from Lubbock, will be guest speaker. Dr. Ratcliff will lecture on knee injuries and their relationship to athletics. He is known, throughout the Southwest as one of the top members in his field.

Those planning to attend the clinic are asked to forward one-half of the registration fee (\$10.00) to the University by May 22 so that details may be completed as to housing, meals, etc.

Tyson began his career as a student trainer while at Fort Worth Poly High School. He continued on as a student trainer at Victoria Junior College and then became head athletic trainer while finishing work on his degree at New Mexico State



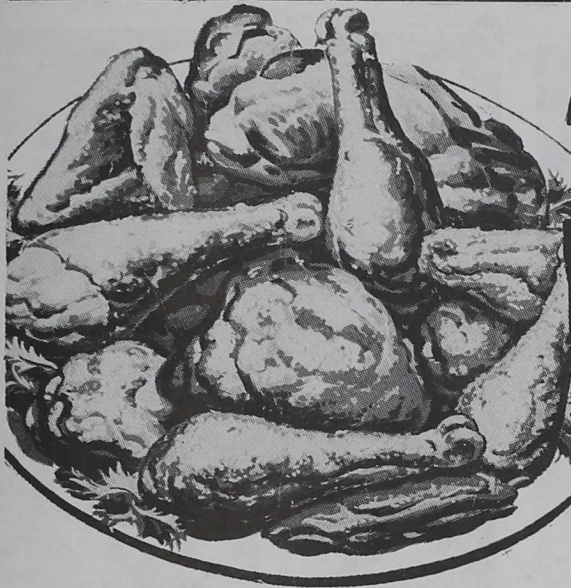

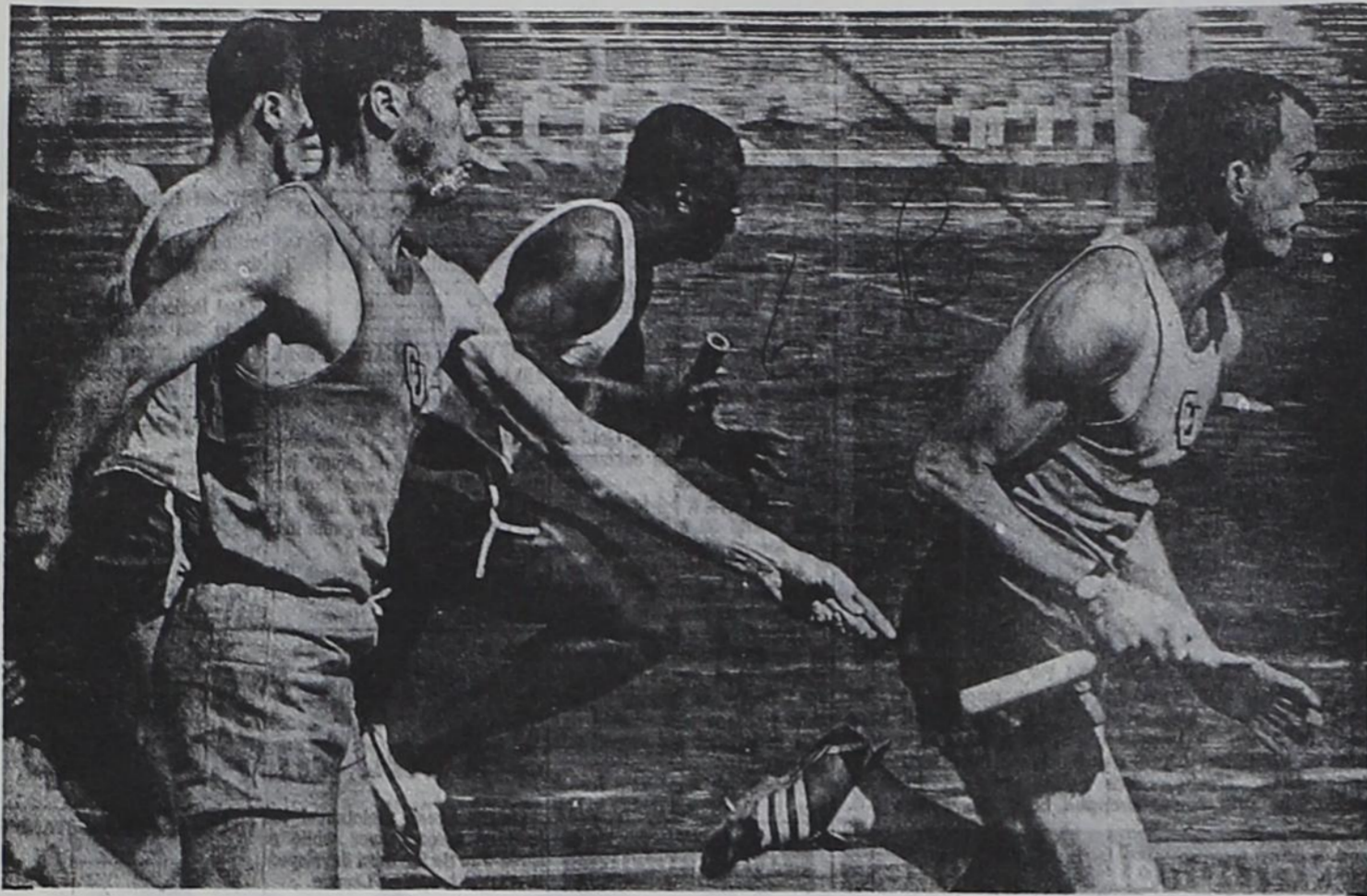
