America in Beaumont. He is the former director of Girl's Town at Whiteface.

Thomas Morgan, a Midland attorney, will also serve on the committee.

The Governor's Juvenile Justice and Delinquency Prevention Advisory Board will monitor and recommend improvements

to the state's juvenile justice and delinquency prevention system.

This panel will also oversee state applications for federal juvenile justice and delinquency prevention grants, and it will submit an annual report on the status of the state's efforts to reduce crime committed by Texas juveniles.

According to making the appointment, Gov. Clements said: "Our war on crime will not be successful unless we fight the battle on all fronts."

The committee also includes three individuals under the age of 24 who have come under the jurisdiction of the state's juvenile justice system.

Bishop Watson is the presiding bishop of the Northwest Texas District of the Church of God in Christ. He is also a former band director at Estacado High School.

It Needs To Be Said

With the tornado like activities of having the sweet children at home all day for summer vacation winding down to a precious few days, once again we start preparations for "back to school." As we purchase school clothing, school supplies and other odds and ends, add to your school list INVOLVEMENT. Parents more so than students need to become more involved with what their kids do for almost 7 hours, 5 days a week. Purchasing clothing, supplies and giving lunch money is important, but being INVOLVED with what happens at school is just as important.

Why invest your money in school clothes and supplies if you can't invest a little time to see how your money is being spent? Sure, time is an item we have very little of and time with our children is all too often neglected. Far too many parents look upon visiting the teacher or attending school functions in the same category as going to the dentist. We can always find an excuse not to go or we only go when there is no other alternative.

This school year, let's make a sincere effort to become more INVOLVED with our children's school activities. Let's not wait until report card time to find out our Johnnies and Janes are not making their grade. It's very important for high school parents to be aware of their children's progress, especially if they participate in extra curricular activities as "no pass, no play" will make them unable to participate. Having your child dropped from a program can be more than embarrassing to both of you, it could lead to dropping out of school. Daily or weekly progress checks by parents can prevent a great deal of embarrassment, headaches and worry.

As a parent, you should demand that your child produce proof of their progress in school. There should be at least a graded paper brought home on a weekly basis. Students should do some homework during the week. If neither of the above takes place with your child, call the school for an explanation. And don't be afraid to show your ignorance about school because you are not alone, nor are you expected to know everything. And I feel confident that you can find 5 minutes within your busy day to call the school to check on your investment.

For elementary parents, you can add to the above by asking questions of your child as you take them to school, at the dinner table or while watching T. V. Every opportunity that places the child in the presence of the parent is a wonderful time for a school progress check. This will show the child that parental interest and concern is being conveyed by the parent and may also serve as a motivator to the child. Education is one of the most important things parents can give to their children. Most children that have parents who play active roles in their education will put forth more of an effort to pass. Sure, the economic and single parenting places a severe strain on all concerned, but for a parent to find that little extra time to become INVOLVED in their child's education this will go a long way towards making that child better all around.

This school year, parents should get to know at least one of your child's teachers. Should go to at least one PTA meeting, more if possible. It's always great when mom and dad attend together, however, if mom attends one and dad attends another, that two different functions

attended by a parent. The bottom line is simple, if the parents can become INVOLVED with their child's school life, then the child will do likewise. And don't you agree, our children deserve the best we can give them and second best just won't cut the mustard.

Improve The Odds

The odds are one in five that you will have a traffic accident this year. Are you a gambler? Do you feel these are good odds? For one out of twenty it will be a serious mishap and for one out of sixty it will be fatal. When there are things that can be done to improve these odds, this is a foolish gamble to take.

Good drivers stay aware of the risks and are willing to make responsible choices to protect themselves and others. For instance, in a 30 mph mishap a ten pound infant will hit the dash with a force of 300 pounds. The responsible decision is to use infant or child safety seats. This would improve the odds about 70%.

Alcohol is a factor in nearly 50% of the fatal accidents. The responsible decision, of course, would be not to drink and drive.

Speed is a contributing factor in 65% of our mishaps. The destruction power of your car doubles when you increase your speed from 20 to 28 mph. As speed increases, the need for accurate vision also increases. The driver actually sees less clearly and the field of vision is narrowed. Increased speed proves dangerous, not only because of the potential force of impact, but also because maneuvering to avoid a collision is more difficult. Then the responsible decision would be to adjust your speed to the conditions in which you are driving. Be willing to slow down. It could save your life. Keep an eye on the other driver, improve your odds. Don't be a gambler.

We believe there will be a period of a thousand years during which Satan, the Devil will be bound and Jesus Christ the Son of God will reign on earth and "that the Lord God shall give unto Him the throne of His Father David;" and that "Christ shall reign a thousand years in righteousness until He hath put all enemies under His feet."

HE IS TO RULE ON DAVID'S THRONE.

1. This was prophesied in the Old Testament. Isaiah 9:6-7 says "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given; and the government shall be upon his shoulder; and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The mighty God, The everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace. Of the Increase of his government and peace there shall be no end, upon the throne of David, and upon his kingdom, to order it, and to establish it with judgment and with justice from henceforth even for ever. The zeal of the Lord of hosts will perform this."
2. This was promised by the angel Gabriel in Luke 1:32-33 which says "He shall be great, and shall be called the Son of the Highest; and the Lord God shall give unto him the throne of his father David; And he shall reign over the house of Jacob for ever; and of his kingdom there shall be no end."
3. This was preached by Peter on the day of Pentecost in Acts 2:29-30 where he says "Men and brethren, let me freely speak unto you of the patriarch David, that he is both dead and buried, and his sepulchre is with us unto this day. Therefore being a prophet, and knowing that God had sworn with an oath to him, that of the fruit of his loins, according to the flesh, he would raise up Christ to sit on his throne;"

HIS REIGN WILL BE DIFFERENT THAN OTHER RULERS.

1. The power of His reign. It says in I Corinthians 15:24-26 "Then cometh the end, when he shall have delivered up the kingdom to God, even the Father; when he shall have put down all rule and all authority and power. For he must reign, till he hath put all enemies under his feet. The last enemy that shall be destroyed is death." The book of Revelation 20:1-3 John states "And I saw an angel come down from heaven, having the key of the bottomless pit and a great chain in his hand. And he laid hold on the dragon, that old serpent, which is the Devil, and Satan, and bound him a thousand years, and cast him into the bottomless pit, and shut him up, and set a seal upon him, that he should deceive the nations no more, till the thousand years should be fulfilled: and after that he must be loosed a little season."
2. The quality of His reign. It says in Isaiah 32:1 "Behold, a king shall reign in righteousness, and princes shall rule in judgment." Isaiah 11:4-5 says "But with righteousness shall he judge the poor, and reprove with equity for the meek of the earth; and he shall smite the earth with the rod of his mouth, and with the breath of his lips shall he slay the wicked. And righteousness shall be the girdle of his loins, and faithfulness the girdle of his reins."
3. The extent of His reign. It says in Psalms 72:8-9 and in verse 11 "He shall have dominion also from sea to sea, and from the river unto the ends of the earth. They that dwell in the wilderness shall bow before him; and his enemies shall lick the dust.... Yea, all kings shall fall down before him: all nations shall serve him." and Zechariah 14:9 says "And the Lord shall be king over all the earth: in that day shall there be one Lord, and his name one."
4. The length of His reign and the people who shall reign with Him are told in Revelation 20:4,6 which John says "And I saw thrones, and they sat upon them, and judgment was given unto them; and I saw the souls of them that were beheaded for the witness of Jesus, and for the word of God, and which had not worshipped the beast, neither his image, neither had received his mark upon their foreheads, or in their hands; and they lived and reigned with Christ a thousand years... Blessed and holy is he that hath part in the first resurrection: on such the second death hath no power, but they shall be priests of God and of Christ, and shall reign with him a thousand years."

SEAFOOD SALADS

Next time you're planning a light, summer meal-in-a-minute, don't forget how refreshingly different a mouth watering seafood salad can taste.

Seafood salad ingredients can range from expensive shellfish to thrifty tuna and are perfect to begin a meal or to serve as a meal in itself. This week's catch, "Tuna Salad" and "Scallop and Shrimp Salad" will liven-up your summer meals with a light touch.

TUNA SALAD

- 1 (7 ounce) can tuna, drained
- 1/2 cup mayonnaise
- 1 cup diced celery
- 2 hard cooked eggs, diced
- 1/2 cup diced sweet pickles
- 2 tablespoons minced onion
- 1 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 teaspoon pepper
- 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento-stuffed green olives
- 1 1/2 cups Fritos® brand Corn Chips
- 1 tomato, quartered

Combine all ingredients except corn chips and tomatoes. Cover and chill until ready to serve. Just before serving, add the corn chips and toss. Garnish with tomatoes. Makes 4 entree servings.

SCALLOP and SHRIMP SALAD

- 1/2 cup salad oil
- 3 tablespoons red wine vinegar
- 2 tablespoons minced fresh basil
- 1/2 garlic clove, crushed
- 1 medium zucchini, sliced
- 3/4 pound sea scallops
- 3/4 pound medium shrimp, shelled, deveined
- 2 tablespoons sherry
- 2 medium tomatoes
- 1/2 cup pitted ripe olives

In a large bowl, stir oil, vinegar, basil and garlic. In a microwave bowl, cook zucchini, covered, on High power 2 minutes. Cool; add zucchini to herbs and vinegar.

Slice scallops. Microwave with shrimp and sherry in a covered dish on High power 3 1/2 to 4 minutes; stirring once. Add to zucchini mixture. Cut tomatoes into wedges. Add with olives to seafood mixture; toss. Makes 6 entree servings.

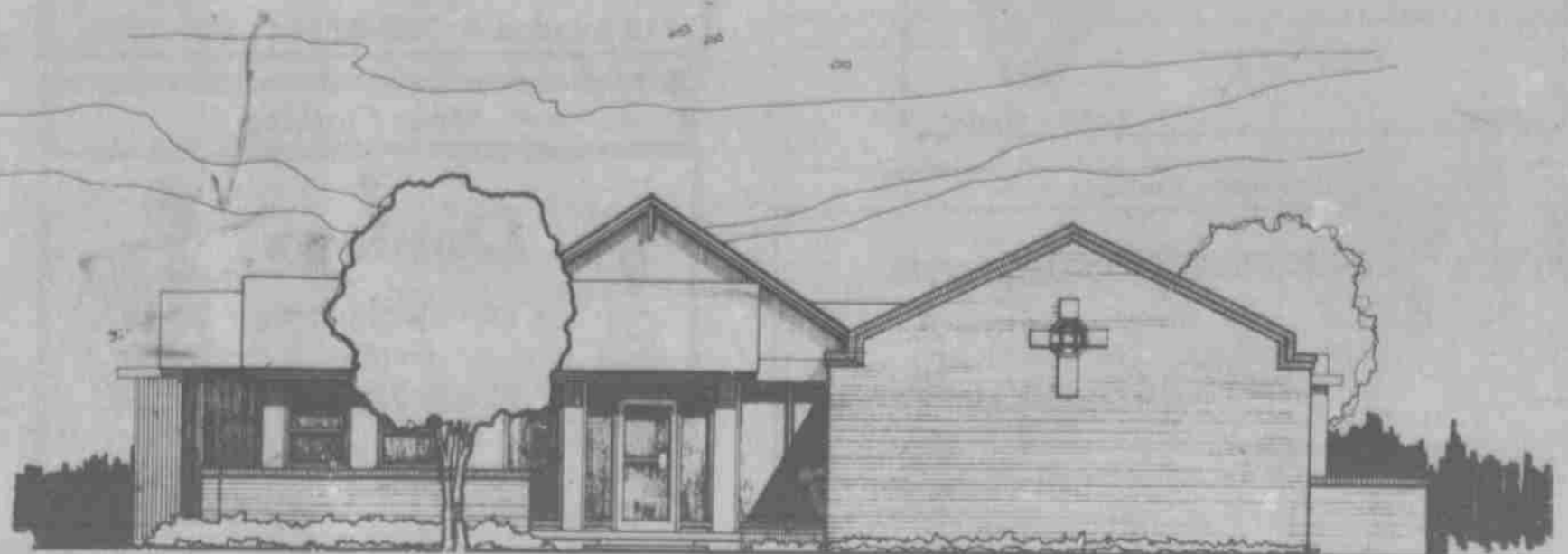

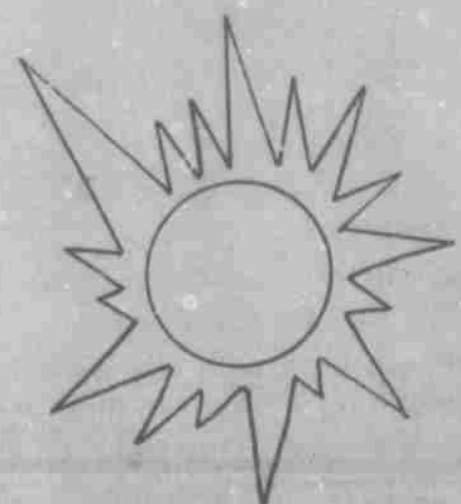
