Lubbock ISD exploring school consolidation

Lubbock ISD administration has begun meeting with faculty members and parents at several schools being considered for consolidation in the 2011-12 school year. The proposal includes moving Tubbs Elementary students into Wolffarth and McWhorter Elementary Schools and consolidating students from Arnett Elementary into Wright Elementary. Additional consolidations being considered for 2011-12 include moving students from Alderson Middle School into Dunbar Middle School. The consolidation of these schools would save the district \$4 million annually in 113 students operating costs.

Of more importance, the district administration believes more educational opportunities are possible in larger schools.

Support personnel such as nurses, counselors, principals and other support services are not always available to students

on small campuses. In addition, teachers have no one with whom to collaborate for best teaching practices when they are the only teacher in a particular grade level or subject. Extra-curricular and co-curricular activities are also difficult to provide in small schools. Even after consolidation, the enrollment in these schools will be far below the typical enrollment of elementary and middle schools in neighboring school districts. The chart below shows the small size of these schools and the cost of education per student.

No teacher will lose their job as a result of the consolidations. A planning committee comprised of parents, teachers and administrators will be formed to assist in leading a smooth transition should the consolidations be approved by the Board of Trustees. Cost savings from the consolidation are primarily realized through a reduction in the number of buildings to operate and maintain.

Preliminary discussions have also begun regarding a consolidation in the 2012-13 school year of Parkway and Bozeman Elementary Schools. If the consolidation occurs, the students from Parkway and Bozeman would relocate to the Alderson building after some minor renovation. Parent meetings on that proposal are scheduled for April.



On March 11, 2011 an opinion by Gail Collins of the New York Times caught my attention. The opinion was titled "Eye of the Newt." The title seemed strange and raised my curiosity. The following opinion of Newt Gingrich was written.

Well kiss my grits this intellectual and immoral jackass want to be the president of the United States because he think he is now morally clean and intellectual superior to President Obama!





President Obama Officially Launches 2012 Re-Election Campaign

WASHINGTON - President
Barack Obama formally
launched his re-election campaign Monday, urging grassroots supporters central to his
first White House run to mobilize again to protect the change
he's brought over the past two
years.

The official start of his second White House bid, in the midst of three wars, a budget fight with Congress, and sluggish economic recovery, comes 20 months before the November 2012 election.

"We've always known that lasting change wouldn't come quickly or easily. It never does," the Democrat said in an e-mail announcing his candidacy to more than 13 million supporters. "But as my administration and folks across the country fight to protect the progress we've made - and make more - we also need to begin mobilizing for 2012, long before the time comes for me to begin campaigning in earnest."

He told them he was filing the necessary paperwork with the Federal Election Commission, and directed them to his new campaign website where a launch video featured clips from supporters talking about their continued backing of the Democrat.


