Black Man's Killing By Police Shakes Lousiana Town

HOMER, La. (AP) - For 73 HOMER, I.A. (AP) — For 73 years before his killing by a white police officer, Bernard Monroe led a life in this northern Louistana town as peaceful as they come—five kids with his wile of five decades, all raised in the same house, supported by the same job.

The black man's shooting death is attracting far more attention than he ever did, raising racing regional resistants between the

attention than he ever did, raising racial tensions between the black community and Homer's police department.

The Rev. Al Sharpton, who helped organize a massive 2007 civil rights demonstration in Jena after six black temagers were charged with attempted murder in the beating of a white classmate, planned to lead a Friday afternoon rally in Homer to protest Monroe's killing.

"The parallel here is that the local community cannot trust

local community cannot trust law enforcement and cannot trust the process to go forward without outside help," Sharpton

11 Year Old Hangs Himself Due to Bullying

SPRINGFIELD, MA- An 11-year-old Massachusetts boy, Carl Joseph Walker-Hoover, hanged himself Monday after enduring bullying at school, including daily taunts of being gay, despite his mother's weekly pleas to the school to address the problem. This is at least the fourth suicide of a middlechool aged child linked to bul-

ing some form of a vow of silence to bring attention to anti-GLBT (gay, lesbian, bisexual and transgender) bullying and barassment at school. The other harassment at school. The other three known cases of suicide among middle-school students took place in Chatham, Evanston and Chicago, Ill., in the month of February. "Our hearts go out to Carl's mother, Sirdeaner L. Walker, and other members of Carl's

family, as well as to the commu-nity suffering from this losa," Gay, Lesbian and Straight Education Network (GLSEN) Executive Director Eliza Byard said. "As we mourn yet another tragedy involving bullying at achool, we must heed. Ms. Walker's urgent call for real, systemic, effective responses to the endemic problem of bully-ing and harassment. Especially in this time of societal crisis, adults in schools must be afert to the heightened pressure children the heightened pressure children face, and take action to create this case so tragically illustrate schools must deal head-on wi anti-gay language and beha
