Twenty-one students of the Mary & Mac Kindergarten department graduated last Tuesday

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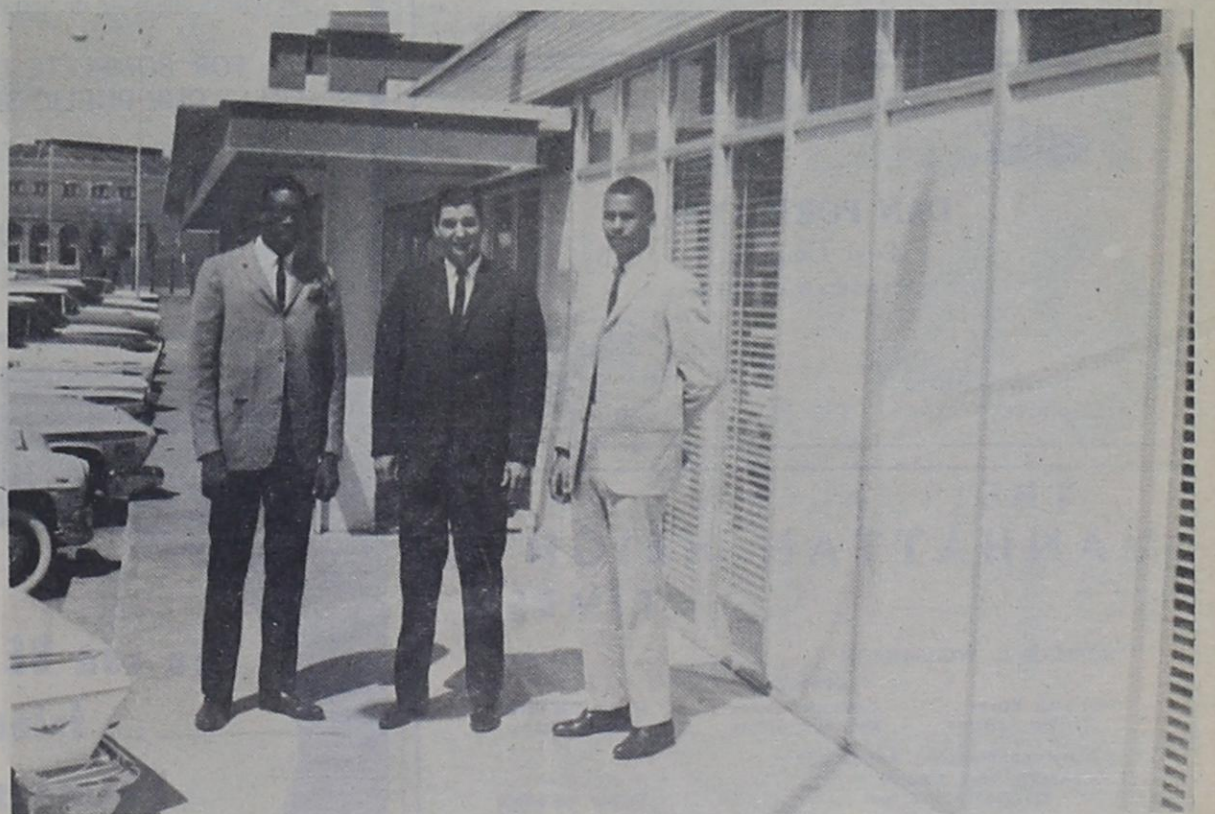

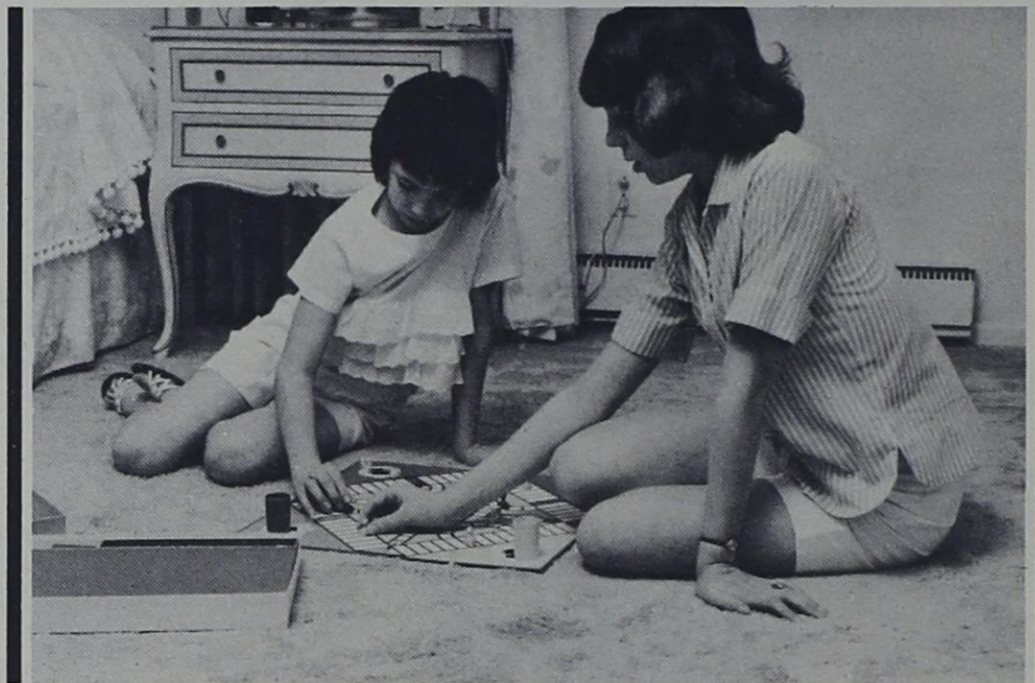

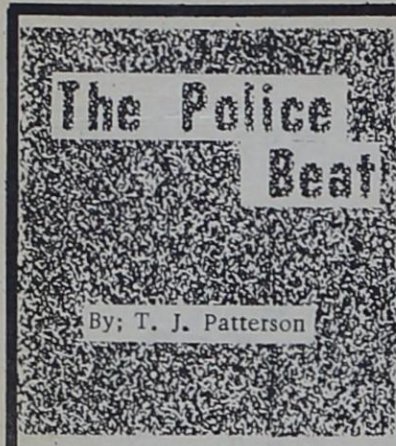

he got up and walked out of his house to the ambulance. In talking to him further he declined to tell officers what really happened.

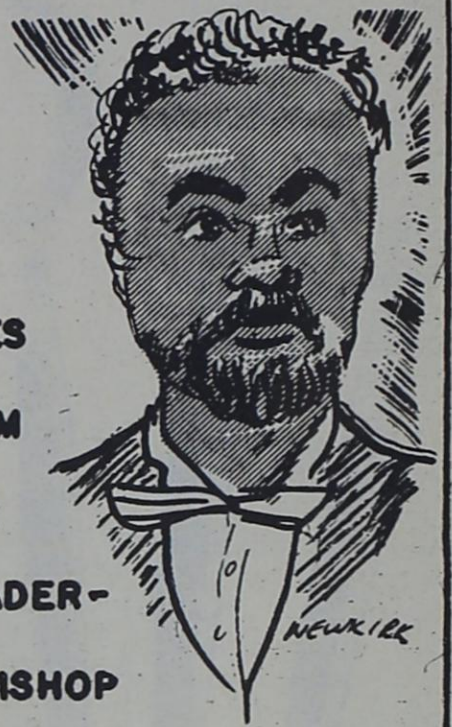

A thirty year-old woman, mother of five children, was arrested last Friday evening in connection with the pistol slaying of James W. Sneed, 25, of Lubbock.

According to Detective Ernest Rector, the suspect, Dorothy Ruth Campbell who resides at 705 Avenue E, Apt. 2, signed a statement admitting firing a shot at Sneed, which climaxed a quarrel that began last Thursday night and ended in the office building at an apartment complex in the 700 block of Avenue D shortly after 3:00 pm last Friday.

Sneed was shot in the left chest by a single bullet from a .22 caliber, chrome-plated derringer, purchased Friday from a pawn shop.

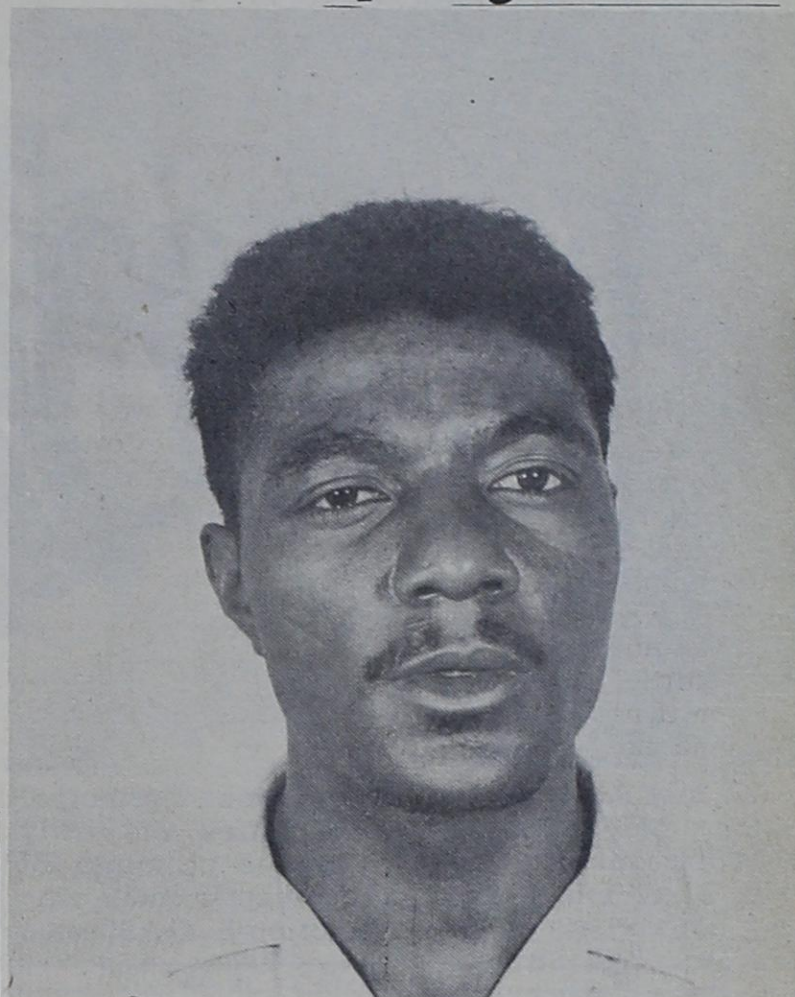
