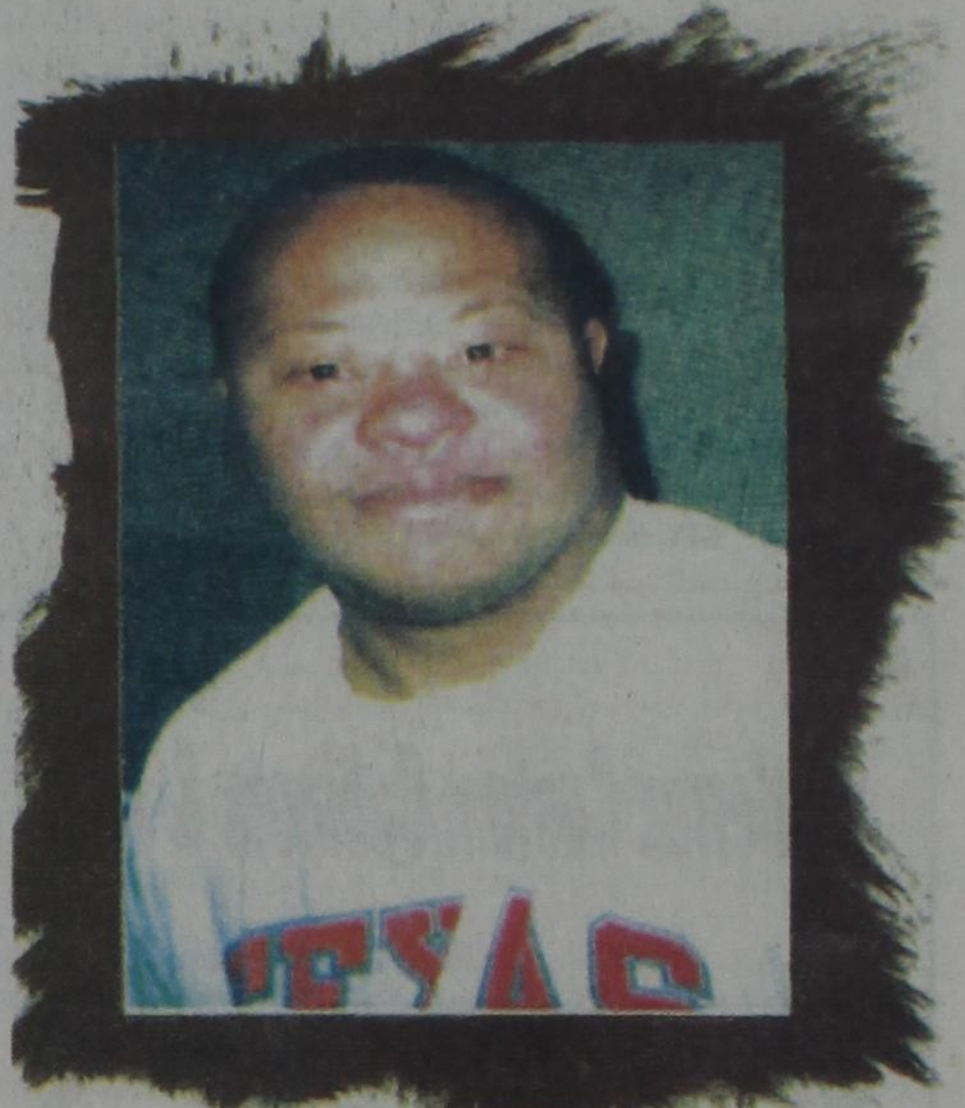
and Presentation of the Holy Bible was done.

Couple Sues Doctors For Allegedly Decapitating Baby During Childbirth

Arteisha Betts and Travis Ammonette, from Florissant, Missouri, have filed a lawsuit against two obstetricians after they allegedly decapitated the head of their baby boy during his birth. The couple also claims that the doctors tried to hide the error by shoving the child's body and severed head back in to the mom's birth canal.

Apparently, during the birthing procedure, the baby's head was first delivered vaginally, followed by his shoulders, then an

arm. However, due to the child's large abdomen (caused by some abnormalities), the doctors could not fully dislodge the baby vaginally. And so, in the process of tugging, they allegedly separated the baby's head from his torso. As a result, blood "shot out" from the newborn's neck in full view of his parents.

The couple is suing them for wrongful death and negligence, and is seeking unspecified damages.

From the Desk of Parson D.A. Smith
"Uganda Asians & American Asians"

Within that number were Uganda's Asians!

Rupal Rajani of the BBC Asian Network wrote the following title: Ugandan Asian: Life 40 years later. This story is akin to what could happen to African Americans in American if a certain elite group combine with the racist indentured (those who do not have the intelligent to know that they are indentured servants) who will have their way if the present Most of us who are African Americans that can remember some 40 or more so years ago know that Asians were expelled from Uganda by the then leader Idi Amin. It is written in the sands of time that Idi Amin was one of the most notorious of all Africa's independence dictators. He seized power in a military coup in 1971 and rule over Uganda for 8 years. It is estimated that he killed, tortured or imprisoned from 100,000 to half a million people/President is not elected to another term.

The writer expresses that he had serious thoughts of how life would have been for him if he had not been thrown out of his country? He noted that it left

him with a tougher question, that is "Why were we thrown out and -a difficult issue to confront-did we deserve it?"

The writer also noted that there were gross inequalities in the way Asians treated Ugandans blacks back then. We know he wrote that around 90% of the economy was controlled by Asians before 1972. So were they fair to locals, or did they "milk" the economy? Black Ugandans were so often less successful than the Asians that had settled in their own country. I am not so sure how comfortable that would have made me had we stayed put. I did not get a consensus on this. I never was going to, to be honest, he said.

When asked about the relationship between the Asian and black communities, he noted that some stated that things were good. He also noted that the hopes of Black Ugandans and Asians dreams were exactly the same.

The writer asked an elite Asian does he feel that he fits in, and more importantly, do his treat people equally? The answer to both questions was an em-

phatic yes. The Asians being question noted that he teaches his staff to be able to do what he does regardless of their color.

And toughing upon an old complaint about Asians in Uganda in the past, does "he give back" to the country? He answers that he does, most definitely. His wife even runs an orphanage to help young Ugandan Africans find new homes. The new wave of Asians immigrants coming directly from India have a better understanding of the country and the people and treat them fairly and equally, he feels. But is Uganda his home? "Not a permanent one," he says. "There is always the fear that what happen in '72 could happen all over again."

The question that lingers is: was the Asians "walking the walk" or just "taking the talk?" In this light, what is the moral of this story as it relates to White America in 2012? White America must remember that this land belonged to Native Americans. They must also remember that they captured and bought African Blacks from their own kings liken to General Idi Amin and other officials.

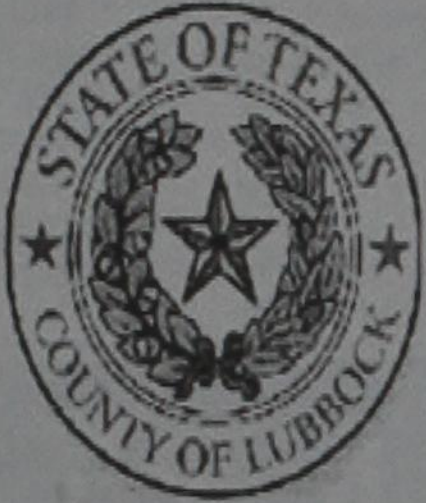

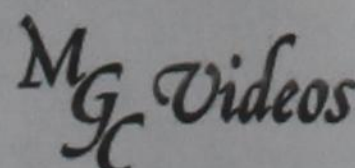

We're getting down to the wire in this year's race for the White House. In our digital world of sometimes dizzying 24/7 information overload, both political camps are relying heavily on media in its plethora of forms to reach you and influence your vote. As we draw closer to November 6, you are correct if you think the intensity of the political ads has increased. According to Nielsen data, this is especially true if you live in any of this election's nine key "swing" or "battleground" states - Colorado, Florida, Iowa, Nevada, New Hampshire, Ohio, Pennsylvania, Virginia or Wisconsin. Nielsen's summarized Designated Market Areas (DMAs) within each state show that year-to-date through the beginning of September; President Obama's reelection campaign has saturated those states with almost 230,000 ads, more than twice the ads from the campaign of his opponent, former Massachusetts Gov. Mitt Romney (87,000). The lone exception here is Wisconsin, where Gov. Romney's campaign leads by 561 ads.

How much influence do these ads actually have? Data shows that an effective advertising campaign in a swing state can mean the difference between victory and defeat on Election Day. It might be most interesting to watch which way Ohio goes, as no Republican presidential candidate has ever won the race without the assistance of this critical state's electoral votes. Thus far in Ohio, the margin of the number of ads is the greatest, with the Romney campaign running just over 17,000 ad units; and the Obama camp running nearly three times that amount - 51,000 ads.

Then there are the Presidential debates. At this writing,

Nielsen ratings show that an estimated 67.2 million people watched the first debate between President Obama and Gov. Romney. That was up 28% over the first presidential debate in 2008 between then-Senator Barack Obama and Senator John McCain. Eleven networks show

broadcast live coverage from 9:00 to 10:30 pm, while Telemundo aired coverage on tape delay.

To put our viewership of this year's first presidential debate in a different perspective, 111.3 million people watched the New York Giants beat the New England Patriots in the Super Bowl this year, making it the highest rated TV broadcast in U.S. history. So, the Super Bowl still reigns supreme.

As for the 2012 political conventions, according to Nielsen's analysis of both the Republican and Democratic gatherings, nearly as many people (57% of all U.S. Households or 65.4 million homes) tuned into at least one of those political events as watched the first presidential debate. That, however, is down from 64.5% (or 73.2 million homes) in 2008. Taking a look at the viewership of each of the speeches by each candidate (given on the final night of each convention), President Obama had a slight edge, with 13.7% of viewers to Gov. Romney's 12.5%. Breaking it down even further, both candidates were pretty much neck-in-neck with people over age 55. Almost 26% of this demographic tuned in to watch Gov. Romney, and 25% of the same demo watched President Obama's speech. Each party, of course, selected high-profile speakers to address their respective conventions; with the Republicans choosing veteran actor Clint Eastwood and the Democrats engaging former President Bill Clinton. The ratings results there: Clinton drew slightly more viewers across all demographics. However, viewership among males was closest, with 9.7% watching Eastwood's speech and 9.8% tuning into Clinton. Are you seeing again how much your choice of what you watch matters? It is as though you are "voting" with your remote (only in terms of TV though, not the voting booth. There, you have to show up in person).

The political "games" continue with the vice presidential debate, two more presidential debates and yes, intensified ads from both sides. In every column, I you all the many ways in which You Matter with every consumer choice you make. But, you matter more now than ever, and it does not matter whether you are blue or red. According to the recent African-American Consumers: Still Vital, Still Growing report, approximately 71% or 28 million of us are of voting age. So, whatever the color of your state, you've got the power. Make sure you use it on November 6.
