EDITORIAL...

Democratic Primary election. At that time, the election judge will stamp DEMOCRAT on your poll tax receipt or exemption certificate -- or affidavit form if you've

lost your receipt. That stamp entitles you to admission to the Democratic precinct convention and to vote in the Democratic run-off, if one is held. The same rule applies if you vote in the

Republican primary election. At the same time, the stamp on your poll tax makes it impossible for you to take part in any activities of the other party this year. For example, if your poll tax is stamped REPUBLICAN, you may not vote in a Democratic run-off. So when you vote in a primary, YOU will declare your party affiliation for this year.

Come next year, You could vote in the primary of the opposite party, as you will have a new poll tax receipt. Party affiliation DOES NOT APPLY in the General Election, due November 3rd. There you will be free to vote for the candidate of your choice -- regardless of which party nominated him, or what is printed on your poll tax receipt.

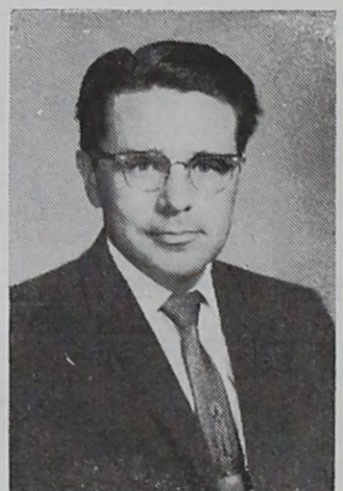

Sports In Brief

Athletic directors Frank Kimbrough of West Texas State University and Polk Robinson of Texas Tech College announced today the signing of a pact for one football meeting between two great Texas panhandle schools.

The Buffaloes of West Texas State will travel down to Lubbock on November 7 this year to meet the Red Raiders in Jones Stadium. The game will be played at 7:30PM.

Tech holds a 19-7 victory margin over the Buffs in games played between the two schools dating back to 1925. The last time the two teams met was in 1962 when the Buffs pulled off a 30-27 upset. West Texas had the flying heels'

of Pistol Pete Pedro to roll with at that time and Pete came through with two touchdowns running and passed to Jerry Don Logan for what proved to be the winning marker.
