Longtime Resident Succumbs After Illness

After several months of illness, Mr. Alexander "Sonny" Johns died here Saturday, June 20, 1981. He was funeralized at the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church with the pastor, Rev. Stephen Pierson, officiating and assisted by Rev. A. W. Wilson, pastor emeritus.

Interment was held in Peaceful Gardens Memorial Park under the direction of Sedberry Funeral Chapel. A resident of Lubbock since September, 1922, he was born in Clay Station, Texas on August 9, 1920 to Tom and Essie Johns.

Mr. Johns, who referred to many of his friends as "cous", grew up and attended the Lubbock Public Schools. He was an active member of the Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church.

He joined the U. S. Army where he served for two years and received an honorable discharge. He was united in Holy Matrimony with Jeannie Clark on December 26, 1952.

He was a very active member of the Lubbock Black Hubbers baseball team and made an outstanding contribution as he played several positions.

He leaves to mourn his death: his wife, Mrs. Jeannie Johns of the home; two sons, Alexander Johns, Jr. and Jerrold Johns; two daughters, Rejeanne Johns of Lubbock and Gwendolyn Johns of California; three brothers, Freddie Johns and Joe Johns, both of Fairbanks, Alaska and Spencer Johns of Las Vegas, Nevada; three sisters, Mrs. Ruby Donaldson of Lubbock, Mrs. Robbie Brown of Mount Pleasant, Texas and Mrs. Edna Manning of Amarillo, Texas; many nieces, nephews, cousins and a host of other relatives and friends.

Lubbock NAACP Branch Holds Tag Day

The Lubbock Branch of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People will kick off its National Tag Day on Saturday, June 27, 1981.

Members and youth council members will seek to collect funds at street corners, shopping centers, churches and areas where people gather in large numbers. Workers will have an arm band explaining "Freedom Aint Free. Tags will be given to all contributors."

"We need your complete help," says Ms. Rose Wilson, local branch president.

She continued: "Blacks in this country are facing serious problems: vast

budget cuts that impact adversely on the poor and needy; a threatened constitutional amendment against affirmative action; the perilous future of the Fair Housing Act and extension of the Voting Rights Act."

Ms. Wilson concluded: "These extremely difficult challenges demand an increased response from the NAACP, and our commitment to wage this battle has placed the Association in a serious financial deficit. In order to carry out our next line of defense, we have instituted NATIONAL TAG DAY, to be held on Saturday, June 27th. Will you help?"

Former Governor Candidate Heads 'Capital Eye'

A compassionate Republican who was cited for his handling of Lubbock's 1970 tornado crisis is the new president of the board of trustees of "Capital Eye," the long-running Texas public affairs show on radio and TV. He is Dr. James H. Granberry, 48, Lubbock orthodontist, civic leader, and business man who is active in the Republican Party. Dr. Granberry was the Republican gubernatorial nominee for Texas in 1974, when Democratic Governor Dolph Briscoe successfully ran for re-election.

Said Dr. Granberry of his role with "Capital Eye": "Capital Eye" is one of the few shows around that really hones in on what's happening in our Capital City. I think it provides a tremendous public service. Our network and local news shows tell you what's happening in Washington and London and at City Hall. And they tell

you a lot about the weather and sports. But state news from Austin falls in the crack."

"Capital Eye" is distributed as a free public service to Texas radio and TV stations and is supported by tax-deductible contributions and foundations grants. It celebrates its 12th anniversary of continuous broadcasting in September.

"In heading up the board at "Capital Eye," Jim Granberry is just continuing a career of public involvement that goes back to his college days," said Winston Bode, originator and producer/host of "Capital Eye." "We're delighted to have him and we know he will spread the word about what we're trying to do to keep public affairs dialogue open in Texas."

Dr. Granberry had just been elected Lubbock's youngest mayor in history when his city hit by a devastating tornado on May 11, 1970. He was cited widely for his expert and compassionate leadership during the crisis, and during the subsequent rebuilding of the South Plains city. Because of his experience in handling the Lubbock tornado, Dr. Granberry was appointed by President Nixon to the Peruvian Earthquake Voluntary Assistance group after Peru was hit by a massive earthquake just 20 days after the Lubbock tornado. He made four trips to Peru on his assignment.

Dr. Granberry is a native of Tyler, Texas. He served as City Council

member and Mayor Pro Tem at Lubbock from 1966 to 1970. He served in the U.S. Air Force and was an honor graduate at Baylor College of Dentistry. He has been remarkably active in civic, professional and political activities, and has business interest. He recently was named chairman of Board of Regents of East Texas State University, and is a trustee of the Baylor College of Dentistry. In Lubbock he is president and chairman of the board of the University City Club & Luxury Hotel. He also is president and chairman of the board of a new fast-food restaurant franchise which he has originated, Stuffed Potato Patch Restaurants.

Dr. Granberry was 1978 co-chairman of the Clements for Governor Committee in Lubbock. Dr. Granberry is married to the former Edwina Brown of Tyler, and they are the parents of two daughters and three sons.

Consumer Co-Op Bank

Leslie V. Porter, a financial manager with more than 10 years experience with major institutions, has joined the National Consumer Cooperative Bank, Washington, D.C., as its vice president and treasurer, according to Bank President Carol S. Greenwald.

Porter will develop and manage a financial plan that will allow the Co-op Bank to become a private, self-sustaining institution, Greenwald said. She pointed out that it was the intention of Congress that the Bank, a governmental instrumentality, become a private lending institution serving consumer cooperatives.

Before going to the Co-op Bank Porter was chief financing officer for the Overseas Private Investment Corp., a self-sustaining U.S. government international development agency. Prior to that, he had been assistant treasurer and investment officer at the Ford Foundation in New York where his principal responsibility was planning and managing financial resources and as a financial consultant for Booz, Allen and Hamilton Inc., an international management consulting firm.

eminent from various nations because of the Reagan Administration casting a vote against the code of ethics designed to curb promotion of infant formulas in developing nations.

Nobody in this country's cabinet seems to care if Black and Brown babies are bloated by U.S. baby bottles. Blowing the whistle and other noises will be heard from senior citizens at home more likely, because of new stringent retirement rules by the Reaganites. Reversing the trend toward early retirement will have repercussions for the rest of the nation's workers. The subject for another article. Which brings us to the most buffaloes, stewed and crewed group of Americans - the mythical middle class.

Middle class in America is a state of mind. In both white and Black America heads middle class America has money to buy those material goods considered to be obtainable on the open market. Such as mini-mansions in the suburbs, two cars in the garage, college for all of the children, vacation and/or summer home, plus frequent trips to a local restaurant in designer clothes.

Counting the bill for "being there" in this middle class comes to considerably more than a salary of \$23,600 a year estimated by the U.S. Department of Labor for a family of four. In fact, an income that low would not qualify you to buy even half a house these days.

Do not think that this is news to anyone. Particularly the President. Reagan's tax proposal is presented to the public as a positive step to save the middle class at least from the tax man. Get the government off his back so to speak. All that glitters is not gold. Tax cuts in this country in the past have been considered coins in the pockets of the consumers. Mainly because most middle and lower income groups got the lion share of any tax cuts.

In 1975 the great majority of taxpayers were earning less than 10,000 and paying only 4.5% of the tax burden. This was caused by a tax rate cut created by the Secretary of the Treasury, Andrew Mellon reducing the range from 4% - 73% down to 1.5% - 25%. A 79% cut in tax revenue from 1921. While those earning \$50,000 and over experience an increase of 59% in tax payments from 1921.

The Kennedy cuts reinstated the cut in tax revenue paid by the great masses of the public in the under 10,000 class. The Kennedy tax cuts recognized the need to change the trend which caused the total tax collections to climb from low income workers eleven fold since 1925. Kennedy gave a cut only to the poor and lower income workers while fat wage earners of \$50,000 or more got a 57% tax revenue increase.

A reduction today in the 10,000 and under tax bracket would benefit one out of every four white families. The great bulk of the balance of white families fall now in the \$15,000 to \$50,000 income tax brackets. This brings us to the Reagan tax-rate plan for some people.

Those poor souls slaving away with \$10,000 or less will get a cut of \$1.2 billion total while those earning \$100,000 a year or more will pocket almost five times that amount \$5.2 billion. In the battle between the top and the bottom, the top beats the hell out of the bottom!

The median income for white families income for white families in 1979 was \$18,368. Over half the white families earned less than 20,000 in 1979. But the beautiful people in the "new middle class" who are expected to benefit should be in the \$20,000 to \$100,000 income class. It is here the greatest loss in tax revenue will occur which, because of the renewed emphasis in defense spending will devastate social programs.

The \$2 a day (\$20,000-\$30,000) or \$4 a day (\$30,000-\$50,000) saving by some members of society will take its ill effect on both middle class and poor of this

Your Social Security Most Disability Claims Will Be Reviewed

Do you receive monthly disability checks from social security? If so, you can expect to have your claim reviewed at least once every 3 years unless you have a severe condition considered permanent.

Until recently, disability claims were reexamined only in a limited number of circumstances. For example, a review usually was made if a beneficiary reported a return to work or if he or she had a condition considered very likely to improve.

To a large extent, social security relied on voluntary reports from beneficiaries about medical improvement or work activity. While a majority did report, some did not. Recent studies have shown that there are some people on the disability rolls who no longer meet all requirements for benefits.

The Social Security Administration has started a large-scale effort to make sure that only eligible individuals continue to receive disability checks. This major initiative is consistent with the goal to improve the administration of the disability insurance program.

The increased reviews also give SSA a headstart in complying with a provision of Public Law 96-265 that goes into effect in January 1982. That provision requires that all social security disability cases be examined at least once every 3 years except when the disability is permanent.

In part, the new law recognizes that many advances in medical science and rehabilitation techniques have been made over the nearly quarter of a century that social security has paid disability checks. Many people who had little hope for recovery from a serious accident or illness in 1957, when disability payments were first made, would today have a better chance of returning to gainful work.

Legislation over the past decade (such as the Rehabilitation Act of 1973) has also helped by reducing physical and attitudinal barriers and enabling more disabled people to gain fuller participation in all aspects of community life. This year during International Year of Disabled Persons, a substantial public and private effort is underway to further this progress.

In addition, 1980 changes in the social security law make it easier for disabled beneficiaries to test their ability to work by reducing the risk of losing benefits. For example, even though monthly benefits may stop following a trial work period, those payments can be started again quickly if a person is still disabled and is forced by his or her condition to stop working within a year. Also Medicare protection can continue for up to 3 years after a disabled person stops getting benefits due to work. More information about these and other improvements are available at any social security office.

I have been getting disability checks nearly 5 years and would tell you right away if my condition improves or if I work (I wish this were the case). I don't see why my case has to be reviewed!

A Congress passed a law that will require every disabled beneficiary who does not have a condition considered permanent to be reviewed at least once every 3 years. If your condition has not improved since you started receiving benefits, chances are your payments will continue.

A \$20,000 a year bonus to anyone earning \$100,000 a year might give him or her momentary elation, but is unlikely to produce permanent improvement in our society.

A View from Capitol Hill:

AN INDEPENDENT REPORTS ON WASHINGTON

Reapportionment is a political reality that confronts Members of the House of Representatives and their constituents every 10 years. Because of the length of time involved, we tend to forget how important redistricting is and what it means not only during the 10-year period at hand but often for decades to come.

The U. S. Constitution requires each State's legislature to redraw its congressional district boundaries every 10 years. This is to keep all districts equal, according to growth and shifts of population revealed by the latest decennial census.

When the population figures and the number of Representatives to which the State is entitled are transmitted to the State's executive, the State has the duty to re-district. In most States this duty is carried out by the State legislatures. However, regardless of the procedure used, the Federal courts step in if the process becomes deadlocked.

With this mandatory requirement to redistrict often arises various schemes to draw arbitrary boundary lines to determine the configuration of the congressional districts. This monster that rears its ugly head is called gerrymandering. In practice gerrymandering is any excessive manipulation of a legislative district to benefit particular persons or parties. Gerrymandering gets its name from former Massachusetts Governor Elbridge Gerry and referred to an oddly-shaped district carved out in Essex County in 1812.

In my own State of Illinois, maps have been developed by two groups, the Independent Voters of Illinois and the Political Action Conference of Illinois, which smack of gerrymandering in its most blatant form. They violate the following principles that should be uppermost in the minds of all Blacks concerned about fairness in the political process.

* No map should be gerrymandered or designed to lessen the likelihood of three Blacks being elected to Congress again, for this would be undemocratic and a step backward.

* No map should put residences of any two of Chicago's three black Members of Congress into the same district. This would unnecessarily divide the black community. Divide and conquer is a tactic we should all recognize at this juncture in our political history.

* No map should extend any of Chicago's predominantly black districts into the suburbs. This, too, is unnecessary and elsewhere has been the illegal though traditional means of curbing natural and fair increases in black political representation. Since the passage of the Voting Rights Bill, this has been a common practice in the South.

While circumstances might cause the above principles to alter somewhat, generally they are applicable to every large urban in the Nation in which there is a large concentration of black citizens.

Based on the 1980 census, Sunbelt and western States win the redistricting sweepstakes: Florida stands to gain four seats while Texas will pick up three, and there is a possibility for Blacks to gain seats in both States; Arizona, California, Oregon, Tennessee, and Utah will gain one seat each. The major losers will be from the snowbelt and eastern States: New York will probably lose five seats; Illinois, Ohio, and Pennsylvania, two; Indiana, Maryland, Massachusetts, Michigan, Missouri, and New Jersey, one each.

Black Members could be affected in at least three States: Illinois, Michigan, and Missouri. If the potential for black political power was not diluted through gerrymandering and other tricks, there is no question that we would have black Members from Louisiana, Mississippi, South Carolina, and other States based on population.

Therefore, reapportionment is a matter of grave concern for Blacks if we are to hold on to the gains we have made in congressional seats. Moreover, if we are to make further gains, we must guard against efforts to pit one Black against another - whether such efforts come from within or from outside.

We must be diligent and stand together in this important struggle.
