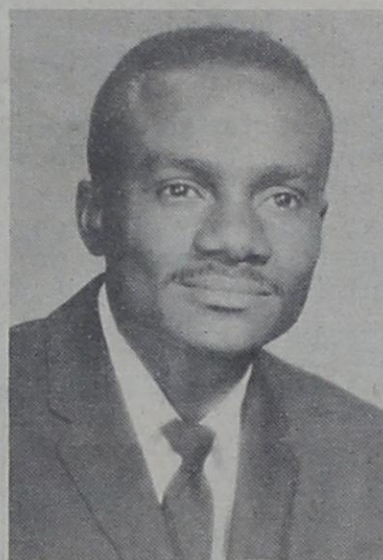

# OPERATION HEAD START

Dear Parents:

We have been given a grant by the Office of Economic Opportunity to begin a "HEAD START" program in the city of Lubbock. This should prove to be most valuable asset to the children of this City. We beg your assistance in this venture.

We have room for five hundred children in the program. The children must be those who will be entering first grade this coming fall, they must be six by September 1. The children will be given pre-school training. They will be given meals and medical attention.

This program differs from the Lubbock Public School Pre-School Program and will not interfere with it.

There must be absolutely no sectarian or racial differentiation in this venture. The consideration here is the good of any child who can benefit. Our endeavor is to give the needy children some little start so that there is less chance of drop-out and subsequent delinquency.

Classes will begin June 28 and continue for eight weeks. Any text books used will be those approved for Public School use. Addresses of the school centers are:

We are asking for the cooperation of the entire community. There will be a meeting for anyone who wishes to take part in the "HEAD START" program in the hall at St. Elizabeth's Catholic Church, 2305 Main Street, Friday, June 18, at 7:30 P.M.. Those interested in helping the young children of Lubbock are invited to do so. We need block visitors, class room helpers, transportation volunteers, carpenters, and everyone who has a talent they are willing and ready to offer. We need women, men, and high school students.

All pre-registrations should find their way to the Newman Center, if any way possible by Sunday, June 20, so we can get an approximate estimate of the number planning to attend.

Living up to her previous statement, she is presently enrolled in summer school at the institution. She is an advanced Junior.

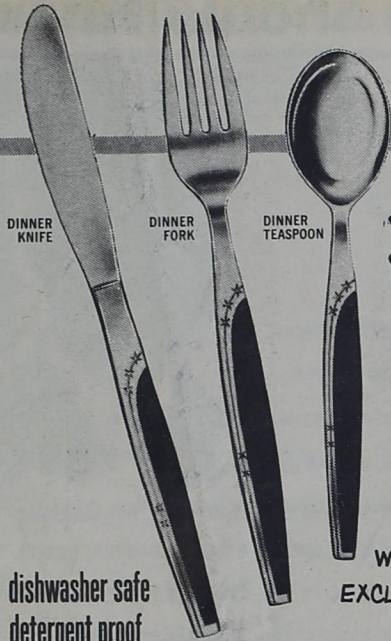

# WHAT HOPE CAN DO FOR YOU

By Norman Vincent Peale

It is a thrill to see a person who has a failure record really get reorganized.

For example, the other day a man said, "Everything I did went wrong. I was a failure. And worst of all I felt powerless to resist my own tradition of failure."

"Say that again," I said, "...that statement about your tradition of failure, I have never heard it put quite so well." Here, for sure, was real perception.

That phrase sure does describe a human difficulty encountered, and perhaps experienced, by all of us. So many people have just that -- a tradition of failure. A person has bungled something that meant a lot of him, has fallen down on some important test; and instead of extracting know-how from the experience and doing better, he broods and starts thinking failure thoughts. Result? A second failure, a third, a fourth. Presently he is in the failure groove, so to speak and failure becomes his way of thinking. He is victim of overpowering personal tradition of failure.

"I knew," continued this man, "that I had to break that pattern somehow. So I decided one thing I could do was to go to church. I was lucky for I found a church where the minister really loved human beings. He knew what to do with me, too. On his advice I joined a men's group which met twice a week. They made me completely at home, surrounded me with friendship.

"One evening one of these men happened to quote St. Paul's words: 'So faith, hope, love abide, these three....' He told how had filled his mind with these three things and as a result changed his life. Well, I thought, if that worked for him I will take the tip and try to bring more faith and love to bear in my daily problems.

"I also tried to make myself more interested in other people. There had been a lot of people I resented and disliked, and that's putting it mildly. I practiced for-

giving and goodwill. In fact, I really worked at it.

But still I was a failure. I asked the advice of the group and one man suggested, 'Maybe you are neglecting that middle word, hope. Why not work at developing a hopeful attitude?'

"So I began to practice thinking hopefully. I worked at this from morning to night. It didn't come easily but it came. If I got with people who were talking negatively about something, I would try to counter by talking hopefully about it. After a while I got my mind so filled with hope that everything around me came to be touched by hope. And that was when I was set free from my failure tradition and began to live a lot more effectively.

"In fact," he concluded, "I was literally saved by hope."

So it seems that hope is an important factor in being an effective and successful person. To become a person of hope you have to cultivate it. You do not become hopeful just by saying, "From now on I'll have hope." It takes practice. It takes real thought-conditioning.

"But there is one encouraging fact about the human mind. If you dwell long enough upon any quality and practice it you will develop it. Think hope -- practice hope -- and you will have hope.

Ernest Hemingway in "For Whom the Bells Toll" tells of a certain brigade in the Spanish Civil War. This man "never knew when anything was lost and if it was, he would fight out of it." That is the way with people who have the quality of hope. It keeps them going no matter what. Hope gives courage, strength, vitality, power; and somehow hopeful people always seem to come through.

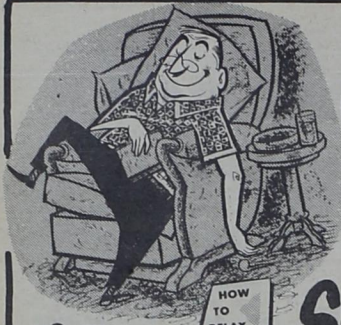

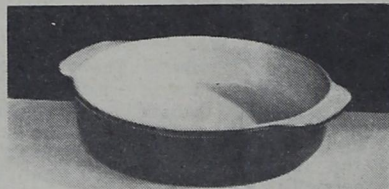
