

WEST WIND

It is being rumored that a petition from towns along Highway 84 will soon be presented to the County Court requesting a bond election to finance the purchase of additional right-of-way to convert 84 to an expressway.

Incidentally, the whole idea is warming up along 84 and if the petition is presented, the court will have no other alternative than to order the election. It is estimated that it will require \$350,000.00 to widen 84's thirty odd miles through Lamb county.

On the face of it, this appears to be a harmless and perhaps even a commendable move; evidently, one to accommodate tomorrow's teeming motorists. But before we become too absorbed in 84's development, let us not forget that Lamb county is one of the few west Texas counties that is traversed by two major federal highways of about the same importance traffic-wise.

In fact, Highway 70 is one of America's few great transcontinental arteries stretching 2,500 miles from Cape Hatteras to Los Angeles and at the present rate of development by Highway 70 Association, most connecting routes eventually will assume the status of contributory. Hale county has widened 70 to our east county line, therefore, it is obviously our move NEXT.

We cannot get our petition to the court too soon. If 84 with its 3-town population gets the drop on us here and should carry the election, we could never hope to vote bonds to make an expressway out of 70.

Sure, it would double the bond issue to \$700,000.00 but we'd better win or lose together than for Highway 70 to lose forever.

A business man in another Lamb County town recently remarked that Earth had made unusual growth. I told him I supposed all West Texas towns were growing. "Not all," he replied, "our town has not grown and may even have lost ground".

Good healthy, civic growth is the result of a combination of favorable circumstances which every community covets, but such expansion likewise presents many new problems and responsibilities. Last week, I promised to discuss these and their relation to the new city administration.

Here are a few in the order of their importance:

1. Public sanitation.
2. Drainage and paving.
3. Correction of fire insurance rates.
4. Law enforcement reforms.

Although there are many other headaches in prospect, those listed above obviously demand immediate attention.

First, in cooperation with other commissioners, it is my intention, if elected mayor, to provide some kind of garbage disposal as quickly as possible and clear our alleys of unsanitary refuse before hot weather starts decomposition. I would stand for this even if it necessitates the purchase of a plow-under plot. It should also be remembered that the law provides other relief measures when public health is imperiled.

Second, I also favor the drainage and paving of the two intersecting highways through town by voluntary action if possible, otherwise by an ordinance establishing a paving zone, designed specifically to provide such drainage. It is my conviction that the majority of merchants along these routes should not be denied proper drainage by an uncooperative minority.

Third, I would also favor a speedy compliance with the rules of the State Fire Insurance Commission to place the city on a "protected" basis, thereby securing lower fire insurance rates on city property. Our taxes have bought the fire fighting equipment and the water system, but taxes cannot buy a "protected" status. That must be earned by meeting certain operative requirements.

Fourth, it is my opinion that our law enforcement setup needs overhauling. In this, I have no reference to personnel but to the system. I think perhaps we have outgrown the watchman plan by which a few faithfuls have provided the safety while others ac-

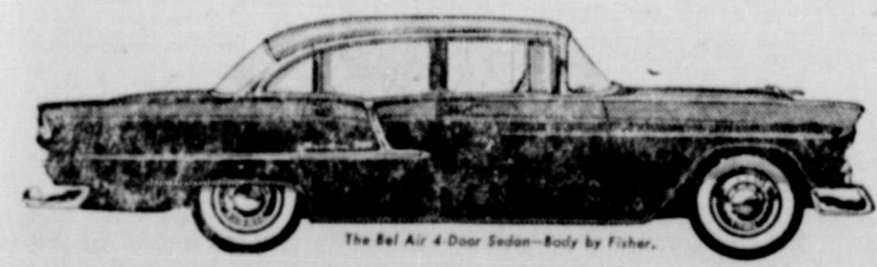

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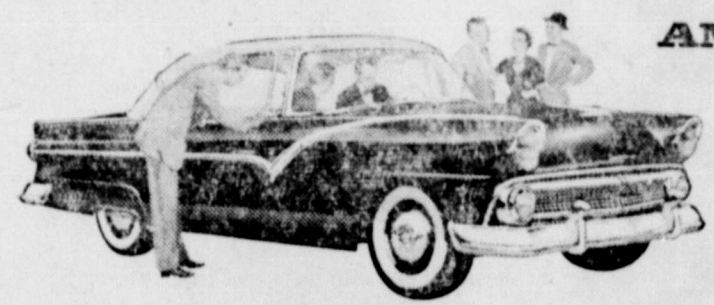

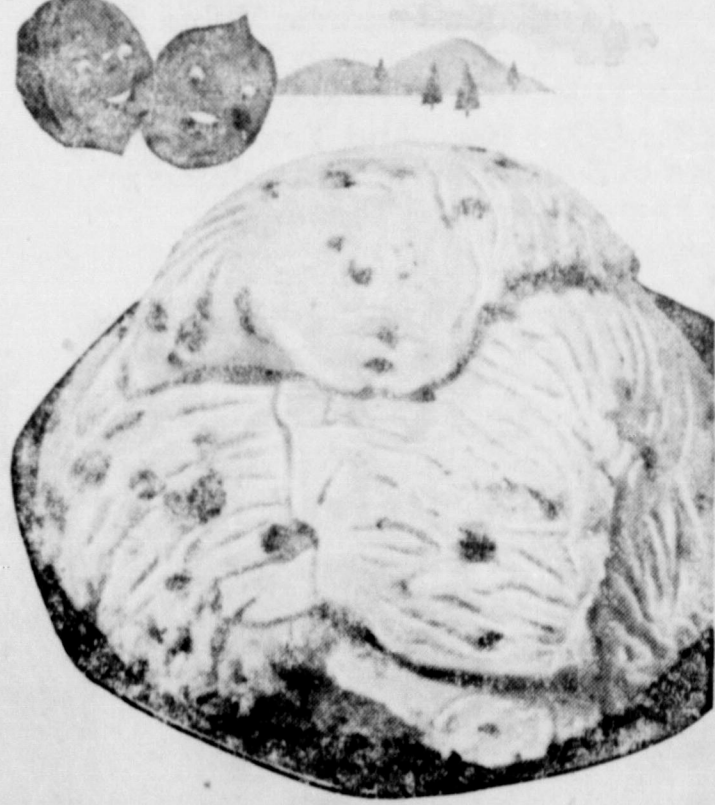

Golden Text: 1 John 5: 14.

When the disciples asked Jesus how to pray, he first exposed the false notions of those who loved to pray on the corners of the street that they might be seen of men. Prayer is to be made to God and not to men. Therefore the disciples were told to enter into their closets when they would pray. And Jesus declared that men are not heard for their much speaking. Some men in their praying deliver long addresses unto God as if he needs to be informed about conditions. God knows all about us and all our needs before we ask him anything.

Jesus used the form of Hebrew poetry, using a double triplet, as he was speaking of prayer. We are to ask and seek and knock, assured that we shall receive and find and have the door opened (Matthew 7: 7-8).

Through trust in an earthly father, Jesus taught men to look with confidence toward the Heavenly Father, as knowing that He will not give them a stone when they ask for bread but will, out of his infinite goodness and wisdom, grant them all good things.

James believed in faith healing and wrote the disciples to avail themselves of it, not only for themselves but also for others. Healing by faith has been neglected by the present church. We would not abandon all the fine means of healing of the time. But when we avail ourselves of the means, let us depend for the outcome upon the Heavenly Father.

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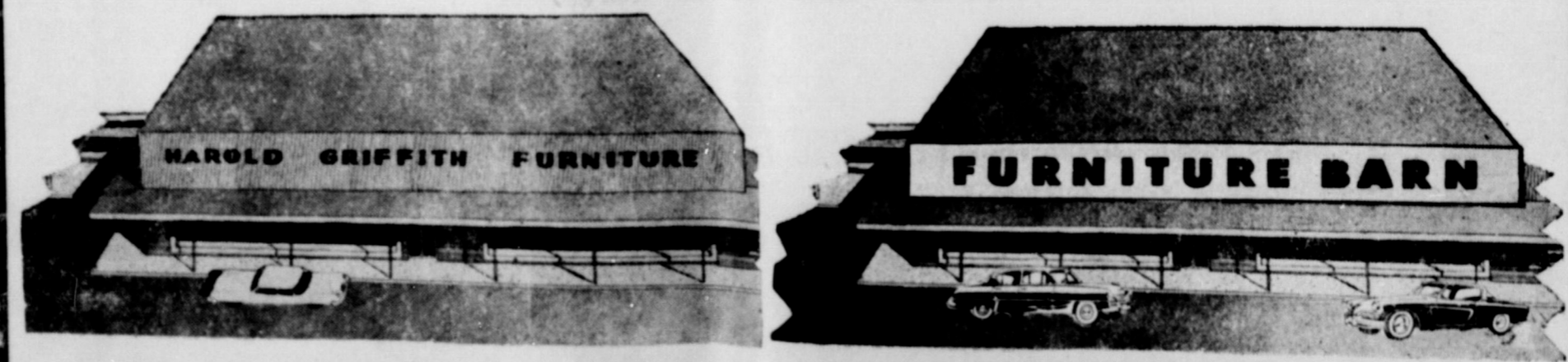

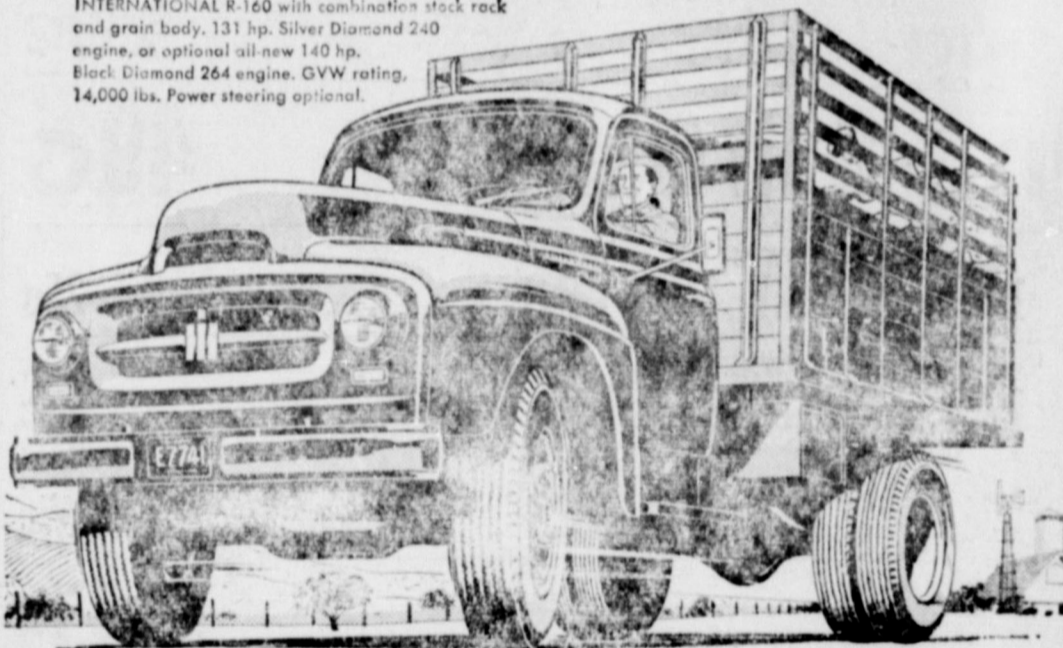
