



A review of Insanity Runs In My Family: Short Stories by Hal Bennett (Doubleday, Garden City, Long Island, N.Y.) 299 pages-Hard cover \$8.95

Hal Bennett is a most remarkable black American He is a truly great writer who tells tales of the black past and present with the accuracy of a sharp-shooter and with the artistic skill of a modern Michelangelo. 


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

A rollback of such unrestricted authority-long overdue-has already begun. Legislation I have introduced would prevent the implementation of a rule or regulation by the live-member commission if Congress--after time to assess the need-determines the FTC has overstepped its regulatory bounds.

The legislative veto provides that no future FTC rule will escape the screening process. Congress will have up to 90 days to judge the worth of rules submitted to both Houses of Congress. During that period, a concurrent resolution passed by one or both Houses would deny the rule from working an injustice on the marketplace, the consumer or the businessman.

The public, through its elected representatives would again have a measure of control over arbitrary written and often contradictory rales emanating from Washing-ton's unanswerable bureaucracy.

Congressional oversight of the independent regulatory agencies is not a new concept. It is supposed to be a working principle of government now. But the growth of bureaucracy has outstripped the ability of Congress to tighten its grip on runaway regulation. Reform of the regulatory process is, of course, the long range goal. But sometimes the individual skirmishes won can decide the battle. The legislative veto over agencies such as the FTC, providing Congress with strengthened life or death power over arbitrary rules, will ducide more than a few of the little wars.

Blacks, especially the younger Blacks, are more concerned about how they can move up the socioeconomic ladder in the system or what have you. If they see a system with more than 30,000 pupils enrolled, a very positive number of Black students and no Blacks in the central office of administration adding to the implementation of the total program. Sure, they don't want to come way out west.

We'll never be able to get those capable Blacks to participate in this system until we make opportunities a reality for Blacks in the system. A great beginning can be a position for an assistant superintendent. These kinds of moves are being made all over Texas. Why not here so we can overcome this image of the lack of Black involvement of qualified Blacks who can make a great contribution to our system.

In order to overcome out problems in the area of recruiting Blacks in the teacher ranks, we've got to bring a Black assistant superintendent on board at the central office.



A HARD WAY TO GO



BLACKS AND BERMUDA

Among the growing trouble spots around the globe is an idyllically g'ded coral reef several hundred miles off our shores called Bermuda. Bermuda has had a reputation for peaceableness, gentility--and order. The peaceableness, in the minds of many, was only surface deep. The gentilicy, as some saw it, was both a means of control and of increasing tourist trade. The order was-and is -maintained by an inequitable system of voting which effectively disenfranchises much of Bermuda's black majority

In 1966, when I visited Bermuda, blacks were still largely confined to scveral parishes or townships on the island. Votes were weighed according to the "importance" of the district in which one lived. Where the white Bermudans chiefly lived were, of course, the

most "important" districts. Bermuda, in 1966, imported white policemen and civil servants from Great Britain and other parts of the empire while black unemployment resembled our present black American youth unemployment. There were no British -- or

Bermuda-sponsored opportunities for anything more than a largely "social dipioma" type secondary education. The white Bermudans -who constituted the bulk of the country's middle and upper classes-secured the

Otherwise they were sent off for further education in the British Isles or Canada. The only rudimentary local

access to higher education was through an overseas outpost of the University of Maryland's extension service. Few were encouraged to take advantage of even this opening wedge to college education. Those who attended this unit against the will of those in control claim to have

being to leave the island. Yet Bermuda has assidu-

ously cultivated an appearance of internal good will. A young black priest was named vicar of one of less than a dozen parishes. There were-eleven years ago-distinguished bleck magistrates. school masters and headmistresses; and blacks took leading roles in the country's inequitably balanced parliamentary affairs.

The most pressing immediate sore at time was the failure of the British Parliament to force upon Bermuda 'a "one-man, one-vote" constitution. Black unrest, while kept under Bermuda's traditionally tacitura wrappings, was seething.

The British, in all of their colonial enterprises, have been especially clever. They h ve bought off dissidents or exported them, often with the benefit of paid-for higher education and a one-way 'isa.



from the use of the politically oriented English Book of Common Prayer-with its thoroughgoing emphasis upon obedience to one's "betters" and servility-the white vicar's sermon was political in tone from its beginning to its end.

dards of life on Bermuda. My friends advise m: that they still exist today, modified on the surface, but far more acutely felt. The prospects for lasting peace, after the recent rampage and rebellion, would seem to be remote, unless Bermuda undergoes some major change toward equity in all
