Estacado High School Matadors Named Number 42 In Nation "Only Texas School In-3A Named"

The Estacado High School Matadors made history last week when they were ranked Number 42 in the ESPN Rise Powerade Fab 50, which ranks the top 50 boys basketball programs in the United States of America.

The Matadors was ranked Number 1 in Class 3A by the Texas Association of Basketball Coaches. At this report, the Matadors are 23-1, 2-0 in 2-3A District play.

Estacado debuted in the poll at Number 42, coming in three spots ahead of Houston Westbury Christian, which is the team the Matadors defeated 55-51 in the championship game of the FiberMax Caprock Classic recently. Estacado is the only Class 3A team in Texas ranked in the poll.

Other teams in the poll include Number 13 Garland Lakeview Centennial, the only team to beat Estacado this year, Number 32 Flower Mound Marcus, Number 38 LaMarque and Number 40 Dallas Kimball.

President Obama Gives Exciting Speech In Tuscon

Tucson, Arizona (CNN) -- In between consoling those touched by Saturday's Arizona shooting and warning the nation against politicizing the tragedy, President Barack Obama delivered some good news in his address at a Tucson memorial event on Wednesday, January 11, 2011.

Rep. Gabrielle Giffords of Arizona has opened her eyes for the first time since being shot four days ago.

"There is nothing I can say that will fill the sudden hole torn in your hearts," Obama said. "But know this: The hopes of a nation are here tonight."

The attack killed six and left Giffords fighting for her life.

Obama told a crowd of thousands that he visited Giffords earlier on Wednesday and that her husband told him that shortly after the president left her room, "Gabby opened her eyes for the first time."

"Gabby opened her eyes so I can tell you know she knows we are here, she knows that we love her and she knows that we are rooting for her through what will undoubtedly be a difficult journey," Obama said.

Obama and his wife, Michelle, sat next to Giffords' husband, astronaut Mark Kelly, throughout the ceremony, and next to Daniel Hernandez, an intern in Giffords' office who tended to the congresswoman's wounds after she was shot.

Obama called Hernandez a hero in his speech Wednesday, though Hernandez rejected that description in an earlier speech at

the memorial event.

The president spoke at the University of Arizona's McKale Memorial Center, which the school said held just under 14,000 people on Wednesday night, with an overflow crowd of 13,000 outside.

Obama spoke about Giffords and briefly eulogized each of those killed in the attack before moving on to warn Americans against assigning blame for the attacks to those other than the gunman.

"At a time when our discourse has become so sharply polarized

-- at a time when we are far too eager to lay the blame for all that ails the world at the feet of those who think differently than we do -- it's important for us to pause for a moment and make sure that we are talking with each other in a way that heals, not a way that wounds," Obama said.

"Scripture tells us that there is evil in the world, and that terrible things happen for reasons that defy human understanding," he said. "... Bad things happen, and we must guard against simple explanations in the aftermath."

"What we can't do is use this tragedy as one more occasion to turn on one another," he said later.

Obama's speech was frequently punctuated by applause and cheers from the crowd, at times seeming to belie the somber reason for the memorial.

But Obama sounded an uplifting tone, saying of the victims: "Our hearts are broken by their sudden passing. Our hearts are broken -- and yet, our hearts also have reason for fullness."

positive input into the lives of boys and girls, and be able to create a world of works so they can begin to make decisions of what they want to do with their lives."

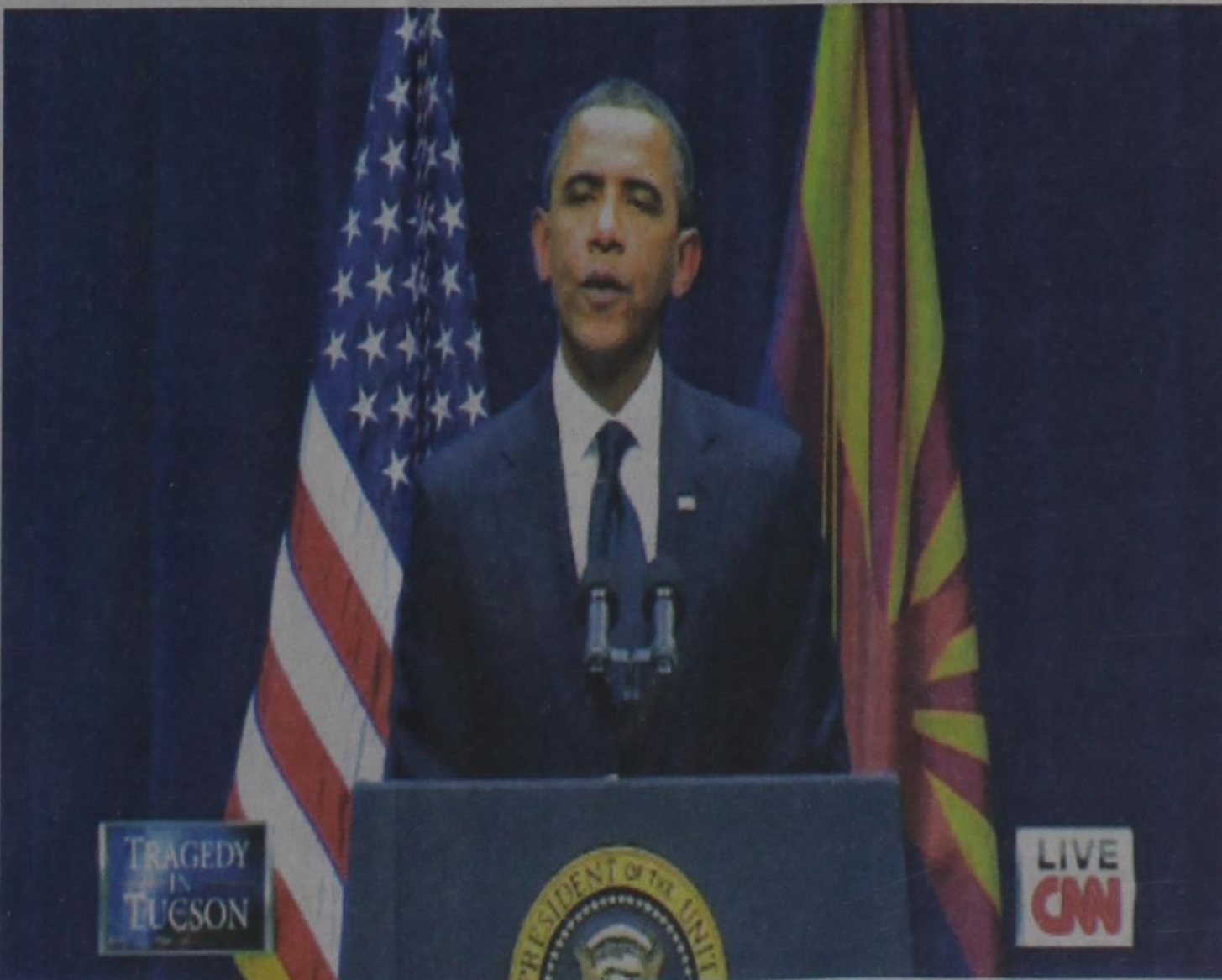

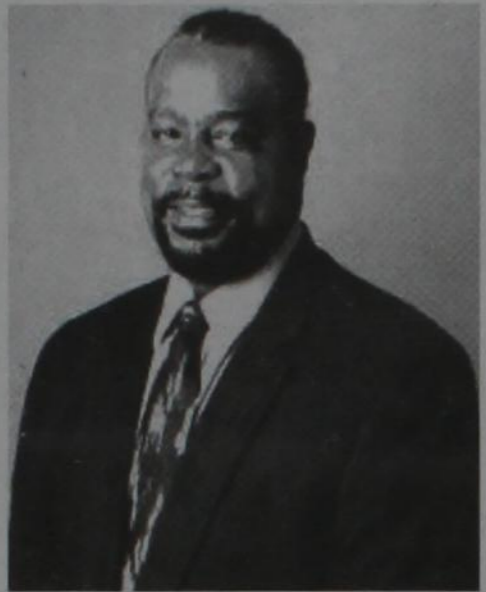

president praised those who tackled the gunman as he stopped to reload and the medical staff who treated the wounded.

"These men and women remind us that heroism is found not only on the fields of battle," Obama said. "They remind us that heroism does not require special training or physical strength. Heroism is here, all around us, in the hearts of so many of our fellow citizens, just waiting to be summoned -- as it was on Saturday morning."

"It was pretty much what the nation needed to hear at this time," said Lorenzo Cotton, a retired architect who attended the speech.

"Tucson is a great place with a lot of great people," Cotton said, adding that Obama's speech "put Tucson back in a positive light. It is a community and it is a place where we all get along and, together, care for each other."

From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith Does the Constitution Allow Discrimination Against Women?

Does the United States Constitution allow discrimination against women? According to Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia the constitution does not bar government discrimination against women period!

According to "Outside the Beltway" Supreme Court Justice Antonin Scalia is once again stirring up controversy with an interview that he gave to a California Lawyer in which he said that there is no Constitutional bar against government discrimination against women or anyone other than African Americans for that matter:

In 1868, when the 39th Congress was debating and ultimately proposing the 14th Amendment, I don't think anybody would have thought that equal protection applied to sex discrimination, or certainly not to sexual orientation. So does that mean that we've gone off in error by applying the 14th Amendment to both?

Yes, yes. Sorry, to tell you that...But, you know, if indeed the current society has come to different views, that's fine. You

do not need the Constitution to reflect the wishes of the current society. Certainly the Constitution does not require discrimination on the basis of sex. The only issue is whether it prohibits it. It doesn't. Nobody ever thought that that's what it meant. Nobody ever voted for that. If the current society wants to outlaw discrimination by sex, hey we have things called legislature and they enact things called laws. You don't need a constitution to keep things up-to-date. All you need is a legislature and a ballot box. You don't like death penalty anymore, that's fine. You want a right to abortion? There's nothing in the constitution about that. But that doesn't mean you cannot prohibit it. Persuade your fellow citizens it's a good idea and pass a law. That's what democracy is all about. It's not about nine superannuated judges who have been here too long, imposing these demands on society.

In rebuttal Marcia Greenberger, founder and co-president of the National Women's Law Center, called the justice's com-

ments "shocking" and said he was essentially saying that if the government sanctions discrimination against women, the judiciary offers no recourse.

"In the comments, Justice Scalia says if Congress wants to protect laws that prohibit sex discrimination, that's up to them," she said. "But what if they want to pass laws that discriminate? Then he says that there's nothing the court will do to protect women from government-sanctioned discrimination against them.

And that's a pretty shocking position to take in 2011. It's especially shocking in light of the decade of precedents and the numbers of justices who have agreed that there is protection in the 14th Amendment against sex discrimination, and struck down many, many areas on the basis of that protection."

Greenberger added that under Scalia's doctrine, women could be legally barred from juries, pain less by the government, receive fewer benefits in the armed forces, and be excluded

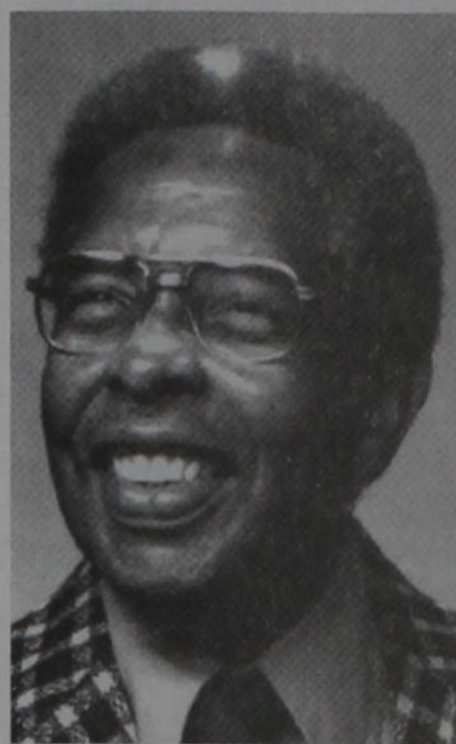

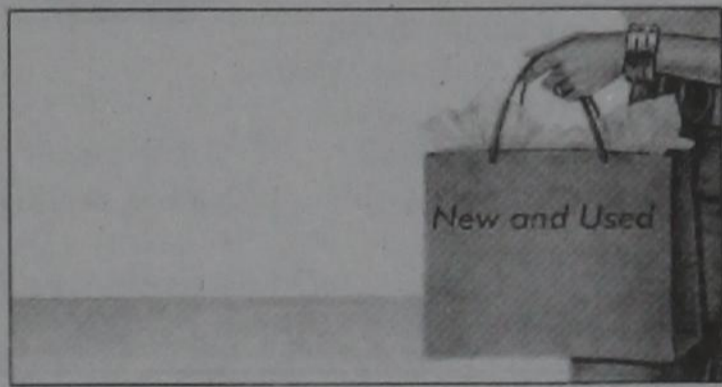

The Lena Baker Story: Moral minority

Racial injustice, poverty and morality

Writer/director Ralph Wilcox's debut, *The Lena Baker Story*, is an earnest and sympathetic portrayal of racial injustice in 1940s southwest Georgia. The film is based on the true story of Baker (Tichina Arnold Hates Chris"), an African-American who, in 1945, became the first and only woman sentenced and executed in Georgia's electric chair for killing a white mill owner (Peter Coyote).

As with most stories involving race and history, Baker's tale proves far more complex, involving alcoholism, poverty, criminal justice, interracial relationships and interdependency. Wilcox tries gamely to cover all of these issues, and if he fails to sustain the narrative through its 140-minute duration, it isn't for lack of effort. He worked from a 120-page book on Baker by one of her relatives and threads a biblical David and Goliath metaphor throughout the film. The drama feels like an endless cycle of abuse, resignation and defeat, with a sprinkling of defi-

ance and redemption to break up the proceedings.

The movie itself is a bit of a David and Goliath proposition, too. Wilcox became a filmmaker a few years back, started his own production company and today is the director of the Southwest Georgia Film Commission. (The movie was filmed in nearby Colquitt.) More local talent came from a crew that included film editor Hunter M. Via of Atlanta's Lab 601, which handled the post-production work.

Lena Baker was born in 1901 into sharecropping near Cuthbert, Ga. She tried early on to break free from the cycle of poverty, initially turning to prostitution and alcohol, which earned her a 10-month stretch in a brutal Georgia prison workhouse. No sooner does she return home to her mother (a steely Beverly Todd) than a local (Chris Burns) practically forces her to work for his hobbled drunk of a father, Eliot Arthur (Coyote). The old man remembers Lena from her drinking and whoring days, and exploits both

as he forces himself on her and ultimately makes her his sexual slave.

Arnold infuses a sense of dread and hang-dog sadness into her role, her perpetual frown only momentarily broken by pockets of happiness as when she gets to see her children. (How the three kids have come to be in her life is one of a few irksome plot holes in Wilcox's script.)

Coyote's Eliot is so besotted that it's hard for him to generate much beyond general loathing, which is a shame considering the actor's trademark wild eyes. Booze hangs so heavily over their scenes together that at times it feels like a racist Sid and Nancy.

The abuses go on under the nose of the frustrated town sheriff (Michael Rooker). Rooker's a savvy casting choice; he hit the scene in 1986 as the title killer in *Henry: Portrait of a Serial Killer* and stirred up audiences as one of the Klansmen killers in 1988's *Mississippi Burning*. Here he

plays against his villainous image. Just as Lena feels trapped between her captor, her alcoholism and sense of duty to her family, the sheriff walks a fine line between community and family pressures. For a man with a badge and a gun, this sheriff is remarkably impotent.

Lena's plight is no surprise. Her independent spirit is increasingly deadened by alcohol and the dual inability to challenge a sexual and racial oppressor. For a black woman back then, could "no" ever really mean "no"?

The Lena Baker Story tries to be a story of redemption and courage, although the payoff, given the results, might not satisfy the average viewer. Baker's 2005 pardon is too little, too late. Perhaps in Wilcox's eyes, we take what we can get.

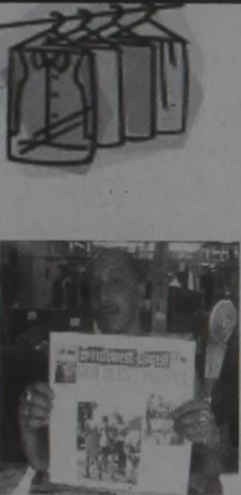

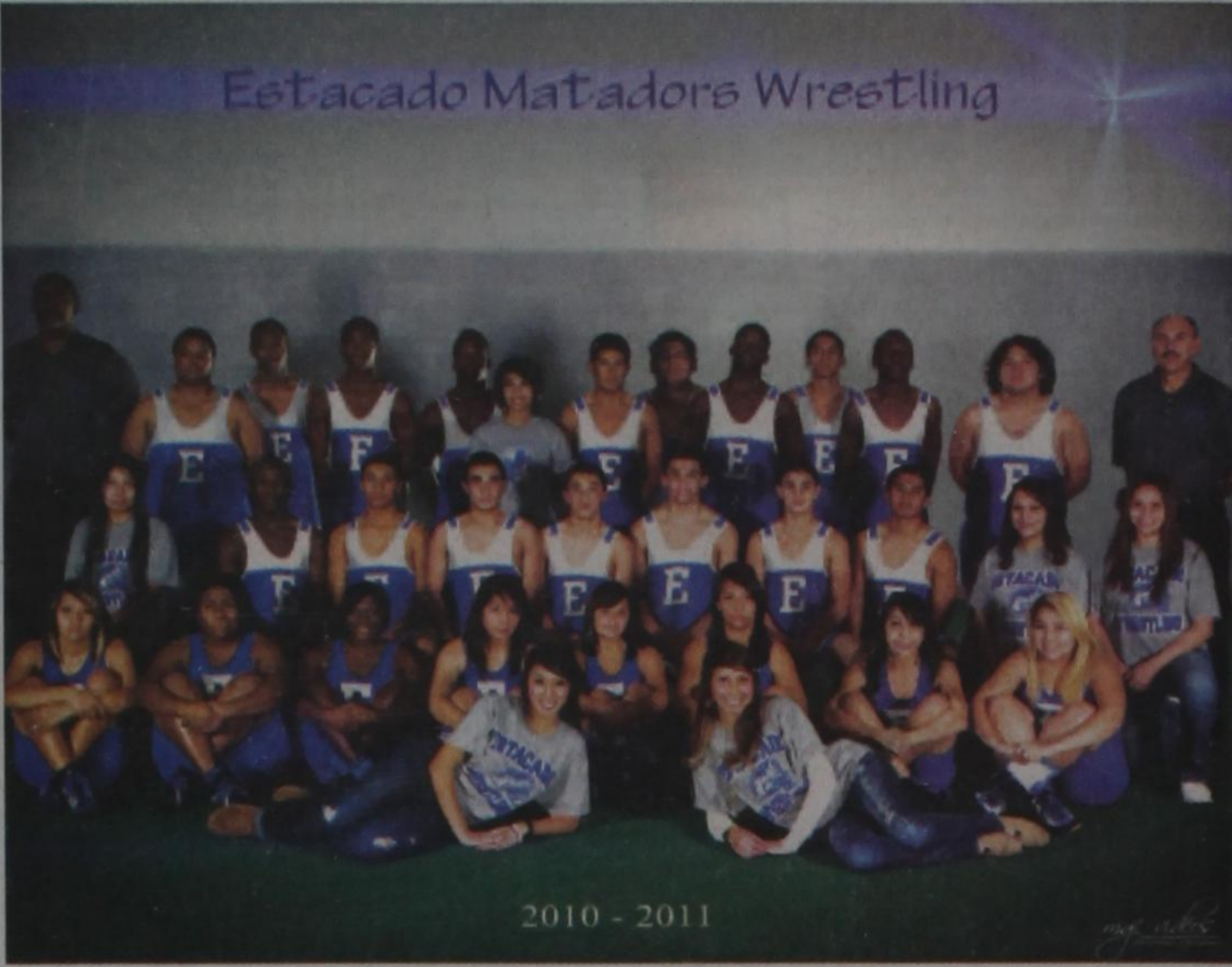
