## EDTTORIALS

"IT OUGHT TO BE A LAW"
After what happened to an officer of the court, Gene Gaines--local attorney here-last. Friday, it ought to be a vantage of an attorney who is defending the rights of a client
Justice of the Peare Charles Smith, in our opinion, was out of place when he had Mr. Gaines thrown into the Lub-
bock County Jail, because he was defending tlie rights of his client. For several hours, Mr. Gaines was held at the county jail. We disagree with this type of justice because of three lea-
sons. For one, we learned that all of this came about because Mr. Gaines attempted to post bail for his client, and bond, posted by Mr. Gaines. Accoraing to Vernon's Annotated Texas Statue,
Article $237 \mathrm{p}-3$, Section 14, the sheriff of the county has the apparent right to see who can serve bond, not $t h$ e Justice of the Peace as was the apparent case here last week. any county has the sole responsibility of receiving and approving bail bonds for the purposis of gaining the release of a named principal held in custody by any authority in his county upon accusation of an offense of which the
county or district churt has jurisdiction."
Second, after Mr. Gaines was arrest ed, he should have been given the right to $h$ a $v$ e been released upon his owh personal recognizance, out in Vernon's Annotated Texas Statue also. Article 1911a, Section 2 (c) says the following: ftates: "Provided, however, an officer of a court held in upon proper motion filed in the offended court, be released upon his o w personal recognizance pending determination of h is guilt or incourt, other than the offended court S a i d judge to be appointed for that purpose by the presiding judge of the Administrative Judical District wherein the alleged contempt occurred.
Mr . Gaines was reportedly taken to the Lubbock county Jail before a writ of habeas corpus was filed by Lubbock Wright's 137 th District Court. Third, since there were no other persons present in the Justice of the
Peace's chambers, but Mr. Gaines and Mr. Smith, who is to say who was in contempt. It is our opinion that Mr. Gaines w a. s doing his duty of representing a client who had apparently fending this situation. There ought to be a law on how an
officer of the court is treated in the officer of the court is trated in the
Justice of the Peace court. Over reacting in this type of a situation is
not grod for the court system nor the not good for the court system nor the
great city and county of Labbock. We hope, for God's sake, that these
kinds of embarassing situations will be curtailed in the future. At the s a me time, we hope our readers will
become aware of these kinds of situations when it comes to taking advantage of anyone's human rights.

ENGLISH MUFFIN BREAD
(Makes 2 loaves)
cup milk
2 tablespoons sugar
1 teaspoon salt
3 tablespoons Fleischmann's Margarine
1 cup warm water ( $105 \mathrm{~F}-115 \mathrm{~F}$ ) 1 package Fleiscrmann's Active
Dry Yeast
5 to 6 cups
to 6 cups unsifted flour
Scald milk; stir in sugar, salt and Fleischan's Margarine. Cool to lukewarm. Measure warm water into large warm bowl. Sprinkly in leiscimann's Active Dry Yeast, Add enough additional flour to make soft dough.
