The members of the Lubbock Negro Interdenominational Ministerial Alliance disagreed this week with the means by which the Negro members of the city were recommended. A letter of request was read before the Mayor and City Commissioners on Thursday, June 27th, at the City Hall.

Here is a copy of the letter of request read at the hearing:

Lubbock, Texas June 24, 1963

To

The Honorable Mayor Jack Strong and City Commissioners, Lubbock, Texas

Gentlemen;

We, the members of the Lubbock Negro Interdenominational Minis terial Alliance, wish to challenge the confirmation of the Inter-racfal committee recommended by the Reverend M. T. Reed.

We are not opposed to the members that were recommended as individuals but we do challenge the rights of any one person making such recommendations. However, we feel that in a matter of this nature that we are as ministers the best representatives of the Negro welfare. Where-as, Lubbock has always taken care of our problems on a local level, we feel that this should be continued as a measure to help prevent outside agitation. Be it resolved that the needs among Negroes are common, namely; Equal Employment to qualified persons, Fair Housing, EqualOpportunity to public facilities.





S., (2) be not less than 23 nor more than 35 years of age, (3) be not less than 5'9" nor more than 6'6" in height, (4) have at least a high school edcuation or the equivalent, (5) be of good moral character and reputation, with no convictions for drunkenness, habitual traffic or other misdemeanor offenses, and no felony convictions, (6) be able to successfully pass rigid physical examination, usually within a few days following the written examination.



Each individual youth will be dealt with according to his problem. Some will be referred to other agencies within the city, and others may be counselled, then returned to their homes. It is our intention to utilize groul therapy sessions with youth and, in certain cases, with their parents.
