### Lubbockites Return From Summer Camp

# VIET NAM WAR IS REAL

It is hard to put into words exactly what the Viet Nam war will lead to next. World leaders, diplomatic leaders, ambassadors, political figures, and an ennumerous variety of press agents (home and abroad) have given their views both oral and compositional wise and yet still haven't come up with the solution to the problem.

During my year of experience in this war torn country, one which I'll never forget, I have eaten, slept, conversed, and even window shopped with natives of this Southeast Asia country. One phenomenon which I have weighed since I've left this main land is the feeedom of press given to foreign news medias. I can recall when President Diem, who was assassinated in 1963, deported a reporter of one of America's well-known magazines because of the information he was releasing to the world.

Many of us have probably asked ourselves many a times, "What are we doing in Viet Nam?" "Is Viet Nam really worth the lives of an American, let alone the hundreds who are dying constantly?"

General Timms, one of the leaders in III Corps while I was there, answered the first question for me during the second day I was in the country when he briefed a group of us who were assigned to MAAG. He said, "If we lose this country, countries like Cambodia, Laos, Bangkok, and the remaining Southeast Asia would fall in COMPLETE control of the Communist."

I am sure, that our most immediate and adamant answers would be in accord with the General's, namely; we are in Viet Nam to try to prevent a complete communist take over in Southeast Asia, and second, The above answer makes the heroic sacrifice of United States lives in Viet Nam worthwhile and necessary.

The President is now being advised to expand the war in Viet Nam. He is under great pressure from the Chiefs of Staff to take this action.

Regardless of how much pressure is brought upon the President to expand the war, it is his decision to make and he is directly responsible to the people. The Chiefs of Staff No. They are directly responsible only to the President of the United States.....

It is an easy task to sit in Washington and expand the war. It is not easy for a weeping family to understand why it had to be their Tom, Dick, or Harry who had to die, nor is it easy for an American fighting man to live and fight in a country like this mysterious one.

Personally, I don't believe the President's decision to expand the war or not to expand the war should be based upon pressure. It should be based on such facts as how much the people in South Viet Nam want to keep their country free from the ugly force of Communism. If these people have little or no desire to help the South Vietnamese soliders win the war, then we may as well do little more than hold on to our present course.

A vivid but sad example of the apathy on the part of some of the Vietnamese is the fact that some of the villagers will let the Viet Cong infiltrate and partially destroy their security. They

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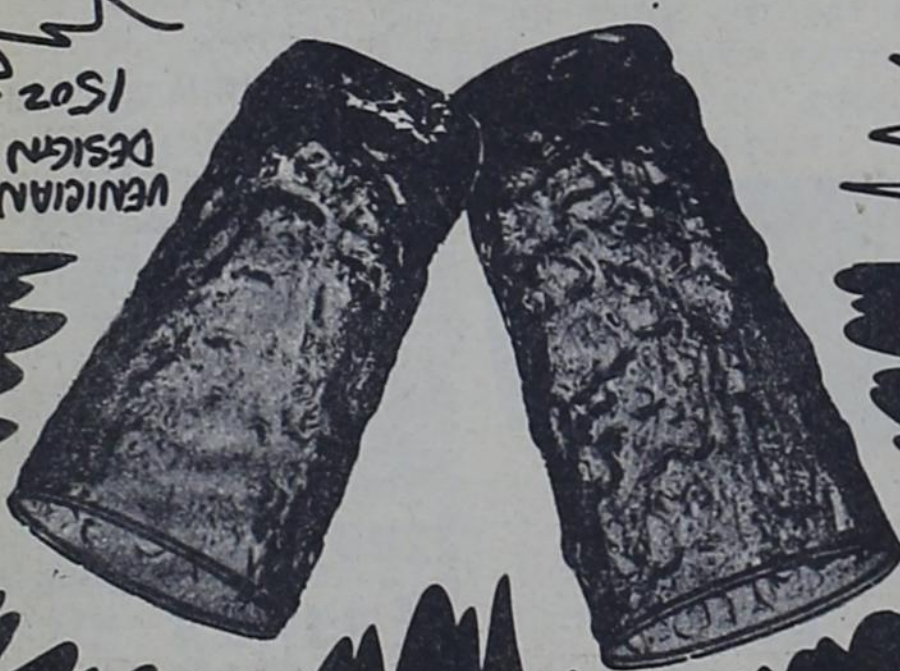

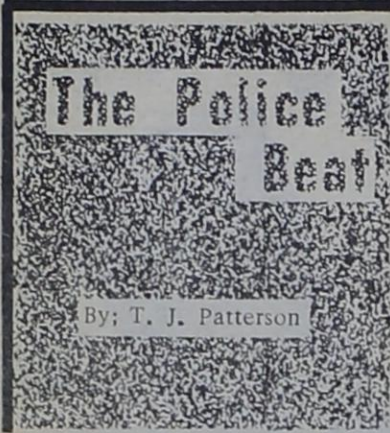

Clay seeks the annulment on grounds that Mrs. Clay had reneged on a promise to embrace her husband's Muslim faith.

will not tell Americans less known their fighting men about it.

Some top military men believe that by stepping up the action in Viet Nam will bring on a show down with Red China now, instead of later when the Chinese may well be a nuclear power.

It is a known fact that the Red Chinese leaders do not place a very high value on individual life. For in overpopulated and under fed China a few million more or less makes little difference.

There is little hope for world peace in the present leaders. But perhaps there is hope in the younger generation of Chinese. The ideas of individual worth and human dignity are permeating the bamboo and iron curtains. The only question is, Will the world last long enough for enough people to get the message?

We have backed the President's policy in Viet Nam and we will continue to back it so long as his judgement is based upon pertinent facts given by military experts, and not by pressure from advisors.....

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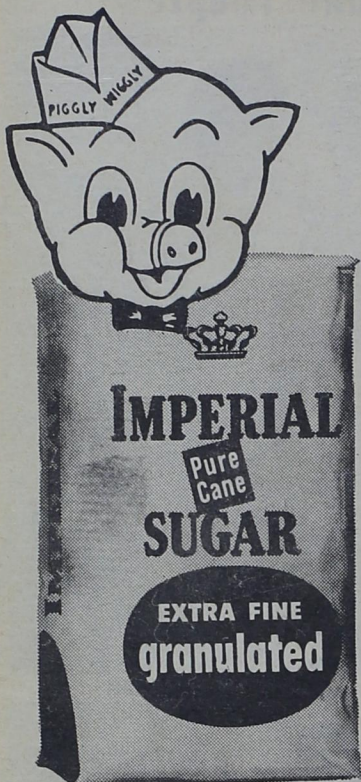
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
