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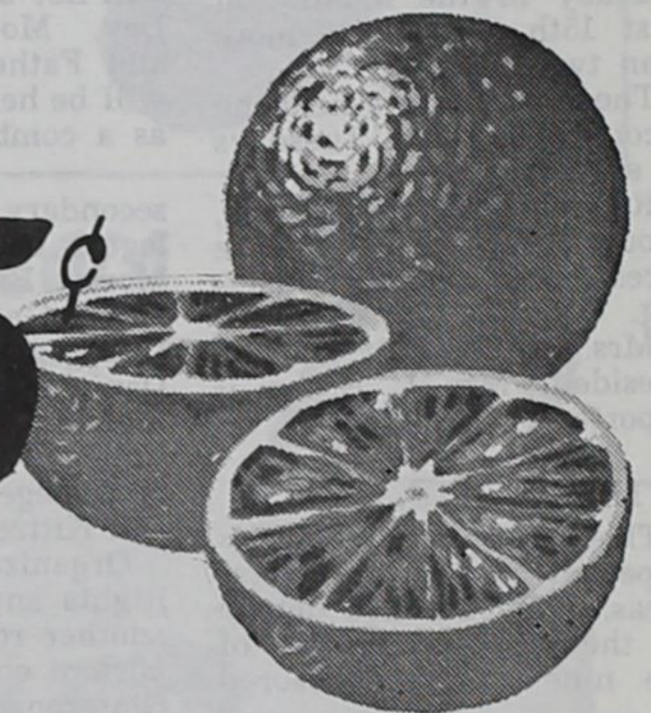

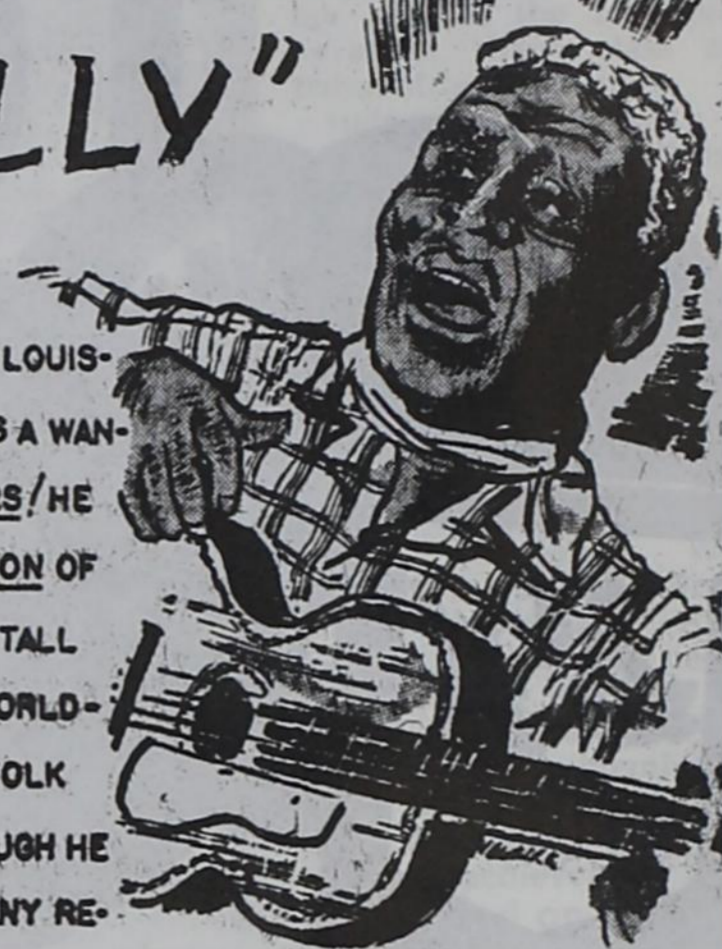

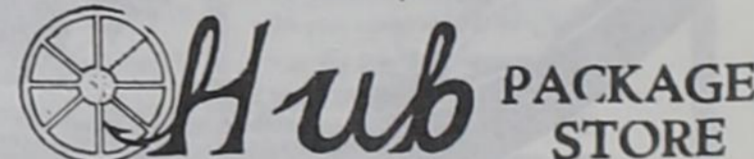
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**SPORTS IN BRIEF...**

Most prominent awards presented were the Wes Kleinschmidt Awards for both football and basketball, the Fighting Heart Award for basketball and the President's Award for football.

Dean Nowotny, known as "Shorty" to his friends, began his University career at the University of Texas in 1926 as assistant dean of men. He became dean of men in 1942 and a year later the dean of student life.

He holds three University degrees: achelor of Arts (1922); Bachelor of Laws (1925); and Master of Arts (1927).

Dean Nowotny is past regional president of Deans and Advisers of Men; a former National Independent Students' Association official and trustee for the American Humanics Foundation. He is listed in "Who's Who in America" and

"Who's Who in American Education." In addition, he is a member of Phi Kappa Sigma social fraternity; Pi Sigma Alpha, honorary government fraternity; American College Personnel Association, and is an elder in the University Presbyterian Church. He was honored at the 1958 Honors Day by a Students' Association Award given to a non-teaching staff member.

**VARSITY AWARDS**

CANYON.—"A man who learns the hard, tough rules of the game through competition in athletics cannot help but be a credit to himself, his fellow men, his job and his community." These were the words of Arno Nowotny, Dean of Student Life at the University of Texas, featured speaker at the Annual West Texas State Varsity Awards Banquet held Tuesday night at Canyon. Dean Nowotny addressed a crowd of over 300 and told of the many battles varsity athletes have yet to fight, but also of how they will be better prepared

for the coming battles having participated in collegiate athletics. He was given a warm ovation at he close of his talk.

Awards were resented in both football and basketball. In football, Jim Ostrander, senior from Barstow, California, received the President's Award. This honor, originated by West Texas President Dr. James P. Cornette, is given to the player who has made the greatest contribution, everything being considered, to the whole team effort. The selection is made by the team and coaches. Jerry Richardson, Canyon senior, won the Wes Kleinschmidt award as the most valuable player of the 1963 team. This award, dating back to 1936, is selected by a three-man committee, all Canyon businessmen, who are backers of Buff football and basketball. Seniors Ollie Ross, Harrisburg, Pa., and John Varnell, Plainview, were named co-captains elect for 1964. Ostrander player regular end for the Buffs for two seasons after transferring to WT from two years of junior college football in California. Richardson won four varsity letters playing offensive and defensive halfback. Ross and Varnell each won three varsity monograms. Ross ran from the fullback

position while Varnell toiled at tackle. So the line and backfield had two representatives in the selection of honor winners.

In basketball, junior Kirby Pugh from Abilene walked away with most of the evening's awards. Kirby, who transferred to West Texas this past year from San Angelo Junior College, received the Wes Kleinschmidt Award as the most valuable player of the 1963-64 squad. He was also presented with the Fighting Heart award. This honor is given by the

Canyon Rotary Club. The big forward-center played a strong game for the Buffs all season long and ended up fourth in scoring and second in rebounding. Also presented at the banquet were the 1963-64 basketball co-captains, elected just prior to the final game of the season. The captains elect were senior Scottie Pierce of Post and Kirby Pugh.
