Word of Truth Convention Opens Today

The vanguard of an expected 6,000 delegates to the "Word of Truth" District Convention began arriving in the City today. A task force of skilled installation experts and other specialized workers arrived earlier in the week to begin the job of transforming the Coliseum into an enlarged Kingdom Hall. Watchtower officials said the meet is drawing representatives from 21 states and two foreign countries.

E.C. Outten, local minister, said reservations had already been confirmed for a total of 328 Negro delegates to the convention. A total of 500 are expected in the Hub City before the convention concludes Sunday at 6 pm with song and prayer. Outten said a check of delegates showed some had come from as far off as Wichita, Kansas and Houston and almost without exception family groups are attending.

"Assembling to worship God with persons of like precious faith is a joyful event for lovers of Bible truth," Outten commented, "and the Lubbock assembly promises to be an outstanding one for Jehovah's Witnesses." Outten said a series of

programs developed by the congregations to stimulate anticipation for the convention was a contributing factor to the large number of attendees.

The gathering is one of 30 being held in the States and Canada. Outten extended an invitation for interested Bible students to attend

any or all of the sessions starting at Fair Park Coliseum today. The featured address of the four-day seminar is scheduled for Sunday afternoon at 3 pm, when "World Government on the Shoulder of the Prince of Peace" will be delivered by Harry A. Fetizik, District Supervisor from Brooklyn.

The Co-chairmen for the fund raising project in East Lubbock, George Woods and George Scott, Jr., have worked hard to help make this dream a reality for the many boys and girls who will use the facilities in the years to come.

CONGRESS STUDIES COINS

The Senate has passed a bill (S-2080) giving the President most of which he wanted in control over the amount of silver to be used in U.S. coins. Essentially, it eliminates the use of silver in quarters and dimes and retains the use of a portion of silver in the half dollars.

When a similar proposal was considered by a House Committee, the group voted to take silver out of all coins including the half dollars. At the time of this writing, the matter is due for consideration by the full house. A conference then will be necessary to iron out differences between the Senate and the House versions.

Here are the high points of the Senate Bill:

* The half dollar shall have a diameter of 1.205 inches; a cladding of an alloy of 800 parts silver and copper such that the whole coin weighs 11.5 grams and contains 4.6 grams of silver and 6.9 grams of copper.

* The quarter dollar shall have a diameter of .955 inches; a cladding of an alloy of 75 per cent copper and 25 per cent nickle; a core of copper such that the weight of the whole coin is 5.67 grams.

* The dime shall have a diameter of .705 inches; a cladding of an alloy of 75 per cent copper and 25 per cent nickle; and a core of copper such that weight of the whole coin is 2.268 grams.

* Whenever the Secretary of the Treasury feels it necessary to do so, he may prohibit, curtail or regulate the exportation, melting, or treating of any coin of the United States... This includes the power to confiscate and coin exported or melted or any metal resulting from such melting if the order is invoked.

It might be worth a couple of lines to define some of the terms in the Bill:

A CLAD COIN is a coin composed of three layers of metal, the two outer layers being of identical composition, and metallurgically bonded to an inner layer.

"CLADDIN" refers to the outer layers of a clad coin. The inner layer is referred to as the core.

Before voting on the accepted bill, the Senate rejected a series of amendments which would have left the silver content unchanged or at least modified the reduction of silver content in U.S. coinage.

Even though the amendments were defeated, some of the arguments presented in them are worth further study. Here are some of the key points.

At least three European nations which had abandoned silver coinage later returned to it.

The number of silver dollars in circulation is dwindling as people are holding them against the day when the U.S. issues a "cheaper coin."

One Senator has stated the arrival of the new coins with their reduced or removed silver content will cause silver coins now in circulation to disappear. The case of the Kennedy halves was pointed out as an example of how a coin can disappear from circulation even though produced in large quantities.

From The Firing Line

By Dick J. Reavis, Demopolis, Alabama

Last week a difficult week for Marengo County civil rights workers. Only the Fourth of July, two of our workers, both juveniles, were marched into a "sweat box" in the Marengo County jail in Linden. When the older prisoners questioned this, the jailers replied by spraying tear gas into the cell. They were kept in until Sunday, July 11.

Although we transported almost 600 persons to the court house during the week, only half of them were allowed to register. Tuesday there was violence. Outside the court house, Charlie Saulsberry, a Negro worker, and his camera taken from him by law officers, who stripped the film from it. At the same time, Deputy choked Saulsberry until he blurted out a "Yes Sir" to the High Sheriff. That same afternoon, a white worker, "Arkansas" Benston, was threatened with death by a Deputy, and in the presence of witnesses. A Vermont student volunteer, Ruth Levin, was orally abused by policemen, who made astonsihinly obscene remarks to her---again in the presence of several witnesses.

Tuesday night, in Demopolis, two young women, one of them carrying a small child, were sprayed with acid as they walked down a street in the Negro District.

Their attackers were four young whites. Although the two girls received only minor burns, the chemical found its way into the eyes of the three-year-old child, donig considerable damage. Later in the evening, police interrogated one of the girls. According to her statement, they presented her with pictures of what they called "suspects"-----local Negro civil rights workers.

Saturday morning a hearing was held in Demopolis by the Civil Rights Commission. Complaints from a three-county area were heard and recorded. Members of the Commission were thoroughly shocked. Just
