hole in the line and Louis Mitchell went 45 yards to the five when ended in a two-yard puncture by Ras Dancy, the quarterback. On the next series of downs the Leopards were not able to contain the ball and weer forced to punt on fourth. With a fired-up Marlin ball club freezing the spectators to their benches, a bad snap from center never reached Lyday the punter, and Robert Fisher picked it up and went for a score, but the play was nullified. Instantly like a cat protecting her kittens, Coach Garnett sprang to the playing field to the officials, ·and the play was nullified because the ball was dead when it touched the groudn.

In the closing minutes of the third quarter and the opening minutes of the fourth, a fired-up Marlin rallied for another score with Dancy at the helm and the lights showed a 14-7 score.

Realizing they were tasteing defeat the Leopards racked-up 24 more

points with only 1:04 left to play. The first attack to tie the score went to the strong end, Raynard Manning who took a 58 yard pass and drug two Marlin defenders 15 yards to the end zone. Then with a fine interception by Donald Smith, the Leopards set up a score on the next play from scrimmage with a dazzling run by Reginald Robinson to the golden door to make it 21-14. All of the conversion attempts were good by James Harris. Marlin, not being able to move the ball, was forced to punt into a fast return by Larry Bedford to set up the next TD. Seeing that the end sweeps would work, the Leopards struck again with a power sweep, seeing Reginald Robinson at the throttle fighting his way 38 grueling yards to paydirt. This brought the score to 27-14 in the closing minutes of the game.

Marlin tried to get back in the game quickly with a pass and linebacker Robert Childs picked it off to set up the next TD plunge by fulback Vester Nelson to make the final score 33-14.

UNANSWERED QUESTIONS ABOUT THE ASSASSINATION OF PRESIDENT KENNEDY

Here are but a few facts revealed in a book, "T h e Unanswered Questions About President Kennedy's Assassination." This book is written by Pulitzer Prize-Winning author, Sylvan Fox, city editor of the New York World-Telegram, a Scripps-Howard newspaper.

Perhaps the most dramatic example of what has since been blamed entirely on police carelessness was the shooting of Oswald by Jack Ruby. This particular killing will go down in history as one of the most unusual slayings of man today.

Once again, we can read this incident in two ways. Either it is another demonstration of monumental ineptitude, and this the way the Warren Commission, chooses to understnad all of these incidents, or it was part of a scheme that reaches its culmination with Oswald's death.

More than seventy policemen weer present when Oswald, hancuffed to one detective on his right and flanked by another on his left, came into the basement of the station.

Despite these precautions, Ruby managed to enter the basement and at precisely the right moment, stepped from the crowd with a .38 caliber revolver in his hand and fired a single shot, which proved to be fatal, into Oswald's abdomen.

Not one of teh more than seventy policemen or the thirty or forty newsmen who witnessed the killing were able to tell the Commission how Ruby got into the basement. Ruby himself said he entered simply by walking down one of the ramps.

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



Rustin, a former aide of Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., is presently an executive of the brotherhood of Sleeping Car Porters, headed by A. Phillip Randolph Rustin was also one of the directors of the 1963 March on Washington.
