

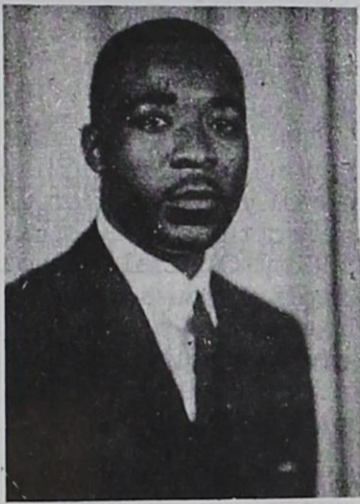

Here in Lubbock County, James Lee Marion, 22 year old Negro, was given the death penalty last week by a jury of 8 men and 4 women. He was convicted of murder with malice in the death of Mrs. Turner, 66, in

pa, Abilene, San Angelo and Sweetwater.



TAX MAN SAM SEZ
The Internal Revenue Service reminds taxpayers to be sure to include their Social Security Numbers when filing income tax returns. There's a place for these numbers on both the 1040 and 1040A Forms.

Taxpayers without a Social Security Number can get one by writing to any local Social Security Office. Or, your Internal Revenue Office can provide the form needed to apply for a number.

If you receive ten dollars or more in interest on a savings account, your bank or savings institute will also need to know your Social Security Number. These institutions will report all such interest payments to Internal Revenue.

Don't forget that the maximum Social Security Tax for 1963 is \$174.

District Director Ellis because you worked for Campbell, Jr., of Internal Revenue's Dallas Office reminds you that if you paid more than \$174 more than one employers, you can credit the overpayment toward your income tax.

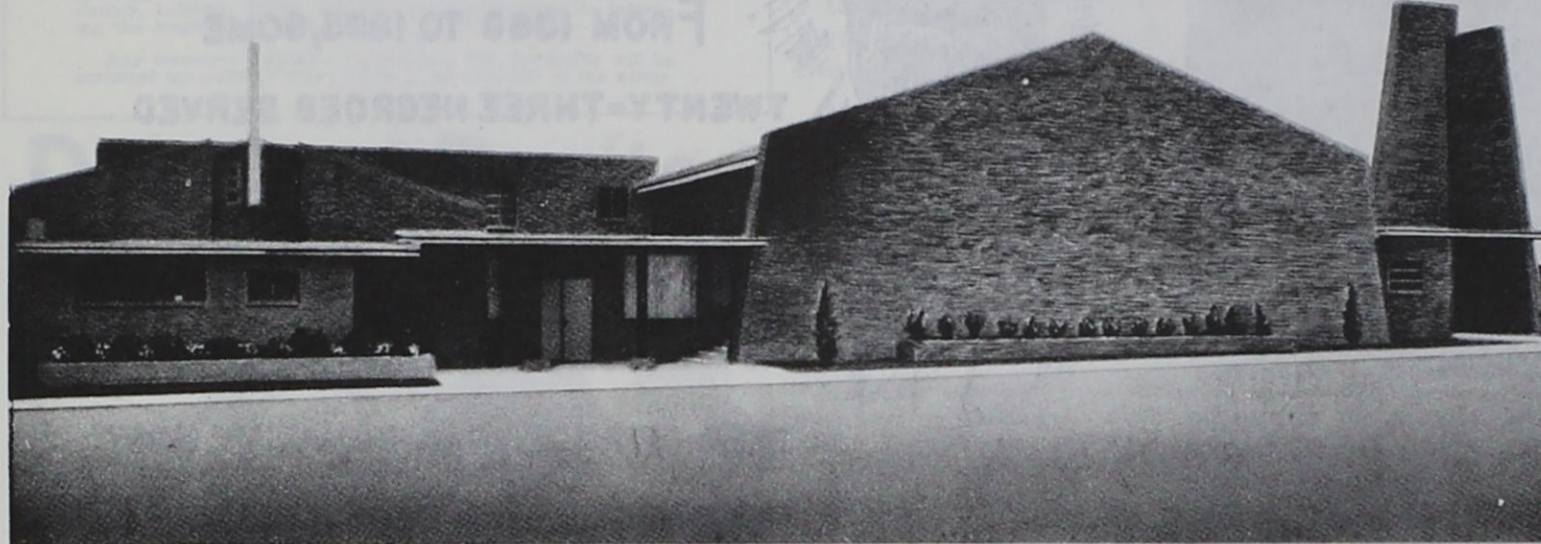
