

## Correlation Group Holds Mass Meeting

### Record Vote Tops 17,700

Lubbock voters, turned out in record numbers Tuesday and sent businessman W.D. "Dub" Rogers and builder Max Tidmore into a runoff election for mayor and elected two new councilmen from a field of seven.

The runoff election between Rogers and Tidmore will be May 5th. There were 17,716 votes cast in the race which topped the 1962 record vote of 16,071.

the council seats vacated by outgoing men. Kastman easily beat two others in his race, a narrower race was seen in Medlock's 51.9 per cent win over three op-

ponents, including the first Negro, Rev. A.W. Wilson, ever to seek municipal office here in Lubbock.

### City Woman Fatally Stabbed

Charges were filed last week against a 29 year old Negro woman for the fatal stabbing of her roommate. Helen Jane Thornton was charged with murder with malice of Edna Neal Kirk, 27. The two women, Thornton and Kirk resided in the same apartment at 1618 Ave. C.

The beginning of this fatal stabbing started when the Kirk woman came into the apartment in the early morning hours distributing everyone with profane language. The Thornton woman told police that she feared that Kirk had a knife so she slipped a kitchen knife into the top of her dress and went into the bathroom. While in the bath she called for her sister to go get some help.

When Thornton came from the room the fight started, and the results

led to a fatal stabbing. Thornton stated, "Edna had a knife so I pulled mine and the fight started".

Kirk had served a probationary prison term in a felony shoplifting case and was sentenced to prison in 1958 in a robbery case. She has also been reported for being in many other lesser offenses.

Thornton was released from the County Jail after posting a \$2,000 bail.

I never want to see federal troops enforcing equal rights in Texas".

He went on to say "I want the state of Texas to create an atmosphere where this will not be necessary. We have come a long way in Texas in the field of Civil Rights and other areas, but there is still a lot to be done."

Mr. Brown stated that he believed there should be a minimum wage law in Texas. In the field of Education he stated, "I am very much interested in the field of education

...I think of the dropout problem in high school. There should be some State Vocational schools established to help this problem".

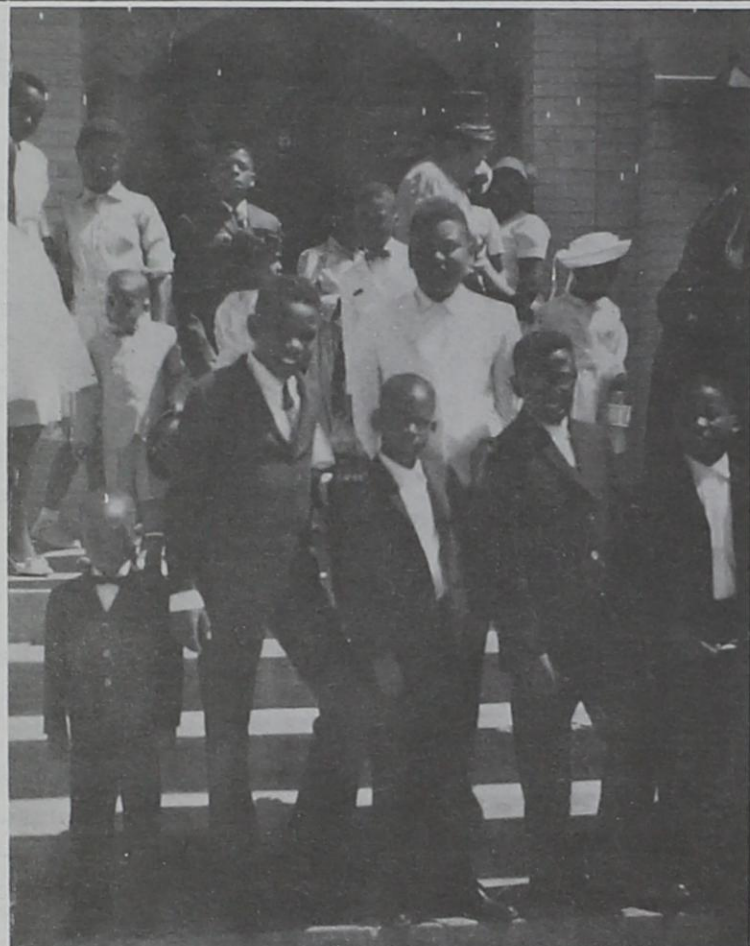

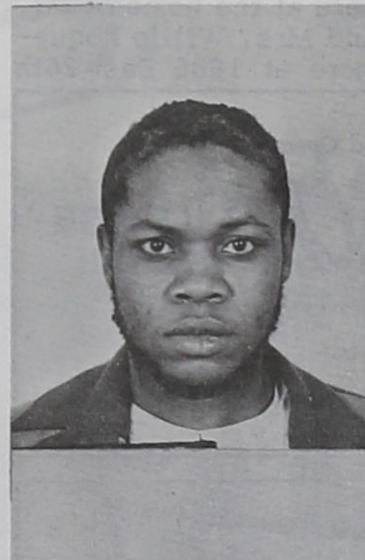

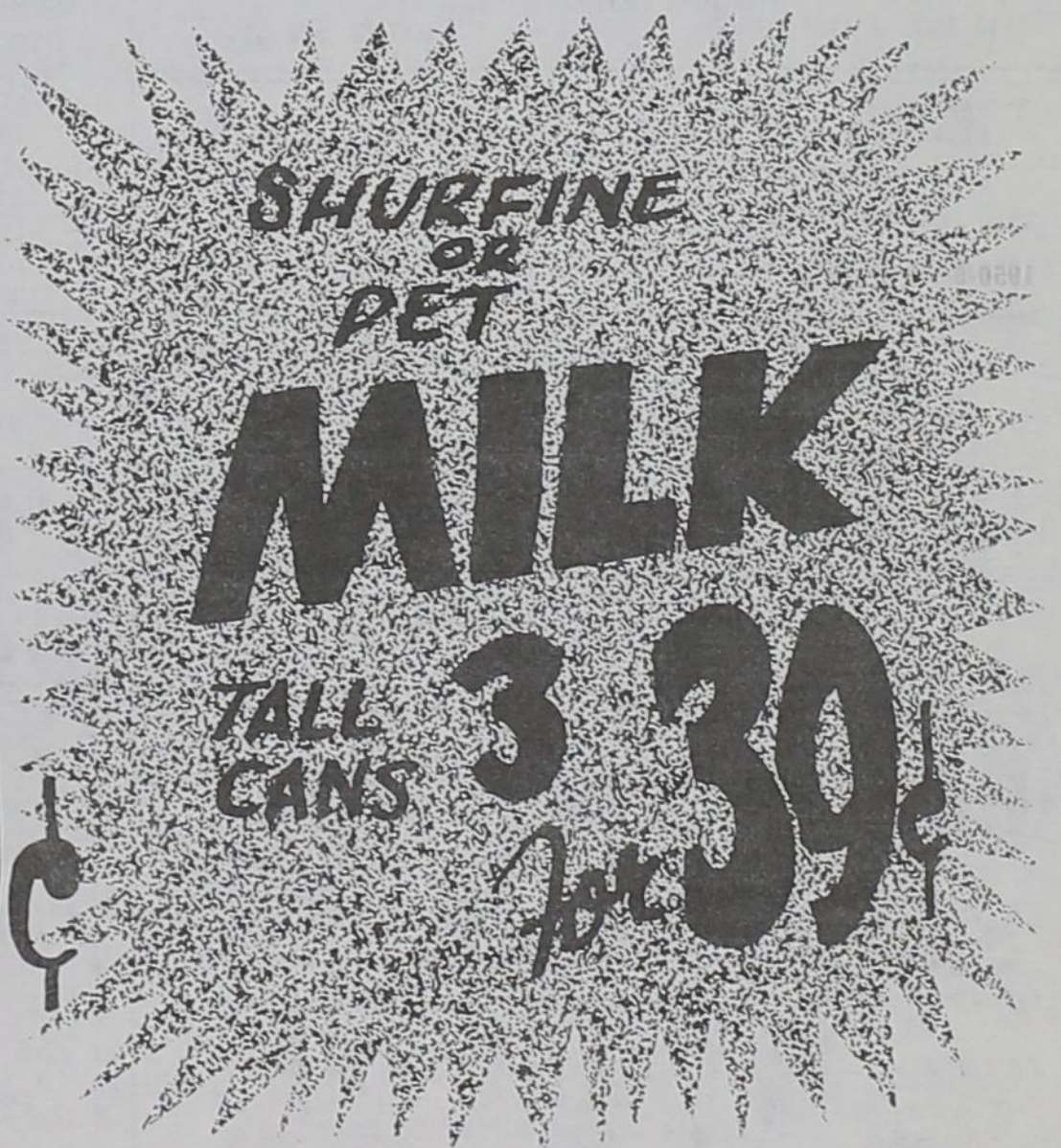

# Sports In Brief

The West Texas State University football team reached the mid-way point of spring practice and took last weekend off for an Easter vacation. The Buffs returned to the practice field Tuesday and will continue drills until April 10 when they meet former West Texas football greats in the Third Annual Alumni Game under the lights of Buffalo Bowl.

Head football coach Joe Kerbel and his staff are pleased with the first two weeks of drills. This is a rebuilding year for the Buff squad and the coaching staff is taking a long look at every team member. Many of the younger lads up from the 1963 freshman team and a number of junior col-

lege transfers have been given spots with the first unit. Most positions are wide open and Kerbel has to find the right men to fill the vacancies created by 10 graduating seniors. Nine of those seniors were 1963 starters.

"Our boys have a lot of possibilities", says Kerbel. "However, just where we can start I do not know. When you lose boys like Pedro, Ross, Richardson, Varnell, Denny, etc., you are in trouble. So we have to build from here. But we are not pessimists. We have a fine group of young men on our squad and the spirit in the drills is very high. It is now our job as coaches to find out which of these boys can

best do the job for West Texas State next fall."

The Buffs will engage in one more game condition scrimmage at Buffalo Bowl before the Alumni game. The scrimmage, scheduled for this Saturday at 2:30 pm, has been turned over to the Buffalo Touchdown Club a booster organization which backs WT football. New club president Will McLean of Amarillo requested that the TD club be given this scrimmage session for means to promote a membership drive. "Only members of the Touchdown Club, The B.A.M club and the West Texas Activities Association will be admitted to the scrimmage session", McLean announced. "However, anyone wishing to join any of these organizations may purchase memberships at the gate Saturday afternoon and view the workout". Members are requested to bring their identification cards and present them at the gate. McLean added, "One practice scrimmage session was held on March 21 and was open to the public. We feel it is only fair to have something a little special for the members of the booster clubs that help support football at the university."

Buffalo elevens will participate in the game. Backfield men Pete Pedro, Jerry Richardson, Hoot Gibson, Ollie Ross and Bill Lorange are back from last fall. Up front senior end Jim Ostrander and Quinton Eppinette, tackles John Varnell and Jack Mayfield, and guard Jimmy Denny will once again don the cardinal and white Buff varsity uniforms. Back from previous years to mention a few will be Jerry Don Logan ('62), now with the Baltimore Colts, Bob Petrich ('62), now with the San Diego Chargers, Jim "Corky" Dawson ('62), WT freshman coach, Ned Jolly ('60), assistant coach at Canyon High, and Stu Johnson ('62), masters candidate at WT. Many previous West Texas State wins will be rehashed when the "old timers" gather on the campus next week.

Frank Kimbrough announced last week the signing of a contract for a football meeting between the Buffaloes and Bowling Green State University of Ohio. The Buffs and the Falcons will meet on Sept. 25, '65 in Canyon.

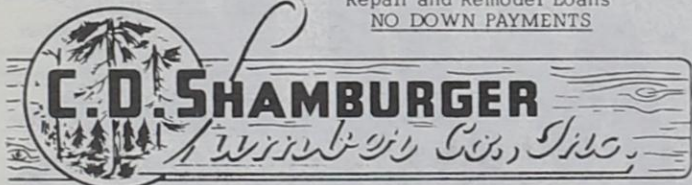
