

H. T. Johnson, Ph.D., D.D., educator, minister, author, journalist, scholar, was born in Georgetown, S. C., October 10, 1857. Early life was spent in the publie schools of his native town. Apprenticed to learn the printer's trade in his fifteenth year; worked for three years on the "Georgetown Planet" and "Charleston Independent." Gave up newspaper service for school teaching, in which occupation he earned sufficient means to enable him to enter the State Normal School in the Capital of his native State and subsequently the State University, at the same place continuing his studies with credit until the Fall of 1876, when Colored students were no longer allowed to enjoy such advantages by the Democrats who gained control of the State. For a time checkmated, young Johnson re-turned to the labors of the school-room until autumn of 1878, when, having been licensed to preach a year earlier, he entered Howard University as a divinity student, graduating in the Spring of 1880. While at Howard, Johnson took special studies in mathematics and the classics in the college department of the university. After preaching and teaching in his native State for two years, he resumed his student life, this time at Lincoln University, Chester County, Pa., graduating with honors in the class of '83. While at Lincoln, he became engaged in pastoral labors at Oxford, Kennett Square, Hosanah, Little Wesley and Monis Brown, Philadelphia; was ordained elder by Bishop Brown in Bethel Church, Philadelphia, June, 1883, having won the highest encomium for creditable examination passed in biblical, classical and metaphysical studies. 



In child abuse and neglect there are two victims-the parent and the child, Both must be helpeu. A punitive approach is not the answer to the problem. Child abuse and neglect are treatable. Selfhclp groups for abusive parents have begun forming to provide solid help to many abusers. Such parents meet in groups to share their experiences and to seek reinforcement in order to change their behavior through the help of others.

Since child abuse and neglect are recurrent in character, it is urgent to intervene in this pattern before it is passed to another generation.



In a recent New York Times report, American Jewry sent over 9,000 telegrams to the White House in one day. They were protesting the Carter's Administration position on the Middle East.


One leader and spokesman of the effort is reported saying: "We could have generated 50,000 telegrams if we really got wound up."

That shows American Jews, bound to the idea of a secure Israel by tradition, blood and religion, can easily out strip any other group of ethnic Americans in a telegram sending contest.

This is to be respected and serves as a good measuring stick by which one can measure power. For that matter, the lack of it. The ability to influence government by telegram is not at issue here. What is at stake is the ability to mobilize large numbers of people. This was done at a moments notice to p u t forward a particular point of view in right prespective. Some groups in America, . such as Organized Labor, the National Rifle Association, American Agriculture and others, too, have the same ability.

American Black people do not! We don't because we've never developed any kind of a national political mechanism responsible to and responsible for US.

There have been a variety of attempts made in years past by groups of Balck politicians to put such a network together, but all of these have failed largely because locally elected officials lack the national prespective. Such an organization requires that they have the clout. Instead, most of our office holders are concerned with parochial concerns, or more specifically, taking from one section of the country resources to grant to another. Increasingly as Blacks join national professional and trade associations--like the several organized teachers and educatorsto form strong organizations, sketchy networks have emerged. This had been true of Black politicians as well. Primarily white groups like the National League of Cities and the National Conference of Mayors have given their Black members an excuse to meet each other. In a similiar vein Black trade unionist and Black engineers and Black paratroopers have used white national organizations as handy umbrella concerns together. None of these oryanizations, however, fit the need and none fit the description of a national political pressure group. Now the Congressional Black Caucus, under the capable leadership of their director, Barbara Williams, h a s hagun to put together their expertise, their differing abilities and other areas of involvement to apply pressure their bodies if need be to reinforce and the Black presence in Washington's legislature halls and in the White House. The Caucus, by itself, could never have been a major ally of black fulfilled this role. 

What puzzles people is that equity is not the justice of the law courts but a method of restoring the balance of justice when it has been tilted by the law."

Aristotle's compatriot, Plato, also disparaged the goal of equality by speaking of the ridiculous or self-defeating nature of an "equality of a sort, distributed t equal and unequal alike (The Republic, Book VIII.) What is at issue before our courts, then, is not "reverse discrimination" or even the continuation of a dubiously

worthwhile "equality of a sort," as Piato put it. Rather, we are faced with one more instance of several

groups of Americans who seek the removal of past disadvantages of inequity which have been given undue benefits to some other groups.

Here is a book by a black author who seeks to capture the feelings of those who were victimized by the traffic in human enslavement.


From the very start, howeven, the author is trapped by his own use of the language forms-and the implicit meanings-of those who invented what the historian Kenneth Stampp called "the recullar institution."

Human enslavement in America was unique to the United States. It was unknown in its peculiarly American inhumane forms anywhere else in human his-LOLA

- Huggins glibly uses the tricky term "slavery" which makes no basic differentiation between the uniquely American pattern of bond servanthood and human enslavement as known elsewhere in the world.

All those who seek liberation should be deeply sensitive to the fact that those in power use etiquette, words, laws and all social customs to perpetuate the status quo. Our new generation of historians and social scientistsboth black and white-must kelp the general public to be able to move beyond these "cuiture traps."

Professor Huggins' otherwise provocative work would have doubtless come up with more helpful conclusions had
