The City Commission is scheduled to meet today to decide who will be the representatives on the committee.

As many of you may recall several months ago this issue was rather a controversial one between the Lubbock Negro Ministerial Allinace and the Rev. M.T. Reed, pastor of Mt. Vernon CME Church. The Alliance disagreed with Rev. Reed's selection of names, the ministers men with the City Commission to state why they had disagreed. At the meeting a let ter was read to the Commission explaining why. they thought a new list of names should be given for the I-R Committee. 

There was never a certain number given as to how many individuals will make up the Inter-Racial Committee, and by the same token was the number not given as to how many will represent each particular race, perhaps 1 to 5.

Let us hope that who ever is selected by the Commission will be capabel of attaining such goals as they are selected for...reguardless of their occupation.
