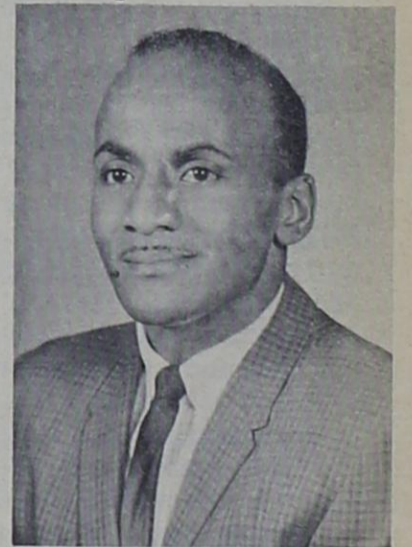
Theodore Phea, Jr. To Speak At Banquet

BECAUSE SOMEONE CARES

By Mr. Grover C. Colvin

(editors note: this address was delivered by Mr. Grover C. Colvin in a meeting at Wheatley Elementary of which he is principal on Sunday, March 21st, and intergrated group of Lubbock Citizens)

I am very happy to serve on this program. First, I would like to welcome you to this community in which I live. We are proud of our community, and I hope you will be too, second, shcond after marriage, my wife and I lived in a project semiliar in many respects to Green-Fair. It was the first federal housing for low income families in Texas, at Austin. These formative years of residence provided opportunity in cooperative living with people of like interest, social standing, and economics. The families participated in classes, social affairs, and projects that made for a better life. And third, I have followed with keen interest the work of the total team in the urban renewal program to provide better living conditions for the people affected.

That program points out an address by me. Recorded in the fourth chapter of Genesis and the ninth verse are these words-"And the Lord said unto Cain, where is Abel thy brother? And he said, I know not: Am I my brother's keeper?" For a subject I would use these words, "Because someone cares"-you are here this hour because someone cares.

OUR VIEW OF GREEN FAIR

Food, clothing, and shelter are essential for the well being of all people. This program provides for low rent thusly assuring that the individual will have a part of his low income for the other necessities of life. These beautiful and healthful apartments have all the latest conveniences one could ask for. The health, comfort, and welfare of the occupants of these units come first-because "some one cares."

Opportunity derive from perfect through the cooperative effort of the Aka, Delta, YWCA, Texas Tech, and other interested organizations. A planned program of one, vocational training; two adult educational programs; three, house keeping programs; four, Green-Fair training programs classes in sewing and sanitation; five, tie in with job opportunities; and six, community, church, ans school.

RESPONSIBILITY TO KEEP PLACE CLEAN

The opportunities we enjoy carry responsibilities. As we enjoy the opportunities made possible because "some one cares" let us be mindful of our duties. Green-Fair project is a non-profit organization. Cost of operation and maintenance must be shared by the occupants. Care and use of equipment is the responsibility of each member. Each member must do his share to see that use less cars and discorded toys and rubbish are not allowed to accumulate on the grounds. Each member has the responsibility of teaching his children to live peacefully with his neighbor. Children must be taught the care and respect of the rights of others. Participation in church and school activities is a cherished part of this community. We welcome and accept you in this community, "because some one cares."

The members that made this team, "some one cares" are the tax payers of this city, and officers. The urban renewal agency, Mr. Wheatley and Mr. Stokely, who will continue to work for your well being in your new community relationship all because "some one cares."
