Mrs. Ophelia Malone of 2604 Teak Avenue, Lubbock, Texas, a recipient of a bachelor of science degree in home economic education,



was the first Negro undergraduate student to graduate from Texas Tech.

She is a high school graduate of Anderson High School at Austin, Texas. After her secondary education, she entered Huston-Tillotson College to acquire her degree in education. In 1962 she transferred her credits to Texas Tech, and with hard work she was able to attain a degree.

During her attendance at Huston-Tillotson she was a pledge in Alpha Kappa Alpha sorority. While at Texas Tech she was a member of the homemaking club.

Mrs. Malone was asked how she was able to attain such a goal, as the first Negro to graduate from Texas Tech, she stated "it required hard work, study, set goals and determination to accomplish these goals." Mrs. Malone also stated that

New Fraternity Formed Here



Recently, a new graduate chapter of the Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Incorporated, came to life in this southwestern city. Its name, Theta Kappa Lambda, was organized and established by seven men in Lubbock, Texas, who felt that "manly deeds, scholarship, and love for all mankind" could reach momentum only by the unity so characteristic of Alpha Phi Alpha. The charter members were Brothers William R. Powell, president; R. A. Pillow, DDS, vice-president; D. C. Fair, Jr., financial secretary; Tull Thornton, Jr, treasurer; Charles Sedberry, Jr., corresponding secretary; Earl Daye, historian; and Charles Henry, recording secretary.

After receiving its charter in July, 1963, the Theta Lambda Chapter of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc., ignited the torch, thus illuminating this South Plains area of Texas.

For its own interest, and that of the community, the chapter has initiated a promising program of activities. In behalf of the community, the chapter has encouraged voter registration, and has been active in the organization of the local Pan-Hellenic council. For its own benefit the chapter has initiated two additional brothers into its ranks, namely Charles Johnson and Don Jones.

Prominence morally, educationally, socially, and spiritually has been the possession of Alpha men since the fraternity's establishment, December, 1906. Since this time, it has been a tradition of the fraternity to encourage high personal standards; therefore, the Brothers of Alpha delight and welcome their new Brothers into this "school for the better making of men."

In addition, the Brothers have devised a very significant program of events for the Fall of 1964. The most important being the presentation of Sepia Fashion Fair in November (specific date to be announced). Another event will be "The Autumn Affair," a get-acquainted social for all new teachers in the city.

Mildred was in the band, choir, student council, and YWCA while in high school. Her major is biology and she is a member of the CD's, one of the campus organizations.

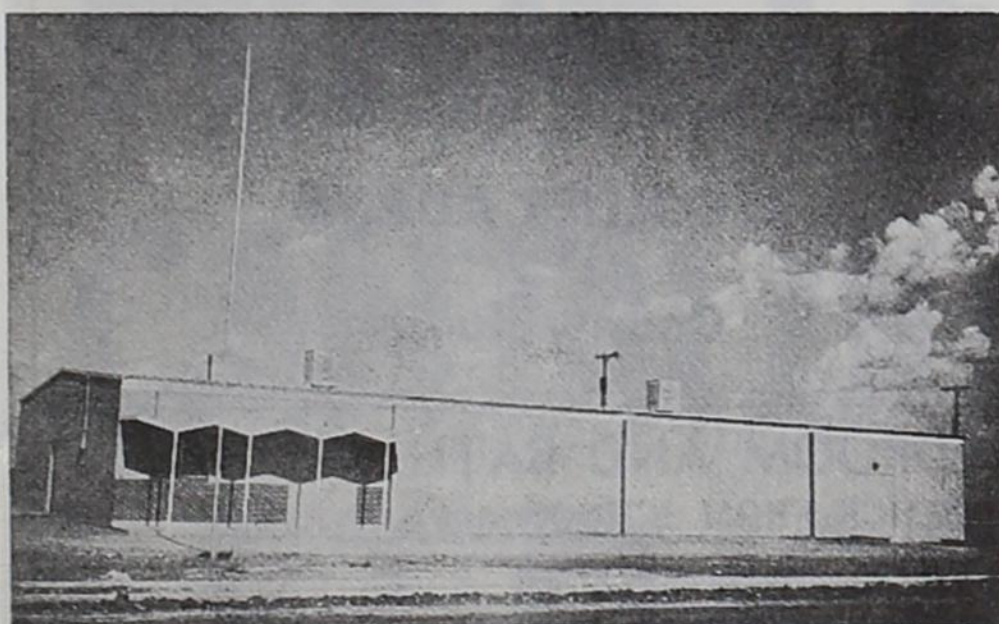
She is shown above with another member of her class who was also elected as a

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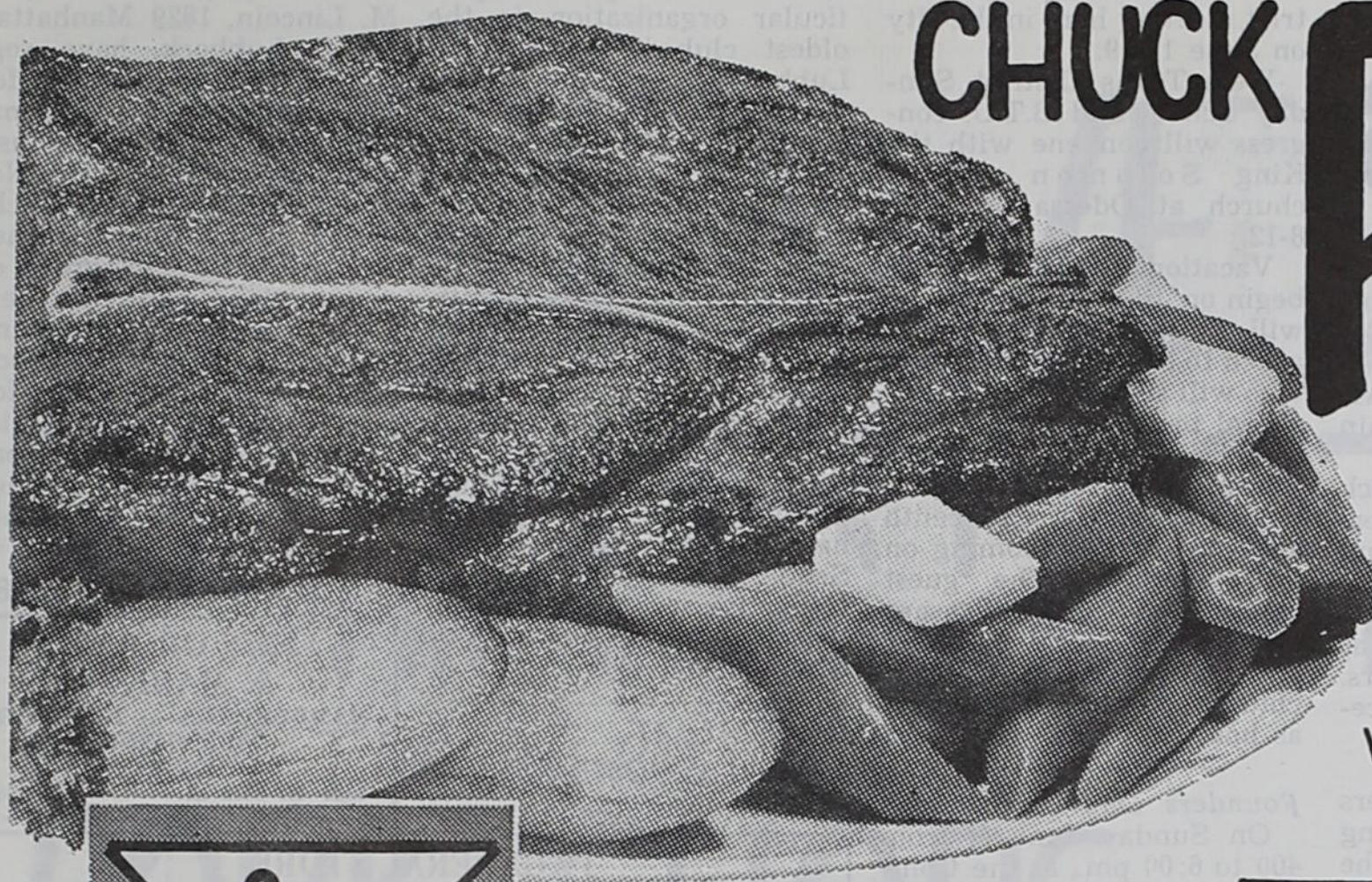
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CHURCH NEWS
