First Lady Launches White House **Mentoring Program**

WASHINGTON (AP) -- lady Michelle Obama WASHINGTON (AP)—
First lady Michelle Obama
launched a mentoring program
Monday to give local high
school girls access to women at
the White House.
Thirteen of the girls joined the
first lady and 18 White House

first lady and 18 White House staffers, including advisers Va-lerie Jarrett and Melody Barnes, in the State Dining Room to kick off the program, which Mrs. Obama said was one of her top goals on becoming first lady. "We thought, what can we do to make the White House differ-ent, to make kids in our own

ent, to make kids in our own new neighborhood know that the White House is a place for them?" she said.

White House is a place for them?" she said.
Her voice cracking with emotion, Mrs. Obama said the program was started to let local kids "know that the president of the United States hears you and values you and cares about your growth and development."
The program is intended to inspire 10th- and 11th-grade girls from public and private schools in Washington, Maryland and Virginia by giving them access to accomplished women.
"It's also about understanding that all of us have had challenges

that all of us have had challenges and bumps along the way, and to know that there's just a level of moving through it that all of us have had to do," she said. Mrs. Obama said that she and

her husband, President Barack Obama, grew up in modest circumstances without a lot of access to power. But they did have parents and other people who had consistent interests in their lives. She listed her mother, neighbors and 5th-grade teacher youth ad icon

Annise Parker City controller Annise Parker topped a field of four major candidates running for mayor on Tuesday, and former city attorney Gene Locke, a nephew of Wilbert Locke of Lubbock, edged a big-spending city council member to earn the second spot in a runoff next month.

sexual orientation never was an
issue in six years on City Council and six years as city controller, would make Houston the
nation's largest city to be led by
an openly gay person.

"I absolutely believe in my

"Il understand I have a responsibil-ity and I am a role model and I've been a role model for a very long time. But it makes me a long time. But it makes me a role model in every community." 

Child Care Assistance Available To More South **Plains Families**

The Workforce Solutions South Plains Board of Directors recently approved new income eligibility guidelines for Child Care Assistance provided by the agency. The board recently re-ceived additional child care as-sistance, finding through the ceived additional child care as-sistance funding through the American Recovery and Rein-vestment Act (ARRA) which was designed to increase the number of children in care for number of children in care for low income individuals. The ARRA funding enabled the Board to establish higher income guidelines. The former child care assistance income requirements for the South Plains region were established in 2003 at 185% of the Federal Poverty Guidelines. The new guidelines allow child care assistance to be provided to those individuals whose income is at 75% of the State Median Income Estimates published in the Federal Register. It is estimated that the new ter. It is estimated that the new eligibility standards will allow child care funding for eight hun-dred additional children. The new criteria became effective on October 1st. Workforce Solu-tions Child Care Services expect to see the increase in both part-time and full-time child care.

Obama to Announce Help for Small Banks, Businesses

WASHINGTON (AP)

rescue fund as the administration refocuses the bailout money on small businesses and homeown-ers and winds down programs aimed at big banks.

Obama on Wednesday plans Obama on Wednesday plans to announce a package of initiatives designed to increase lending, including a request that Congress increase caps for existing Small Business Administration loans, the administration said

The new effort comes as the administration is under pressure from liberals to shift the massive bailout fund's spending away from big financial institutions and toward reducing foreclosures and creating jobs. But it also comes as Republicans press Obama to end the rescue program and use bank repayments to reduce the national debt.

the Treasury Department intends wind down and terminate bailout programs launched at the height of the financial crisis to stabilize Wall Street and aid the

stabilize Wall Street and aid the struggling auto industry.

The official, speaking on the condition of anonymity because the details had not yet been made public, said the \$218 billion Capital Purchase Program would effectively conclude at the end of the year. The program has been a central element of the bailout program infusing banks

The administration also plans The administration also plans to cap two programs at levels below initial projections. One program designed to rid big banks of their bad assets will spend \$30 billion instead of \$75 billion, and another that supports a Federal Reserve effort to ease bank credit will top off at \$30 billion instead of \$80 billion. An initiative aimed at banks — the Capital Assistance Program — Capital Assistance Program

had no applicants and will also end, the official said. Congressional and industry officials said there were few details about the new small bank proposal, including how much of the bailout money would be used. But the American Bankers used. But the American Bankers Association, in a letter to Treas-ury Secretary Timothy Geithner last month, recommended a \$5 billion program for community banks that have not yet received assistance from the rescue fund. assistance from the rescue tind. The program, as suggested by the association, would apply only to those banks with assets of less than \$5 billion.

Take Advantage of Part D --Before It's Too Late

By Peter Pitts

From November 15 until the end of the year, seniors can sign up for Medicare Part D -- the prescription drug benefit for sen-iors. And those who are unhappy

with their existing coverage can switch to a new plan. All those eligible should take advantage of this "open enroll-ment" period. The healthcare reform bills working their way through Congress might soon make serious – and unnecessary – changes to Part D. And the consequences could be dire.


Unlike most public health programs, the Medicare prescription drug benefit is administered by the private sector. The program is subsidized by taxpayer dollars, but seniors are allowed to select the drug benefit that best suits their needs. Providers compete for this business, which leads to more choices, better service, and lower premiums. This feature -- the freedom to comparison shop between competing Medicare drug plans -- is one of the reasons the program is both popular and cost effec-

Part D has a 92 percent satis-Part D has a 92 percent satisfaction rate among its beneficiaries. And the program has reduced the number of seniors without a drug plan by 17 percent. Meanwhile, the price of Part D over the next decade is expected to be nearly \$120 billion less than originally estilion less than originally estimated when the program was

But the recent push for health-care reform has put the program in danger. The healthcare bill re-cently passed in the House would enable the federal govern-ment to "negotiate" Medicare Part D drug prices. The govern-ment doesn't negotiate, though. Just look at the drug benefit ad-ministered by the Department of Veterans Affairs (VA). At the VA, the government "negotiates" prices by requiring drug companies to sell their medicines at a price that's s at least 24 percent of the non-fed-eral average manufacturer price.




