

New Federal Data: Blacks Are 4 Times More Likely To Be Arrested For Marijuana Possession Than Whites

According to the New York Times, new federal data via shows that Black Americans were nearly four times as likely as whites to be arrested on charges of marijuana possession in the year 2010. This disparity had grown steadily from ten years ago, and in some states, like Minnesota and Illinois, Blacks were around eight times more likely to be arrested than their white counterparts.

Drawn from police records from all 50 states including part of a new report that is the most comprehensive review ever of marijuana arrests by race and by county. The report is being released by the American Civil Liberties Union (ACLU).

"We found that in virtually every county in the country, police have wasted taxpayer money enforcing marijuana laws in a racially biased manner," said Ezekiel Edwards, director of the ACLU's Criminal Law Reform Project and the lead author of the report.

Researchers say the growing racial disparities in marijuana arrests were especially striking because they were so consistent even across counties with large or small minority populations. In other words, counties were few African Americans lived still

ing teacher salary will increase from the current salary of \$40,000 to a new starting salary of \$41,000 for the 2013-14 school year. The board was also briefed on the 2013-14 budget, which will be adopted at the June 27 meeting. Interim Superintendent Berhl Robertson, Jr., Ed.D. said, "I am very pleased that we are in a position to provide this increase to our teachers and employees. Our new starting salary of \$41,000 will help us attract the best teachers coming out of our local universities, and we know having a quality teacher in the classroom is integral to student success." "We are very appreciative to our legislative delegation for helping restore some of the cuts to public education from the previous session. With the steps we have taken to improve the efficiency with which we operate and the help of our state legislature to increase funding, we are positioned much better financially to meet the needs of our students," he added.





We also pay close attention to our skin, according the post. African-American consumers purchase skin bleaching products at a rate of a whopping 434 percent more than the general population. We purchase more hand lotion, body lotion and all-purpose skin creams than the general population: 54 percent and 40 percent respectively. Here's an instance where there are opportunities for marketers in some of these categories because there is opportunity for market growth, particularly in the suntan preparations category.

I have girlfriends who slather themselves with baby oil before baking in the sun - unprotected. Most of us now know (but still may ignore) that Blacks are not immune to sun damage - and that all skin can burn - this could be an opportunity for a widereaching education campaign for the companies that manufacture sunscreens and sunblocks. (Even if you're not afraid of sunburn or skin cancer, what about premature wrinkling or skin that could turn to a consistency that feels like leather from years of over-exposure? I'm just saying). As a matter of fact, now I can get a tan right in my bathroom without even being exposed to sunlight. I use gradual tanning lotions which have SPF already included. This way, I can protect my skin and have the luxurious bronzing color highlights that I want.

So, you see, beauty is in the eyes of the beholder. It is imperative that you choose companies who have your best interests, needs front and center. You've got to make sure you have nothing but the best with you on your pursuit of beauty. Please take this into consideration the next time you stroll down those beauty aisles. This time, you'll just be better equipped with additional knowledge in tow.

"It's really amazing," Hall of Honor board of directors chairman David Thetford said. "This was our third class, and you look at this class and it's an unbelievable group of athletes and coaches represented here. There are some big names and names that people will recognize. Some from way back, and some who were pioneers within LISD."

Leading the group are coaches Patty Jones of Coronado (volleyball), Curtis Gipson of Dunbar (basketball) and Damon Hill, Sr. of Dunbar (basketball, football, track), as well as the 1968 undefeated Estacado state championship football team. Among the historical feats accomplished by those four include:

- Jones was the first female high school University Interscholastic League-level coach hired by LISD and coached the first season of volleyball at the school after it was elevated from intramural to UIL status.
- Gipson led Dunbar to the 1965 Prairie View Interscholastic League title in 1965, then led the school to a state runner-up

finish in its second season of UIL status in 1968.

- Hill was the first athletic coach hired at Dunbar at a time when black schools were not allowed to play white schools within Lubbock. But Hill was a part of the old Monday Night Quarterback Club where coaches from Lubbock and Texas Tech would discuss the previous week's games, and Hill was routinely given gear and uniforms by Tech and Lubbock High
- The 1968 Estacado state championship team went 14-0 in its first season as a varsity sport at the school, competing as a junior varsity sqaud the year before.

"I've always said it's not about who you are but how you carry yourself, and some of my best friends are on that team," said Lubbock High assistant coach David Moody, a member of that 1968 team. "I wish I was color blind because they're a different color and it doesn't matter. I think (what the team accomplished) was huge."

The rest of the Class of 2013 has plenty of individuals and coaches who accomplished great things in their own rights — Larry Isaac (Estacado football), Johnny Tatum (Lubbock High football), Ron Reeves (Monterey football), Leigh Daniel Cordes (Monterey track and field) and Coronado baseball coach John Dudley.








George S. Lewis was born May 22, 1926 in Ben Franklin, Texas.
