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PICK UP YOUR FREE POLL TAX

The Citizens Registration League would like to call your attention that the Poll Tax is no longer required for those who wish to vote in Federal elections ONLY. Those who have paid for this year or who have received free exemptions, are eligible to vote in all elections, whether they be city, state, or federal.

Those of you who for various reasons did not pay your Poll Tax or receive free exemptions, can erase the shame by going to the Assessor and Collector of Taxes at the new Courthouse by Mar. 6, 1964 and obtain a receipt to vote in federal elections ONLY, free of charge....

Editorial

Lubbockites from 21 to 60 years who meet residence and other requirements but who failed to qualify as 1964 voters by the Jan 31 deadline by paying the state poll tax now have a second chance to claim part of their voting rights. Until Mar. 6, they can, if they are willing to bestir themselves just a little, qualify themselves to vote this year for President and vice President of the United States and for members of Congress.

It has been discovered here that only approximately 250 persons have registered here in Lubbock County. If there are any of you who would desire a Poll Tax---why not go down to your tax assessor---collector's office. To get on the poll lists, you have to register and obtain a poll tax receipt from which has been stamped to show that the tax was not paid.

All that it costs you to register is an effort.

There are some of you who didn't pay the Poll Tax because of the monies involved. How many by indifference....

Those of you who fail to take advantage of the restricted second chance given them by adoption of the 24th Amendment to the United States Constitution will, in effect, be saying that they do not attach any value to their citizenship rights.

One can presume they had just as soon live in Russis or some other totalitarian country. Either that, or they want all the benefits of freedom but are not willing to assume any of the responsibilities.

The deadline for obtaining registration receipts is Mar. 6. The time is rather short---so don't you think you should register---NOW...

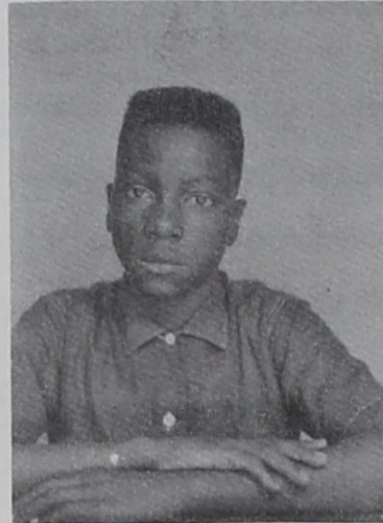

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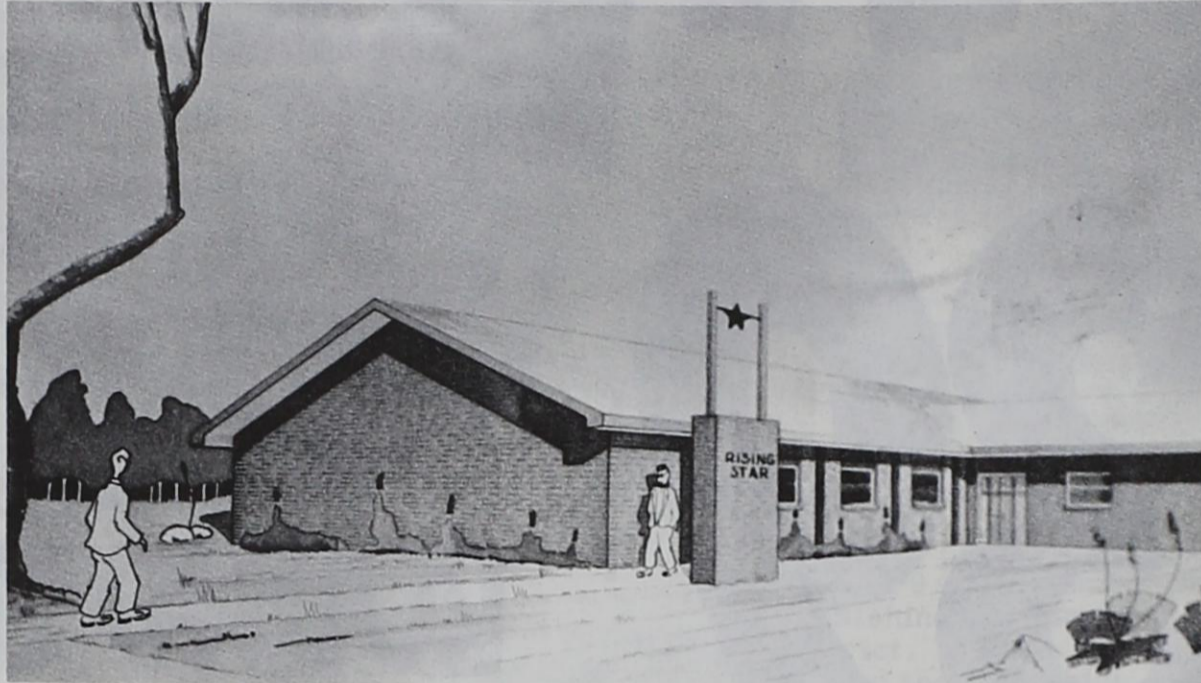

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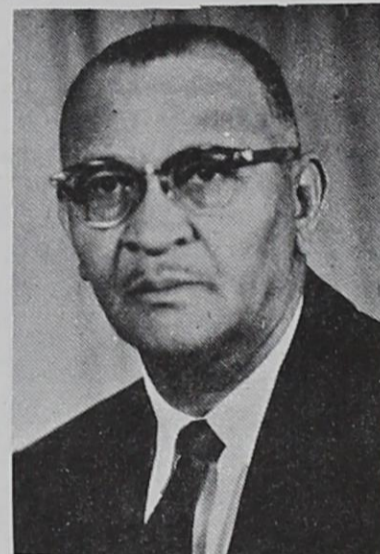

Up again, down again, out again, above, below, on top, on the bottom-- this is the way the West Texas State Buffaloes have carried on all year with the .500% mark on its season record. Right now the Buffs are back to the even point at 9 won, 9 lost. The Buff's split a pair over the weekend and head into the stretch drive with six toughies to go. West Texas takes to the road again this weekend to meet Phillips Oilers and Oklahoma City on Friday and Saturday.

The Buffs won over McMurry at Abilene 76-70 Saturday and lost to Midwestern at Wichita Falls Monday, 71-60. It took a great shooting performance for West Texas to beat McMurry, behind 39-47 at halftime, the Buffs hit on 13 of 18 last half field goal at-



ell, James Strahan and Frank Schaffer each had 16 points. The Buffs Mitchell and Schaffer blocked over 8 shots and worked the boards hard. The Buffs ended up with a .617 shooting average for the evening.

On Monday night West Texas had a first half hitting only .377 from the field and were down 22-38 to Midwestern. The Buffs came back strong

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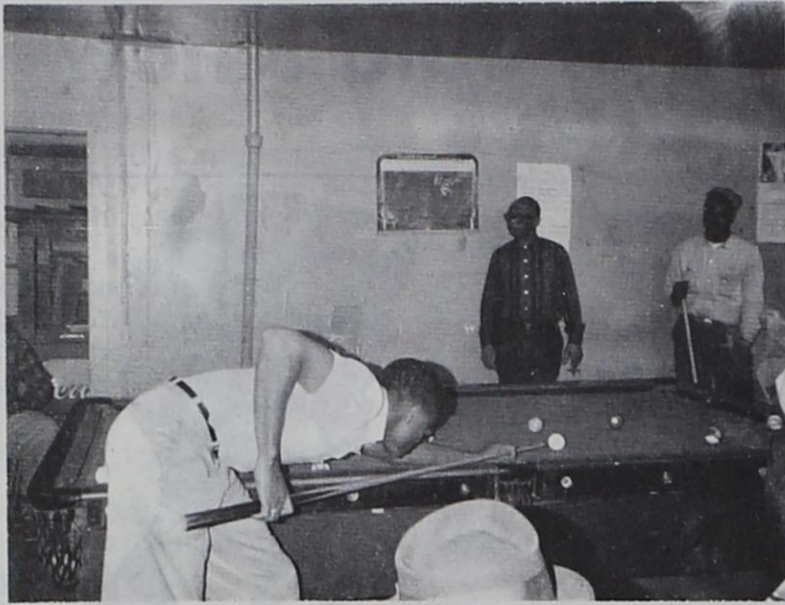

in the second period but could not cut far enough into the Midwestern lead. The host team hit on 10 of 12 free throws in the last few minutes to put the ballgame out of reach for the Buffs. Scottie Pierce hit 23 points for WT and took over the team leadership in scor-

ing for the season. The big Buff senior has scored 227 for a 12.6 average. Close behind in the scoring derby are Strahan (223-12.4) and Mitchell (221-12.3).

Pierce also leads in the rebound department with an 8.9 per game average. He has picked off 161 caroms. Pugh is next in line with 119 and Mitchell with 110.

Frank Schaffer continues to lead West Texas in field goal percentage hitting at a .553 clip. Pierce is next at .549 and

Strahan at .521. From the free throw line, Gail Simpson holds the accuracy leadership by scoring 28 out of 33 attempts for a percentage of .848. Strahan has gone under the .800 mark for the first time this season. His percentage is now at .797. Mitchell is the only other Buff over the .700 mark at .705.

In the team stats, the Buffs continue to flirt with the .500 mark from the field.
