Dunbar High School International 2012 All Class Reunion Honored

If you would ask local citizens of Lubbock, "Did Dunbar come back home? The answer would be a resounding "Yes!"

More than 500 hundred former graduates, students, friends and family of Dunbar High School came home for the 2012 All Class Reunion X. This exciting event took place July 12 through 15, 2012 at the Lubbock Memorial Civic Center.

The highlight of this reunion, which was for class 1923 through 1993, was the banquet held Saturday evening, July 14th. This banquet was dedicated to Dr. Charles Henry and Mrs. Celestine Hatchett Kyle.

Dr. Henry, owner of Henry Enterprises, where he is an education/management consultant at present time, received his first teaching position at Dunbar High School in 1956.

A native of Palestine, Texas, Dr. Henry graduated from Lincoln High School in 1953. He was a 'Cum Laude' graduate with a BS degree from Texas College (pre-med), Tyler, Texas in 1956. In 1971, Dr. Henry received a M. Ed. in 1971 from Texas Tech University in 1971. He continued his career by receiving a Ed.D from Texas Tech University in 1974.


He has also been an Adjunct Professor, Wayland Baptist University; an Instructor/Curriculum Coordinator, Txas Tech University School Medicine. Dr. Henry has had an opportunity of serving as a teacher at Lubbock and Coronado High Schools.

Over the years, D. Henry has worked with Upward Bound, United Way of Lubbock, YMCA, Lubbock Black Chamber of Entrepreneurs, Lubbock Board of Health, and Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc.

Among the many honors bestowed upon him include: Distinguished Alumnus of Texas College, Phi Delta Kappa Service Key Award, First African American male to complete doctorate at Texas Tech University, First African American faculty member at Texas Tech University School of Medicine, and First African American to serve on Lubbock Chamber of Commerce Board of Directors.

Mrs. Kyle was a honor student and president of her 1938 graduating class of Navasota Colored High School. She was the first female to excel in the game of tennis.

Celestene was introduced to

tennis by Professor Stroud, a coach and teacher who came to Navasota from the state of Colorado. Professor constructed the first tennis court for Navasota Colored High School students on a playground located across from the school.

After a few months of some very hard work and daily practice sessions, Celestene became an excellent tennis player. Many times during her high school days, she entered and won the Class 3-AAA Tennis Singles Competitions held at Prairie View A&M College. She won her first championship competition during her sophomore year, the second championship her junior year, and her third championship her senior year. Celestene and her doubles partner, Alice Marie Jones, also won Doubles Championship each year they competed in championship matches at Prairie View.

In 1938, Celestene received a full scholarship in tennis from Tillotson College in Austin, Texas. During her first year after high school, she entered the Southwestern American Tennis Association Competition and defeated the very good reign-







From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith "Hit The Road Newt!"


Don't Come Back No More! No More! No More!







White Church Refuses To Marry Black Couple In Crystal Springs, Mississippi

(CNN) -- Hurt. Devastated. Crushed.

Those are words an African-American couple used to describe how they felt when they were forced to change the venue of their wedding because of their race.

"Because of the fact that we were black, some of the members of the congregation had got upset and decided that no black couple would ever be married at that church," Charles Wilson told CNN on Sunday night, July 29, 2012.

"All we wanted to do in the eyes of God was to be man and wife in a church that we thought we felt loved. What was wrong with that?"

Black couple denied wedding in church Charles and Te'Andrea Wilson had planned to marry this month at the First Baptist Church of Crystal Springs in Mississippi, but were asked at the last minute to move.

Their pastor, Stan Weatherford, made the request on behalf of some congregants who didn't want to see the couple married there, according to CNN affiliate WLBT. He performed the ceremony at a nearby church.

"If it was such a minority of people, why didn't the majority stand up and say, 'in God's house we don't do this?" said Charles Wilson.




