Dodson, president of the local group will present Mrs. Myra Hummings, one of the founders of this group, which had its beginning in 1913, on the campus of Howard University. Musical selections will be rendered by Sorors Roseana Harris and Eula Faye Williams.

From 4 to 6 pm Sunday, a founders day tea will be held at the home of Mrs. Willie Lusk, at 2302 Birch Avenue. All women of the city are graciously extended an invitation to this tea.

Some of you may think it is only essential to purchase a poll tax receipt during a national election year... but that's not correct... BE A CITIZEN EVERY YEAR.

You will have only until January 31st to purchase your poll tax receipt. Only those who have purchased this document are permitted to participate in any city, county, state or national election. Anyone who participates in an election must be a qualified voter and you can only vote after presenting a current poll tax receipt and only in the voting box designated on your receipt.

Don't be a "Rip Van Winkle" about purchasing a Poll Tax receipt... he slept for twenty years, without caring about local elections... and it profited him nothing.

Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority was organized in 1908 on the campus of Howard University in Washington, D.C.

From the beginning, one phase of activity has been the promotion, encouragement, and recognition of scholastic achievement. Partial attainment of the objective has come through the awarding of local scholarships by individual chapters. This continuing program has made a college education possible for literally hundreds of young women.

"Being aware of the increasing complexity of women's problems, especially those of Negro women, and realizing the necessity... to study and solve prob-

lems... in order to improve the social status of the race" Alpha Kappa Alpha sorors have been pioneers in planning and carrying out various programs of national scope. For example, in the early Twenties a Vocational Guidance program was designed to provide vocational and educational direction much needed by Negro high school girls in most communities.

Through the years Alpha Kappa Alpha Sorority has had as its chief aim "Service to all Mankind". There also remains the constant purpose "to cultivate and encourage high scholastic and ethical standards, improve the social status of the race, promote unity and friendship among college women, and keep alive within the alumnae an interest in college life and the progressive movements emanating therefrom."

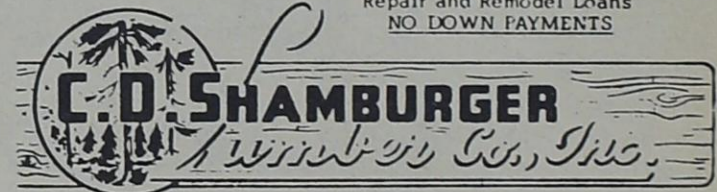
