The Lubock City Council has approved a Public Accommodations Ordinance making it illegal to discriminate against customers on the basis of race, color, sex, age, ethnic background or national origin.

The problem of

discrimination by some nightclub owners was brought to the council's attention by the Human Relations Commission. Several complaints had been received by the city's Human Relations Officer from persons who said they were denied entry into the clubs. Most common practices included requiring various identification cards, a dress code and claiming to be a private club open to members

Continue from Page 1 ... are covered by the ordinance. Specifically excluded are bona fide private clubs, religious or ethnic organizations.

Any person who feels they have been deniled entry or denied service because of their race, sex age or ethnic background can file a complaint in Municipal Court, 10th Street and Avenue J. If the party is found guilty, a fine up to \$200 can be set.

As we noted in our telegram of support, this piece of legislation was one of the most critical congressional actions in behalf of the small business community in years. The veto action, however, has no effect on the minority enterprise bill which has been signed into law. Appropriations for the minority enterprise provisions are currently pending before Congressonal Committee.

SBA SHAKE-UP The Small Business Administation is slated to lose one of its top ranking women officials. According to informed sources, Deputy Administrator Patricia M. Cloherty handed in a resignation last week.

MINORITY BROADCAST LOAN PROGRAM NOT STRICTLY MINORITY.... Under a new SBA loan program to assist minorities in the purchase of broadcast properties, only 7 out of 32 firms selected thus far are owned by minorities. After considerable prodding from the Federal Communications Commissin (FCC) the SBA announced the new program in January, and reported that it was designed to help minority entrepreneurs. However, the majority of firms receiving loans under this program are not from the disadvantaged or minority groups. Include among the firms recently awarded loans is a company headed by NBC-TV TODAY HOST SHOW, Tom Brokaw, who received a \$345,000 loan guarantee.

Through the Pennsylvania NAACP Newsletter, we may share with all of our reader. across the nation a "front page" type of story which may not have appeared in many of our local communities. We hear the possibly had news; but when the allegations are disproved, so often nothing is said.

We all want to congratulate former Pennsylvania Secretary of the Commonwealth C. Delores Tucker and her supporters. We would remind our readers to become aware of untrustworthy friends who let us down, as did Pennsylvania Governor Shapp.

The Newsletter relates the story of what happened to Ms. Tucker in the following

(Editor's note: In September 1977 Secretary of the Commonwealth C. DeLores Tucker, the highest ranking black state appointee in the nation, was rired by Gov. Shapp. The Governor charged that Secy. Tucker used her office for activities unrelated to her government duties. For two months the State Justice Department studied the charges and on November 29, 1977 ruled that the criminal charges

Tucker were not warranted. The following is an extract from the district attorney's statement at press conference.)

"Based upon the facts and circumstances of this case, including the absence of any legislative pronouncement making the receipt of honorarias by cabinet officials illegal or the use of staff personnes and considering that section 18 pro 3926 subsection B, defining theft and division of services, fails to give legal adequate warning that conduct of the rature described in this case would constitute a criminal offense. It is my opinion that the initation of criminal charges by this office against former secretary of state, C. Delores Tucker, is not war-

ranted. My review included the teview of the text of several hundred speeches, which represents a sampling of Mrs. Tucker's speeches, to various organizations and groups throughout the United States.

It is obvious that Mrs. Tucker, while a cabinet official, derived personal benefit in the form of honorariums for delivering speeches prepared by her state department employees. As a practical matter every high government official derives some form of benefit by speaking to various groups or organizations. It may take the form of money, prustige, or exposure for political purposes. Many public appearances are required by public officials. especially at the cabinet level They usually rely upon staff. to some extent, for their preparation of their speeches.

In complete fairness, such a practice is not unique to Mrs. Tucker. I suspect it is the practice of most public officials at all levels of government to utilize their staffs to some extent for preparation of their speeches. Keep in mind it is not my function to pass upon the ethical propriety of Mirs. Tucker's conduct, but only its legality in terms of existing statutes of the Pennsylvania crime

In the absence of any legislative guidlines for the performance of duties and responsibilities by state cabinet officials, a careful analysis of criminal statute mus, be

The Commonwealth and its state government did receive benefit by reason of the services rendered by the state employees in drafting Mrs. Tucker's speeches. The quasi public nature of ar appearance by a cabinet official makes it extremely difficult to separate the point at which those benefits accrue to the different parties. Thus to apply criminal sauction to er conduct where the results

opinion by an improper exercise of my prosecutorial discretion.

The governor's board of ethic had its hearing and rendered advisory opinion number nine to Governor Shapp back in April 1975 and I quoted in the memo to Attorney General Kane one paragaph from the board's decision. "She is black, a woman, and the highest ranking such person in any state government in the United States. The message that she largely brings to the various organiations she speaks to is to urge citizen involvement, especially to the youth and mir orities to improve our system of government."

In conclusion, based upon the facts and the circumstances, a criminal prosecution in this case is not warranted. This office now considers the matter closed!

Cooke, II, local businessman in our city. This writer wants to call Brother Cooke's attention to the fact that we (Blacks) want to know whats going on. Any information would be of a positive value, Brother

If we receive no information on what's happening, then we don't need no representative from the Black Community.

Let us hear from you Brother Cooke. so we can inform our readers on what is going on. We know you are capable, but we haven't heard from you about some of the activities.



BLACK BARPANUER ARBAYE By Dr. Nathaniel Wright, jr. Human Rights Activist

BLACK ROLE MODEL

The MacMillan Publishing Company has rendered both a social and artistic service, especially for black Americans, in its publication of Ntozake Shange's lyric poetry for the Broadway hit, for colored girls who have considered suiciae when the rain-

bow is enuf. Ms. Shange is a beautiful 28 year old young woman with a searching spirit and a penetratingly brilliant mind. Her sentimen's -indeed her challenge to herself and to all black women, men and young people-are made available for a wide audience

in her recent book. for colored girls makes immensely rewarding reading for some of the same reasons that the Broadway show has been such a continuous hit, drawing audiences to their feet in moments of truth when ecstatic revelations take

The message of the book should be read and discussed both in our family circles and in high school and college classrooms. Discussion is important, since the pithy lines contain much which bear both perusal and studied interpretation. The meanings of her words come, at times,

almost kaleidoscopically. While the Broadway show plays for a breathless hour and a half without interruption, the book affords time o pause, to reflect and to digest far more fully the delicious, delicate and thoroughly Jevastating lines and

This is tremendously iraportant, since the book, for

colored girls who have considered suicide when the rainbow is enuf, speaks a message of liberation not just to a particular segment of our society but to our times.

For example, the lyrics seem on the surface to speak repeatedly of human frustrations, limitations and frailty in terms of what we generally call "sex." Upon more sober reflection, sex, as we traditionally perceived it, is not the prime issue at all.

Ms. Shange herseif notes that sex is a far too limited term to denote the Juliness of what loving adults have to share with their temporary or long term spouses. "I prefer the term human sensuality rather than human sexuality," she explains. By sensuality Ms. Shange would encompass the widest range of human feelings, indeed, all that may go by the idea of sense, sensations or of senti-

The conviction here comes through perhaps most clearly in her concluding lyric, "I found God in mysel? and I loved her, I loved her fiercely." Implicit here is the thoroughly ecstatic recognition that all of the good that creation holds-including the brightest joys of heaven"are embodied, even now, in

What we must find in ourselves, if life is to know some measure of its fulfillment, is nothing short of divine. Sensuality, in the sense noted here, involves divinity sensing itself or reaching out for an encounter with and a reciprocal sharing of divinity with divinity. For young people who want to find meaning for themselves, Ntozake Shange has much to say in both her book and in her life, the

major meaning of which the book reveals. Ms. Shange is a graduate of Barnard College, holds the M.A. degree from the University of California and has done doctoral work at Boston University. She is well

prepared. Her own criteria for successful artistic work come through clearly in her book. She holds that three ingredients as essential for all successful writing. ... and for all rewarding appreciation of any reality. These are (1) a sense of discipline, (2) clarity and (3) style.

Unless one dedicates her-self or himself to excellence (which in her lyrics suggest self-realization as a synonym for reaching out for the nothing less than the very best), then we are not true to ourselves. Indeed, we do not know ourselves.

Clarity suggests honesty. Honesty with ourselves. Honesty in the offering of our best mind, taients, determination and sacrifice. And honesty in our confrontations of ourselves. . and all others.

By style, Ms. Shange simply has it. or rather is it. In her life experience, style has been the spontialeous outburst of a disciplined mind when-through pain, practice, frustration, joy, the considering of suicide and some intimacy with the rain-

bow-new and liberating awareness have dawned "pon

Throughout the book, par-

ents will find page after page and line after line where our society's thoroughgoing failure even to understand the idea of reciprocity presents itself. As parents become enmeshed in the clarification of what it means for young people to engage in reciprocal relations, they will come -almost inescapably-to their own moment of truth. Ine practice of reciprocity will be seen to be largely foreign to the prevailing ways or lifestyles of the age in which we live or in the generation by which our parents themselves have been taught.

The book, for colored girls who have considered suicide when the rainbow is enuf. should be seen and embraced as an almost unperalleled opportunity. The Broadway play repre-

sents a momentary or perhaps all too brief engagement of our senses with glory-filled worlds hidden too greatly from our daily imaginings. The book, however, allows us repeated and prolonged opportunities to muse, to reflect, to re-think, to apply and to re-assess the personal meanings of the loneliness, isolation and almost incissent inaclity to see the rainbow. To Ntozake Shange the rainbow hevers nearby simply awaiting an encounter from an insulate. and so a needles-ly pain-filled world.

CONGRESSMAN LOUIS STOKES

through the Carrus office at 202-225-1691. Congressman Stokes has been a stalwart champion of governmens spending-and bank deposit-policies which bring progressively equitable benefits to blacks and other minorities. More of his singularly illustrious work on our

On November 5, 1968, Louis Stokes was elected Congressman of the 21st Congressional District of Ohio, on his first try for public office. By virtue of his election he became the first black member of Congress from the State of Ohio. On November 2, 1976, he was reelected to his fifth term in Congress. During his first term in Congress he served as a member of the Education and Labor Committee and the House Internal Security

Committee. In his second term of office he was the first black member to be appointed to the Appropriations Commitee of the House. On February 8, 1972, Louis Stokes was elected as Chairman of the Congressional Black Caucus. he served two consecutive terms in this office. In addition to his seat on the powerful Appropriations Committee, on February 5, 1975 he was elected by the Democratic Caucus to serve on the new Budget Committee of

the House. On January 11, 1977, he was re-elected to an additional two year term on the Budget Committee. He now serves as Chairman of the House Budget Committed's Task Force on Community and Physical Resources. This Task Force has juvisdiction over approximately 80 billion dollars of the Federal Bud-

On September 21, 1976, Congressman Stokes was an ointed by Speaker Carl Albert to serve on the Select Committee to conduct an investigation and study of the circumstances surrounding

the death of John F. Kennedy and the death of Martin Luther King, Jr. On March 8, 1977, Speaker Thomas P. "Tip" O'Neill appointed Congressman Stokes Chairman of this Committee.

Prior to his election, Louis Stokes hed practiced law for 14 years in Cleveland, Ohio, and was chief trial counsel for the law firm of Stokes, Character, Perry, Whitehead, Young and Davidson. As a practicing lawyer, he participated in several cases in the United States Supreme Court. In 1968 he personally argued the landmark "stop and frisk" case of Terry vs. Ohio in that court. His brother, Carl B. Stokes, coanchorman for NBC-TV, New York, made history in Cleveland in 1967 by becoming America's first black mayor of a major American

Rep. Stokes is the recipient of numerous awards, includ ing the Cleveland Branch, NAACP Distinguished Service Award, the U.S. Commission on Civil Rights Certificate of Appreciation and honorary Doctor of Law degrees from Wilberforce University and Shaw Univer-

He is married to Jeanette (Jay) Stokes and has four children, Shelly, Louis C., Angela and Lorene.

REALISM AND KAGE

A review of The Motion of History and Other Plays by Amiri Baraka (LeRoi Jones) (William Morrow and Company, N.Y., 1978) 225 pages -Hard Cover \$8.95

Le Roi literally means "the king," and such in the minds of a multitude of literary critics is Le Roi Jones now to be known preferably as Amiri Baraka. Baraka's books are to be found on display on book shelves around the world. He is his city's best-known world citi-

But more important, he is a diminutive genius, whose remarkably well-used rage enables him to paint insightful pictures which add realistic, but all too often unseen dimensions that open ar. 1 urmask realities. Such especially is his depiction of The Notion of History, which is a revolutionary history of the United States from colonial days to the present.

Admittedly socialist in orientation, one may readily separate the author's theoretical approach from the hard and inescapable facts.

Two other plays, Slave Ship and S-1, are included in the volume. One tells a story of enslavement. The other is a call to revolutionary action. It has been said, "Lose your head, lose your case." 
