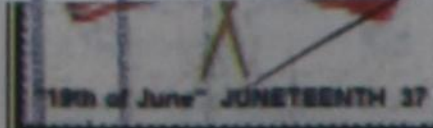

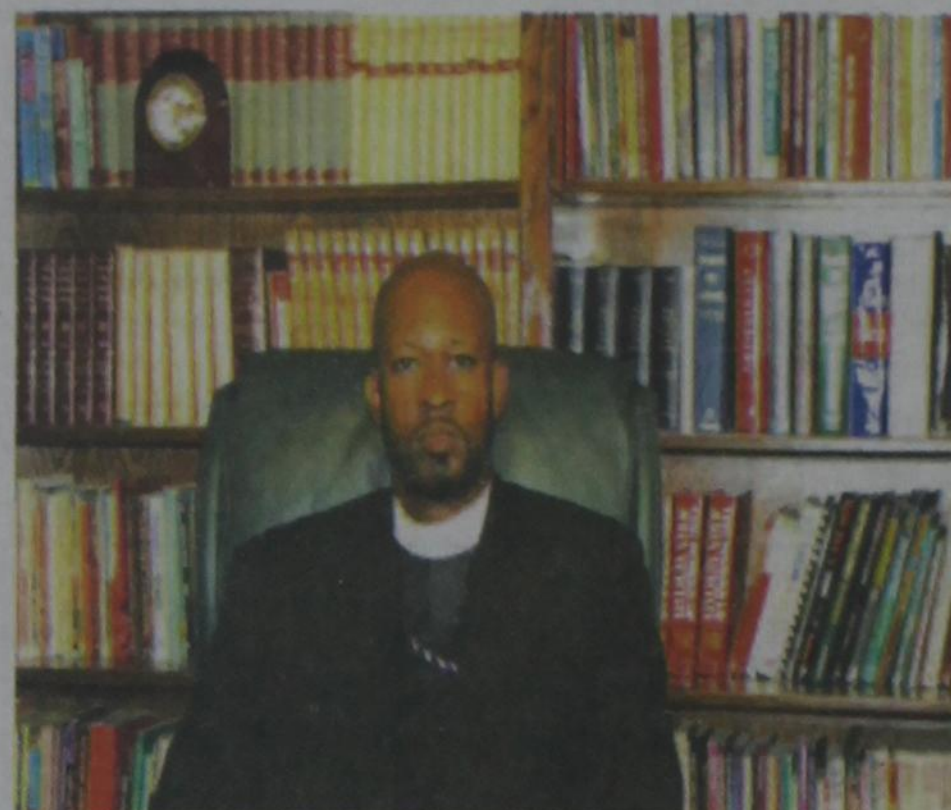

NEW BISHOP APPOINTED IN NORTHWEST TEXAS

BISHOP DESIGNEE WILLIAM H. WATSON, III, TO LEAD TEXAS NORTHWEST ECCLESIASTICAL JURISDICTION OF THE CHURCH OF GOD IN CHRIST

"To every thing there is a season, and a time to every purpose under the heaven" - Ecclesiastes 3:1

It is the dawn of a new season in Texas Northwest Church of God In Christ Jurisdiction. On August 30, 2012, Bishop Charles E. Blake (presiding Bishop of the Church of God In Christ) and the COGIC General Board designated William H. Watson, III, 45, to the office of Jurisdictional Bishop of Texas Northwest Jurisdiction, third in secession.

The COGIC is the largest Pentecostal church and the fifth largest Christian church in the U.S., with nearly five million members in the United States and 12,000 congregations. Texas Northwest Jurisdiction has 77 churches which serve the Amarillo area, Lubbock and the South Plains, Wichita Falls, Fort Worth, El Paso, Midland/Odessa, San Angelo, Brownwood, Pecos, Monahans and many other parts of West Texas. However, But that number is expected to increase. Bishop Designee Watson, III, succeeds his father, Bishop William Henry Watson, II, who passed away February 28, 2012. The senior Bishop Watson led TNJ 28 years. Bishop Jerry W.

Macklin, 2nd presiding Bishop of GOGIC, was appointed by Bishop Blake to be the interim Bishop of the TNJ during this time. Bishop Designee Watson stated, "Bishop Macklin provided stellar leadership during this period. I believe that it was God-ordained for Bishop Macklin to navigate us through this season." Also, noteworthy, Bishop Designee Watson III's uncle, J.E. Alexander, (deceased) was the first Bishop of TNJ.

To be sure, the passing of Bishop Watson has left a major void in TNJ and the global church, and Bishop Designee Watson III is acutely aware of the challenges facing the Jurisdiction. He said that his father's favorite Scripture, "Let the words of my mouth, and the meditation of my heart, be acceptable in thy sight, O LORD, my strength, and my redeemer," has sustained him during this difficult transition.

He said his first priority is to pay off Agape Temple, the Jurisul in their endeavors, faithful

Langston B. Williams, Jr. First African-American Graduate of FHS To Receive Doctoral Degree

Floydada High School 1972 graduate Langston B. Williams, Jr. holds the distinction of being the first African-American graduate of FHS to receive a doctoral degree. The basketball court provided the talented athlete, captain of the basketball team, All-District, All-South Plains FHS, a ticket to higher education via a four-year track and basketball scholarship at Wayland Baptist University, where he earned his undergraduate in physical education and history in 1976. While at Wayland, he was the recipient of the Roscoe Snyder Athlete of the Year Award, named to Who's Who in Colleges & Universities, voted Junior Class Favorite, and NAIA National semi-finalist in 440-yard hurdles in 1976.

Today, with more than 35 years experiences as a teacher, coach and school administrator, more than fulfills the hopes and dreams of most parents for their children, his achievements in part a tribute to the late Langston and Lou Annie Williams, his parents. His story and that of nine other scholars in pursuit of their Ph.D., is told in a book ti-

tled "In Their Own Words," scheduled for August publication.

Langston coached 20 years at Lubbock Monterey and Estacado High Schools before going to San Antonio where he was a head coach for girls and boys in track and basketball at Waco University High School, San Antonio East Central High School and Seguin Lifegate Christian High School.

The United Supermarkets Pharmacy Clinical Services division will offer vaccination clinics to local businesses, where the pharmacy team will come directly to the business facility to minimize inconvenience and time away from the office. 3. Practice "cough etiquette." Turn your head and cough or sneeze into a disposable tissue or the inside of your elbow if you don't have a tissue. Coughing or sneezing onto your hands will spread germs to everything you touch.
4. Use a reusable water bottle.

Avoid using public water fountains, which may become contaminated with germs, especially during cold and flu season.

5. Avoid close contact with people when you are ill.

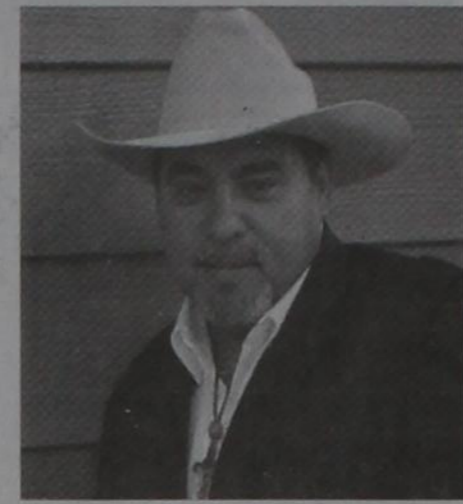

Jurisdiction's headquarters located at 4510 Ave. Q in Lubbock, TX. There are no immediate plans to restructure the Jurisdiction, but the Bishop will start the process of filling vacancies within the jurisdiction - some in which he currently serves: Jurisdictional Secretary, Chief of Staff, and Superintendent of the Lubbock #2 District. "We'll take a look at and evaluate all positions at some point in time, no major rush," he said, noting, "We want to be careful, making sure all positions are filled by people who are qualified." Bishop Designee Watson said God speaks of the good and faithful servant, and "I believe people should be good at what they do and faithful to the Jurisdiction, faithful to their local church.

The Bishop's long-term goal is to offer assistance to pastors by establishing a commission to implement health insurance, retirement benefits, a commission for church growth and continuing education programs for members of the clergy who want to participate. He also wants to optimize technology and social media as Kingdom building tools. "Technology is part of my educational background, it's a drawing card, of sorts, for the young generation," the Bishop said. "We want to use the technology available and seek out new things the church has not been using to reach the unsaved."

Bishop Designee Watson did not accept this new assignment without first allowing God to establish him as a foot soldier in local, district and Jurisdictional ministries. He has served as Minister of Music/President of the TNJ Music Department and Regional Coordinator of the COGIC International Music Department. In 2000, his passion for youth was noticed and propelled him to President of the Youth Department for TNJ. He served in that position for seven years. During this period, he became intricately involved with the International Youth Department as Website Administrator and Regional Director, where he continues to work diligently.

He was appointed as pastor of Alexander Chapel COGIC in 2003 where he continues to serve faithfully along with Jurisdictional duties of Secretary and Chief of Staff. In 2009, he was appointed Superintendent of the Lubbock #2 District. Later that year, he received an appointment from Bishop Charles E. Blake to the position of Vice President of Fiscal Affairs of the International Youth Department in which he currently serves.

Unarguably, Bishop Designee Watson's spiritual pedigree is both extensive and extraordi-

nary. Still some in the Jurisdiction had reservations about his appointment to the office of a Bishop - likely because of his age, he believes. The 45-year-old Bishop, whose ministry spans more than 25 years, said we must remember: "Jesus did the bulk of His work in his 30s, the bulk of his work in his 30s." That said, Bishop Designee Watson III is confident that his appointment is God-ordained. "I sought this position, not for the title, but for the work I believe still needs to be done," he said. "I believe the Lord has anointed me for this position. Not that I won't make mistakes, but I believe the Lord has anointed me to fill the void left by my father's passing."

The Lubbock native credits his parents for positively shaping his life by giving him spiritual and nurturing guidance. He said his mother, Arnela Watson, "is a woman of quiet strength and courageous faith." He said she encouraged him in his desire to become the new Bishop. "She knew that I could do the work of a Bishop. She really encouraged me from that standpoint." Working closely with his father also gave him unique insights into the affairs of TNJ. "I've been trained up in seeing the good and the bad and have learned lessons from watching others and from my own mistakes and successes," the Bishop said. He said he will also draw strength from the pastors and others in the Jurisdiction, adding that the Jurisdiction is not run by one person. "We have very wise pastors who will filled positions and help us navigate through areas where we might have some challenges." Continuing his father's legacy is imperative. Bishop Designee Watson III said he wants to "continue providing an atmosphere of the Lord moving and operating in the Jurisdiction; we want to continue a spirit of unity. I want to carry on the spiritual foundation of the Church of God In Christ, just as Bishop Alexander did, just as my father did." He said he will also remain committed to the National Church and Presiding Bishop Blake. The young Bishop has also pon-

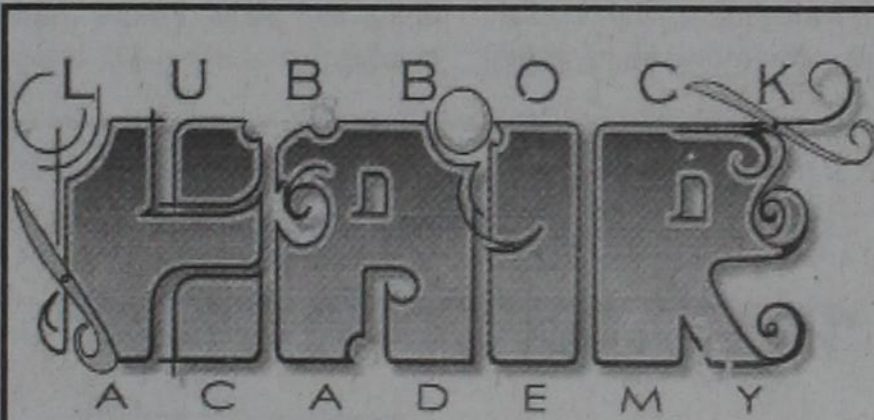

The "Fiscal Cliff" will Hurt all of Us

Ignorance is not bliss. However, there are too many of us who are ignoring the discussion about a legislative maneuver known as "Sequestration". This is also known by a more descriptive term - "Fiscal Cliff" (Federal Reserve Chairman Ben Bernanke coined this phrase). Unless this is updated, all financial rules and budgeting will come to a halt on December 31, 2012. Let me tell you about a few of the programs that are at risk.

One program is the funding of our military. If we don't fix the Fiscal Cliff, our forces will have to let go about 300,000 military personnel. America would then have the smallest troop size of our military since 1940. That was tempting to Nazi Germany and Imperial Japan and led to World War II. Putting troops in the unemployment lines and reducing our ability to defend ourselves may quite easily put us into a serious war with a major opponent.

Another vital program is the Transaction Account Guarantee. This FDIC program, which is fully paid for by the banking industry, provides insurance for checking accounts. If Congress fails to extend the TAG coverage beyond its December 31 expiration, approximately \$1.4 trillion in deposits will become uninsured overnight. This could be devastating to our local communities. Imagine all the small business owners, households and others having its cash flow at total risk. Abruptly ending this deposit coverage will disproportionately affect minority owned businesses and their local lenders. Small banks make more than 60 percent of all small business loans and use this coverage to support local lending. Because our slow economic recovery remains fragile, allowing this coverage to expire carries the risk of countless unintended consequences for small businesses that are just regaining their footing from the past recession. A high percentage of our banks will close their doors and reduce capital access even further.

Besides the banking industry all corporations and individual stock owners will lose value. If the Fiscal Cliff occurs the current tax rate on stock dividends will increase from 15% to over 49%. This will quickly cause personal investors to put their money somewhere else than straight stock purchases. Wall St. will do the same. The value of many of our corporations, pension plans and local governments will drop immensely. Plants, jobs, retirements plans will begin to shrink and many will go away. Many headquarters will leave this nation for a more business friendly environment. Every community and household will feel this pain.

New Development In East Lubbock



There is a new development across the street from Estacado High School. It will be called Courtyard at King's Dominion. It will have 66-units (one of those units is for a full-time/live-in resident advisor). The apartment homes will be complete in Winter 2013 (Jan/Feb).

The development is a HUD sponsored Section 202, meaning that tenants have to be age 62 or higher and be able to live independent (it's not assisted living). All units except the resident advisor's unit should be 500 square foot/one bedroom apartments. Rents are based on the tenant's income (no more than a third of a tenant's income can be paid for housing related costs).

Mitchell said Smith was one of the School of Pharmacy's earliest faculty members and has helped build a strong foundation.

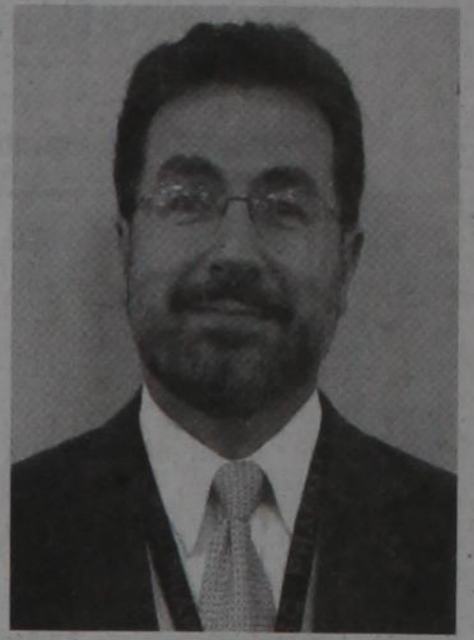
"Dr. Smith came to our university in 1997 as professor and chair of the Department of Pharmaceutical Sciences to help build the School of Pharmacy," Mitchell said. "He is an outstanding teacher and has mentored many graduate students and postdoctoral fellows over the years. He will build on the successes of his predecessor, Dr. Arthur Nelson, and our distinguished faculty and staff. Smith as a University Distinguished Professor in 2007, and in 2009 he was named the sixth recipient of the Grover E. Murray Professorship, the highest honor TTUHSC bestows upon its faculty members.

In 2011, Smith was one of 13 faculty members from the Texas Tech University System to receive a Chancellor's Council Distinguished Teaching and Research Award, the highest recognition given to faculty members.

Smith's primary research interests are in drug development and delivery to the central nervous system for the treatment of brain tumors, strokes and neurodegenerative diseases. The NIH, the Department of Defense Breast Cancer Research Program and the Cancer Prevention Research Institute of Texas fund his research.

Smith has authored more than 100 journal and book articles and is a fellow of the American Association of Pharmaceutical Sciences. He served on several NIH study sections, numerous grant review panels and the Amarillo American Heart Association board. He was chief organizer of the Cerebral Vascular Biology 2003 International Symposium and was elected chair of the Gordon Research Conference on Barriers of the Nervous System in 2012.

He was inducted into the Educator's Hall of Fame by the San Antonio Chapter of the National Sorority of Phi Delta Kappa, Inc. in 1999.

Langston was named All-Star Boys Basketball Coach in 2002 by the Texas Association of Private and Parochial Schools, coaching the North Blue team to a 104-97 victory.

In 1994, he earned a master's degree in education and mid-management certification in school administration at Trinity University in San Antonio.

His doctoral degree in education with a concentration in organizational leadership was awarded in 2010 at University of Incarnate Word.

Not only has Langston succeeded in education, but he is a bi-vocational minister, serving as a pastor 25 years out of 27 years spent in ministry.

He is founder of Magnolia Christian Church and Magnolia Christian Academy for grades 1-6. Located in the historical Monte Vista neighborhood in San Antonio, the church is a 15,000-square-foot facility. 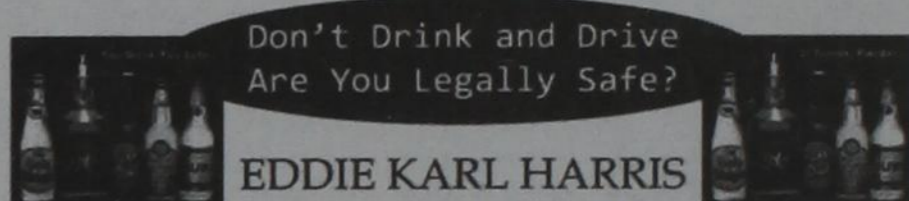
"We've got to get something done. As residents of East Lubbock, our properties are just as important to us as other parts of Lubbock," said another citizen.

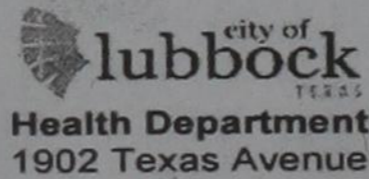
