Blacks In The News George Paul: Housing Manager

George Paul beaun his career as Hausing Manager at Green-Fair Manor Apartments in June, 1972. At that time, Bill Pierce was Executive Director of the Lubbrak Housing Authority. Green-Fair had only two vacancies in the 236 unit complex with an average rent of approximately \$25.00 a month. Vandalism, prostitution, burglaries, bootlegging, drugs and other crime was rampant. Police protection was practicalnon-existent. Rent deliquencies were the rule rather than the excep-

David Stiles was appointed Executive Director in 1974. however, there was little change in policy. The Turnkey III (lease purchae) program was opened in the Cherry Point area. Most of the Green-Fair residents with good records werk : noved into these homes which left the project (with af ew left the project (with a lew exceptions) the lowpaying, unruly tentants. The vacancies creat 1 more vandalism adn more vandalism and destruction of property. Residents had no respect for the complex or the manager. George had no authority or control however, he did the best he could to collect rent

and musage the unmanageable. Alleys were filled with trash and weeds; dumpsters were placed in front of the units - creating unsanitary conditions - stray animals ran all over the premisel, abandoned cars were commonplace. The maintenance workload was incontrollable as he could get no assistance from the-Central Office.

In August, 1965, D. C. Fair, Jr. was appointed Executive Director of the Lubbock Housing Authority. Soon after this things began looking rosier for George, Under Mr. Fair's direction, the Housing Authority made

although the going was slow. George was given the authority to really manage Green-Fair and the backing to get the job done, With Community Divelopment funds, alleys were paved, street lights were installed and a mailroom with lock oxes was put into service. Dumpsters were moved to the alleys, vacant units were secured, abandoned cars towed off and graffiti removed. Grass and shrubbery were planted and residents are responsible for keeping their premises clean. George began evictions for non-payment of rent. prostitution bootlegging adn other anti-social behavior detrimentals to the project. The residents who have been living in Green-Fair for many

a complete turnaround,

years are proud of George for making their living conditions so much better and are most cooperative in helping to

mile improvements. With additional Community Development funds, four vacant units were converted into a Community Services Center. Three units were remodeled as busier free units for the handicapped. Apmoximately \$1.5 million was obtained from HUD for modernization, but was insufficient to cover the entire project.

Recently, the Lubbock Housing Authority has been approved for \$3.2 million in modernization funds which will be spent over the next two years. Most of this money will be spent on energy conservation, such as insulation, central



heating, new widows and other energy related items. Mr. Paul believes this will attract many new tenants as the utility bills

will then be affordable. Programs that are now located in Green-Fair Manor to assist residents and the community are: Planned Parenthood. Lubbock OlC and

Bryant Gumble At Tech

Speaking to an audience at Texas Tech University Theatre November 4, Bryant Gumble, the co-host of NBC's Today Morning program, assected taht program, asserted that communications is fragile and people in the business should treat it as such.

"Television raises consciousness and understanding. It seeks the truth - though in isolated cases, it fails. To a large extent, television portrays what is," Gumble said.

Most people, according to Gumble, think that issues are only important when TV talks about them. Others, according to Gumble, believe that most issues would "go away" if TV stops talking about them. Unformately, it is not so. Gumble said.

To be effective, Gumble said that TV should disengage itself from the ratings race. It's hard for Nielson, a rating company, to find out what works with the perspective of public interest. It is hard for Nielson to distinguish between costmetics and substance in its ratings, Gumble said. "I hosted 'Games People Play', and it was the number one show for eight weeks. Yet most people did not know."

On politics, Gamble said that attention should nto be given to attractive candidates only, but to qualified one as well.

Gumble, 35, first broke into the national scene as a sports writer for a Black sports magazine. At 23, he vas employed as a co host of the Grand Stand Show with KNAB-TV in Los Angeles.

Gumble who majored in Russian History at a private and expensive college in Maine, had no formal education in journalism. He added that most anchors on network TV had no formal education in broadcast journalism. "It is what you do with yor is what you do with your college degree that counts," Gumble said.

Gumble said he got the job because he knew what he was doing. "If you left hosting

'Grand Stand Show' to hosting sports for NBC and move to host the Today Show and was to host the 1984 Olympics (Guinble left sports for Today Show), if all those were done because of being Black, then be Black." Gumble said.

A check with the BBE/Las Vegas eveals that Star Gazers is owned by Lonnie Devine and the company has the same address and principals as a company called Magnet and a company called Star' Press international a/k/a National Press & Associates. Bureau files on National Press & Associates shows that the company is out of Florida adn that the Orange County Circuit Court _sued_a default

City Will Enforce Fire Lane



> is obeyed," Anthony said. Business owners and public school officials have been notified of the changes and requirements of the ordiance and recognize the value of clear fire lanes in the event of an emergency.

Fire lanes are for buildings set back more than 150 feet from a street so that fire fighters can get closer to the tructure. They are 20-feet wide zones that may be adjacent to the curb or in driveway areas near trhe driveway areas mear the entrance, he explained.

"It is very simple. If the fire department has to park or in the middle of the parking lot because fire lane is breeked, they can't do their job. That endangers the lives and property of everyone. We just want the law obeyed and we plan to enforce the decision of the City Council," Anthony said. Provisions of the revised ordiance provide for clearer, more prominent identifications with signs, areas painted red and other markings to designate fire lanes. Drivers should have no problem in identifying the zones, Anthony said.

So the next time a driver simply "wants to run in for a minute," he or she may discover they owe a heavy fine or may have to begin a vehicle search to locate their car. In that case, the cost of convenience may indeed be quite high.

Save The Life Of Young Black Texan

The Legislative Black Caucus recently embarked on a state-wide fund raising effort help save the life of a young Black Texan. Shana Wilkerson is the two year old daughter of Edwina Wilkerson from Conroe, Texas. She is presently at the University of Texas Medical School of Galveston awaiting a liver transplant.

Because liver transplant are considered experimental in nature. the Texas Department of Human Resources has refused to pay for this life saving operation for Shana, estimated to cost \$100,409.00. So far, nearly \$59,000 of this amount has been raised by friends and community workers.

DEAR YOLONDA: I am lying here, flat on my back, in the county hospital, for what seems to be one of many endless visits. I have sickle cell anemia, I guest I should feel lucky because I'm still alive — I say that because I've seen a brother and a father die from this disease.

I'm not writing to explain the pain of sickle cell anemia. I'm sure that you and most readers in your audience are well aware of this. I'm also sure that you are aware that it's a disease that's primarily limited to Blacks. Right now, one in every 500 Blacks have it. You can ask me anything about the disease. Believe me, I know. My whole adult life has been involved in it -- either reading about it or ill with it. I can't tell you how many days I missed from school as a result of one of my many crises.

My questions is what is it going to take to make society more concerned about people like myself? How many have to die before more research is done? What has to be done before people start becoming angry?

To get at what I'm talking about, took at herpes, for example.

Now, I'm very concerned about the people who have this disease, but come on! Every time you look at TV or open the newspapers, someone is talking about it, yet, no one dies from herpes!

People do die from sickle cell.

My question is, what has to happen before people become mad a hell about people like me? Please tell me.



To vote or not to vote - that is the question. Whether for not there are all white candidates in the 1984. Fresidential election, it is a race which Black America cannot afford to forget to vote. Unemployment is not only scandatous in the Black America sector, it is a sickness ill treated by the Administration. A cut of all past community directed programs without a new proposition has been the program of the President. Picture an increase in Black America voting strength in each state and start thinking of New programs and a new President.

A twenty percent increase in unregistered Black American voters in ten select states would swing those states away from the present President. A mere 600,000 unregistered Black American voters out of a total of three million unregistered could open up employment opportunities in the states of Alabama, Arkansas, Kentucky, Louisana, Mississippi, New York, North Carolina, South Carolina, Tennessee and Virginia. No wonder the White House sat on its hands rather than helped get voter registration rights extended in the South.

The 1982-83 increase in U. S. households was the smallest in 20 years, according to an estimate by the U. S. Commerce Department's Census Bureau. People born during the past World War II "baby boom" now roughly 20-35 years-old, are at ages during which they may be expected to form households at a high rate. But the "baby boom" babies don't boom enough apparently! A shift in economic conditions, cold water on employment and a different social climate is causing parental problems for people. Poor people, particularly Black Americans, are pushed ahead by more natural forces. Black Americans and other minorities are increasing in the U. S. population.

Bodies must be turned into votes. Registration to vote will do more to eradicate racism in America in 1984 than any act by the current administration. Registering to vote is as important in the big states like New York with nearly a million unregistered Black American voters as it is a the state of Kentucky with 57,508 unregistered Black American voters. Mayors, Congressmen and Senators can be sent according. Two out of ten unregistered toreadors registered would run the bull — out of the White House. Failure to register and find the way to the ballot box in 1984 can only mean four more years of the continuing highest unemployment in the Black American community as measured since the end of slavery.

This life proliferating in our society. This disease is delivering us to jail. This disease is delivering us to the penitentiary. It will deliver us to the devil of dope. It will deliver us to death!! How long will we labor this delusion? How long will we purposely suffer this sickness? You know, it has often been said that we, the people, are patient and docile, but yet, careless and landless. How long will we carry this label of degradation? When will we learn that we are going again. The grain? We set no sould example for our children. As a matter of a fact, we feed the flames. Our babies are our future. The school teachers will inject education and decorum into our babies' mind.

But, when our babies come home, we will thwart what little that has been injected by placing that in a huntlers and prostitutes environment. There are whites living in Boley and from all indications from some of the old timers here who knew me as just a stripling lad, there will be more. And this correspondent believes this will be good for the

And believe it or not, the prison problem in Oklahoma could well be the agent to help bring about this great social change in the lives of some four or five thousand black souls who live in the trading environs of Boley. For the most part, farmin that once was the main vocation of the area has about vanished and white speculators are buying up thousand of acres of "black" land. Some say that when whites have sufficient land in the area, oil will become the next "cash crop". And well may it be for new riggs are springing up all around as we toured and noted this to be true.

Now back to the prison problem in Oklahoma. It is perhaps the biggest one in the state. Most of the prisons if not all of them are overcrowded and bursting at the seams. In the ten days or more that this correspondent has been in the state, there have been three or four uprisings and disturbances, which some ascribe to the extreme heat this season. For many years, the Boley Training School for Boys

was maintained in Boley for deliquent black boys than a few years ago, the institution was integrated as well as the staff. It was the largest employer in the town. Then Oklahoma faced with budget cuts, inflation, etc., it seemed that the plant would be closed down and merged with others in the state

Then somebody in state circles and other leaders asked: Why not make Boley school a state correctional facility and the idea took hold. Within a short time the Boley State Training School for Boys will become the John P. Lilley Correctional Center and will add dozens of new employees when it reaches capacity, according to soruces.

And the young man, who will serve as the first warden of the new facility is black and a native of Oklahoma, whow was born in Poteau, Oklahoma about 36 years ago. He is Jerry Johnson. Johnson is a graduate of Cklahoma (University) at Norman with both undergraduate and graduate degrees and more than ten years of experience in the prison systems of Oklahoma.

Another black is Ted Logan, who is head warden at the Mabel Br sett Correctional Center for Women in Oklahoma City. More on this ongoing story in Oklahoma in coming release. So far all has been quiet at both of this minimum security facilities and that is good, we think.

Hepatitis Creates Crisis!!

Lubbeck people tend to respond with their very best in crisis sit ations, and the month of October was ample proof. A hepatitis epidemic, an emplosion at the city health department, and recordbreaking floods had Lubbockites wondering what else could possible happen. Then, because of these events, the blood supply began to get dangerously low.

By the third week in October, blood center offcials were faced with having to find at least 200 blood donors to insure that actual blood usage was met. Previously scheduled blood arives had been cancelled and projections for the last week in October were very low. An additional 200 units seemed impossible. Eligible blood drive sponsors were contacted, four of whom responded to the situation with extraordinary efforts, setting up emergency blood drives without hestitation.

The City of Lubbock regularly sponsors blood drives two-three times per year. During 1983, city employees had already donated 220 units of blood. Since one of the city nealth department employees had been hurt blood drives during the in the explosion and was year.

using blood, the city's response was to set up a blood drive for this employee. Between Thursday, October 27, and Monday, October 31, 121 people signed up to donate. By 5 p. m. Monday afternoon, actual donations totalled 119 pints,

Second Baptist Church was approached on Wednesday, October 25, to set up a blood drive for Sunday. Churches normally like to take about three weeks to properly publicize a blood drive and to contact donors. Telephone calls to prospective donors by the youth of the church and announcements from the pulpit elicited 40 prospective donors, with 37 actual donors (these were in addition to the 113 units already donated

Within two hours of being informed of the critical blood needs, 54 employees of American State Pank had signed up to donate. When blood center personnel drew donors two days later, 50 people were actually able to give. Once again these donations were in addition to the 191 units that had been given at regularly scheduled

Dietary Management Of Hepatitis A

Dietary management of uncomplicated viral Type A Hepatitis (formerly called infectious hepatitis) in ludes a return to optimal nutrition as soon as possible, suggests Mrs. Jane W. Cohen, Registered Dietitian and Health Educator with the Lubbock Health Depart-

Uncomplicated hepatitis may include symptoms of nausca, vomitiag, anorexia, fatigue, etc. Your physician can best diagnose your illness and prescribe treatment. Complications could involve cirrhosis or other damage to the liver. Hepatitis patients who have few symptoms should be encouraged to cat nutritious foods, reminds Mrs. Cohen.

Optimal nutrition provides the foundation for recovery of the injured liver cells and overall return of strength. The problem of supplying a diet which is adequate to meet the increased nutritive needs for an ill patient who may

degree of the illness, the C(ascorbic acid), 159 mg. gradually to a wider selection of foods with convalescence. The Registered Dietitian,

physician, may recommend a high calorie diet. with liberal protein, moderate fat, and high carbohydrate, for the patient whose appetite has returned.

The food intake, or diet plan should provide nutrients and energy to renew strength and recuperative powers. Hepatitis patients should eat as much as comfortably possible of nutritious food which appeals to their appetite. Optimal dietary intake helps promote recovery and may shorten convalescence. Convalescence may vary from about a month to four months.

For patients whose appetite has retunred, the basic daily diet plan (following) meets nutritional needs for tissue regneration and compensates for losses due to fever and general debilitiation. The nutritive value of the convalescent diet is higher than a regular diet.
