Charles R. Sedberry, Jr., principal of Ralph Bunche Public School at Lorenzo, Texas, was the recipient of a 15-year pin at a special Public School Week assembly program at Lorenzo Wednesday, March 4th. The pin honored his service to the community for the past 15 years.

Mr. Sedberry was born in Bosque County, Meridian, Texas, July 28, 1925. He moved to Lubbock with his parents, Charles R., Sr. and the late Mrs. Selma Sedberry when he was a few months old.

All his public school years were spent in Lubbock. He was a graduate of Dunbar High School in 1942. His first year of College work was at Tiltonson in Austin, Texas (1942-43). In the summer of 1943 he enlisted in the Armed Forces and returned home with an honorable discharge in 1946.

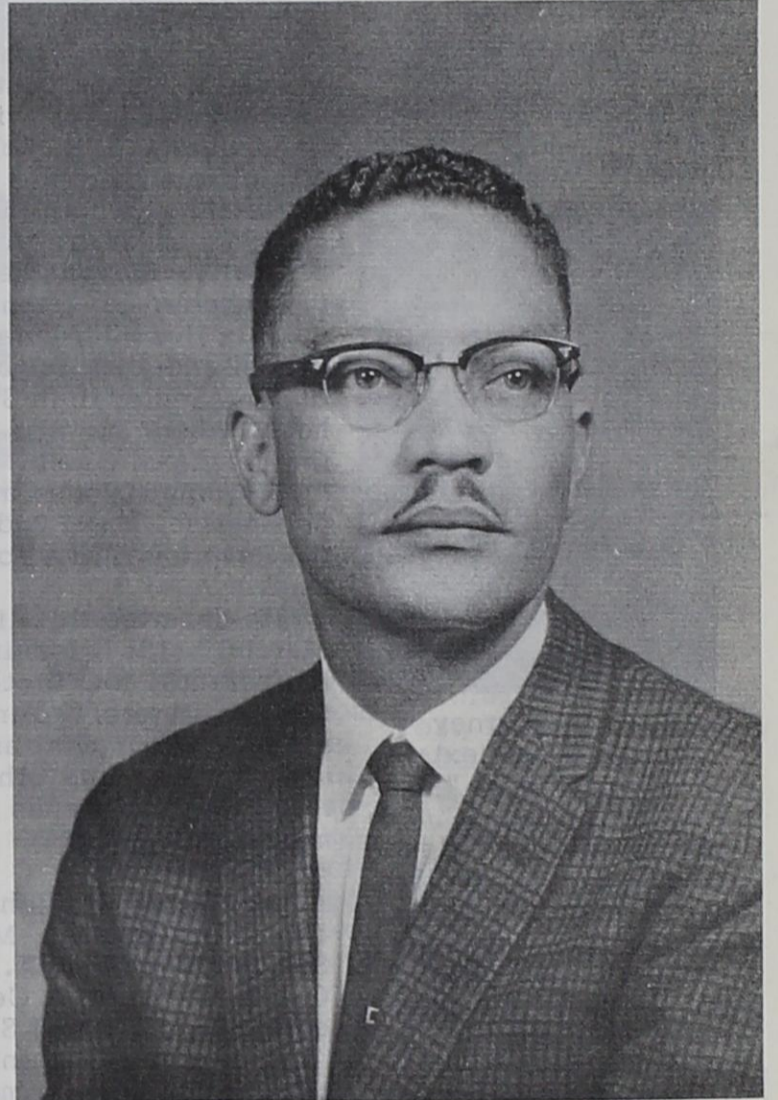
He then returned to college, Samuel Huston, in Austin and received his B.A. degree in 1949. That same year he began his teaching career at Lorenzo, where in 1924-25 his aunt, Mrs. C. L. Barnes, taught the first school for Negro children.

He has worked with and is a member of the Messiah Presbyterian Church, where he plays the organ and piano. He is a former music student of Mrs. Lillian C. Struggs. He is also a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity.

The M.E. Colvin Circle met in the home of Dora Holmes last Tuesday evening, and the Young Matrons met in the home of Mary Parker at the same time.

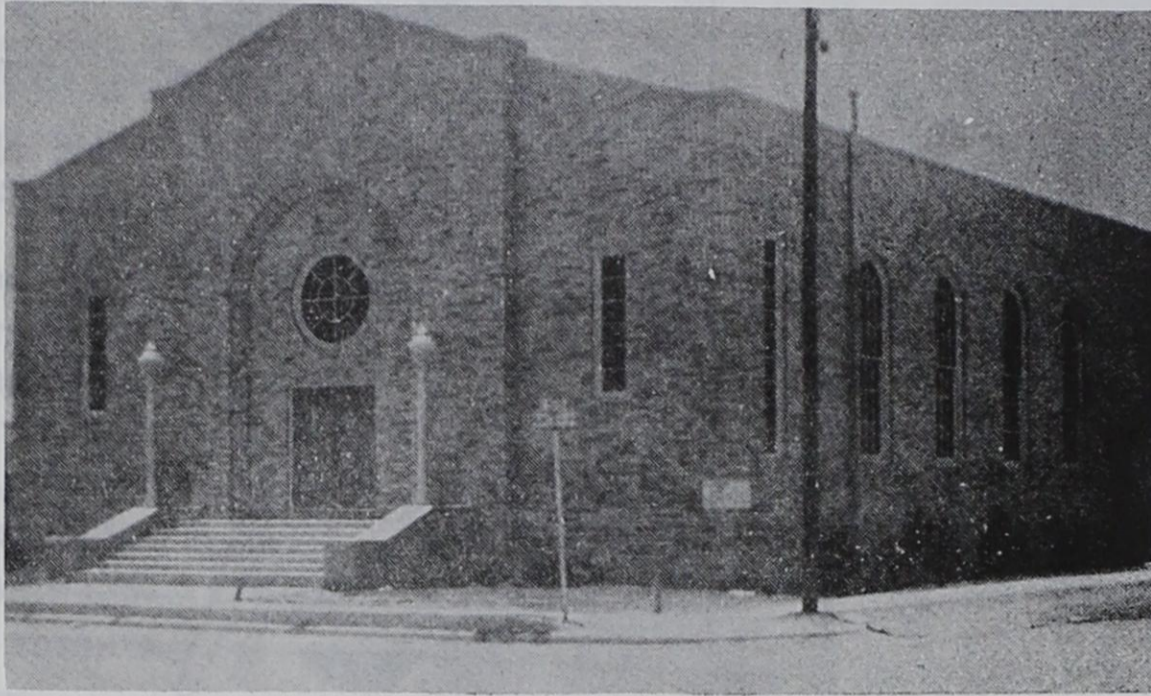
An Easter Drama will be sponsored by the W. M. S. on Easter afternoon at 3:00 pm. The public is invited to worship with the women and enjoy this special affair.
