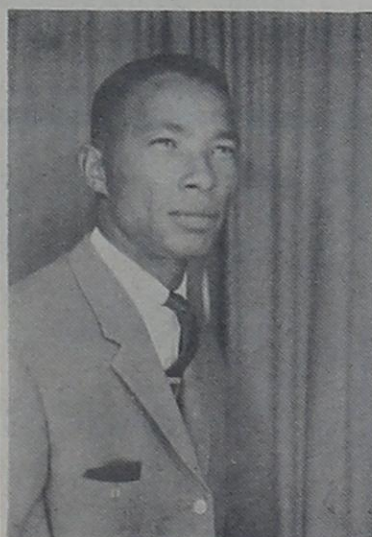

The Pattersons have three children: Avis, 5; Thomas, Jr., 4, and Shelia Renee, 2. They reside at 2405 Globe.

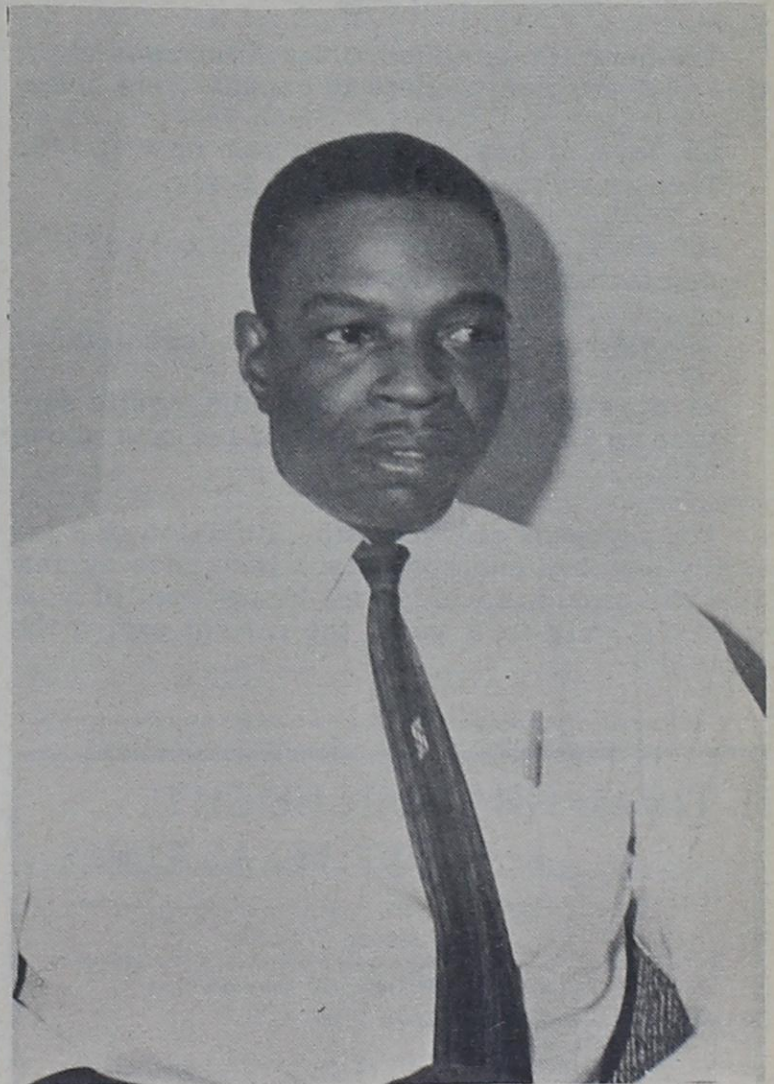

LOOK AT MEDICARE

As many of you know the Medicare Bill was passed by Congress and signed by President Lyndon Johnson on last week. One fact is which legislatures are saying is that it is a major break through in American social welfare legislation.

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1. Assures virtually all Americans 65 years or older of hospitalization and nursing home protection at low cost.
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The worker earning at least \$6,600 will pay \$227.20 next year, and his employer the same. In 1967 and 1968 they each will pay \$290.40 and by 1975 they will pay \$356.40 each.

This is to help support a program whose cost has been estimated at just under \$6.5 billion a year.

The benefits provided older Americans under this bill are many. Here in capsule, are some:

- 60 days of hospitalization at a cost of \$40. Then, another 30 days at \$10 a day.
- 100 days in a nursing home at a cost of \$5 a day for each day above 20.
- 100 visits at home from nurses or technicians.
- 20 days of out patient hospital diagnostic service for \$20 and 20 per cent of the cost above \$20.

For payment of \$3 a month, inclusion in a federally matched and supervised insurance system that will provide coverage for 80 per cent of most doctor's bills in a year, the patient paying the first \$50.
