## Mail For Servicemen Pamphlet Available At Local Post Office

An illustrated pamphlet-- "Mail For Servicemen"-- outlining the expanded program for airlifting letters, packages and other military mail overseas at low postal rates is now available through Earth Post Office window clerks. Postmaster Miller announced today. Postmaster Miller said that "as a result of new legislation and action by President Johnson we are now airlifting more than 75 per cent of all mail going to the military men and women stationed abroad. We hope this guide will help more American families be familiar with these services and use them."

The eight-page pamphlet illustrates three services for airlifting parcels at rates the average family can afford, the speedy service now available for newspapers and news magazines to most overseas bases, the special rates for books and similar educational materials, and how to mail sound-recorded personal messages. The guide also provides parcel wrapping instructions, information on the time it takes parcels to reach Vietnam and other overseas bases from major U. S. cities, and pointers on the correct way to address military mail.

A family sending a 10-pound package from Earth to Vietnam, for example, pays only \$2.90 on a package marked "PAL", while the air parcel rate for the same package is

\$7.23, Postmaster Miller said. On parcels weighing less than 5 pounds it might be more advantageous for a family to use the older (SAM) Space Available Mail Service, which provides surface transportation to the post of embarkation and airlift overseas. A four-pound SAM package to European military post from Earth costs only \$1.10. On packages weighing under two pounds air parcel post is often the patron's "best buy" for through airlift service, the pamphlet suggests.

## Mann Takes U. S. Naval Academy Tour This Week

Supt. Bill Mann of the Springlake-Earth School was among the twenty area men who left Monday, March 18, for a four day visit to the United States Naval Academy at Annapolis, Maryland, for a brief tour of Washington, D. C., according to Lt. Commander Melvin Burks, Naval Reserve Officer in charge of the trip and Guidance Director with Tahoka Public Schools. The purpose of the visit is to acquaint educators with the opportunity of a Naval Academy education and the fact that this opportunity is available to all qualified High school graduates. Each educator will be briefed on the various methods of application to the Academy and the necessary qualifications for prospective applicants.

Schedule for the group, according to Mr. Burks, is to depart from Reese Air Force Base on Monday in a Naval aircraft. A brief orientation follows arrival in Annapolis, Tuesday morning included a private tour of the White House, Capital, Supreme Court, and Library of Congress. Activities in Washington will be concluded by a luncheon with the honorable George Mahon in the House Appropriations Committee, of which Mr. Mahon is Chairman. The last two days will include more activities at the Academy and the journey home.

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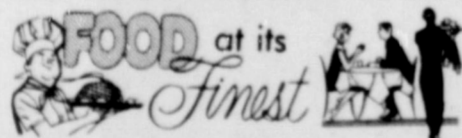
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## Invitational Track Meet Set For Saturday

## Soybeans Respond To Fertilizer

Do soybeans respond to fertilizer? A better question might be, "Do some varieties or strains of soybeans respond to fertilizer better than others, and if so, which one and to which fertilizers?" Dr. Douglas Owen, Agronomist at the High Plains Research Foundation, is attempting to find some of the answers to these questions. A preliminary study was started in 1967 to evaluate a total of forty varieties and experimental strains under both fertilized and non-fertilized conditions. Two identical test areas were planted, with each containing all varieties and strains. One area received no fertilizer, and the other received a total of 147 pounds of nitrogen and 96 pounds of phosphate. The sources of fertilizer included a pre-plant application of 8-16-0 and a side-dress application of Ammonium Nitrate. Slight increases in yield were obtained from most varieties and strains tested. However, two specific varieties did show better-than-average response, and several experimental strains showed definite promise. Yields of up to 59 bushels per acre were very encouraging, and the test will definitely be continued. No recommendations can be made as yet, but complete results of the 1967 test will be printed in the Annual Research Report of the Foundation.

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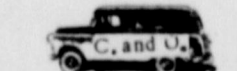

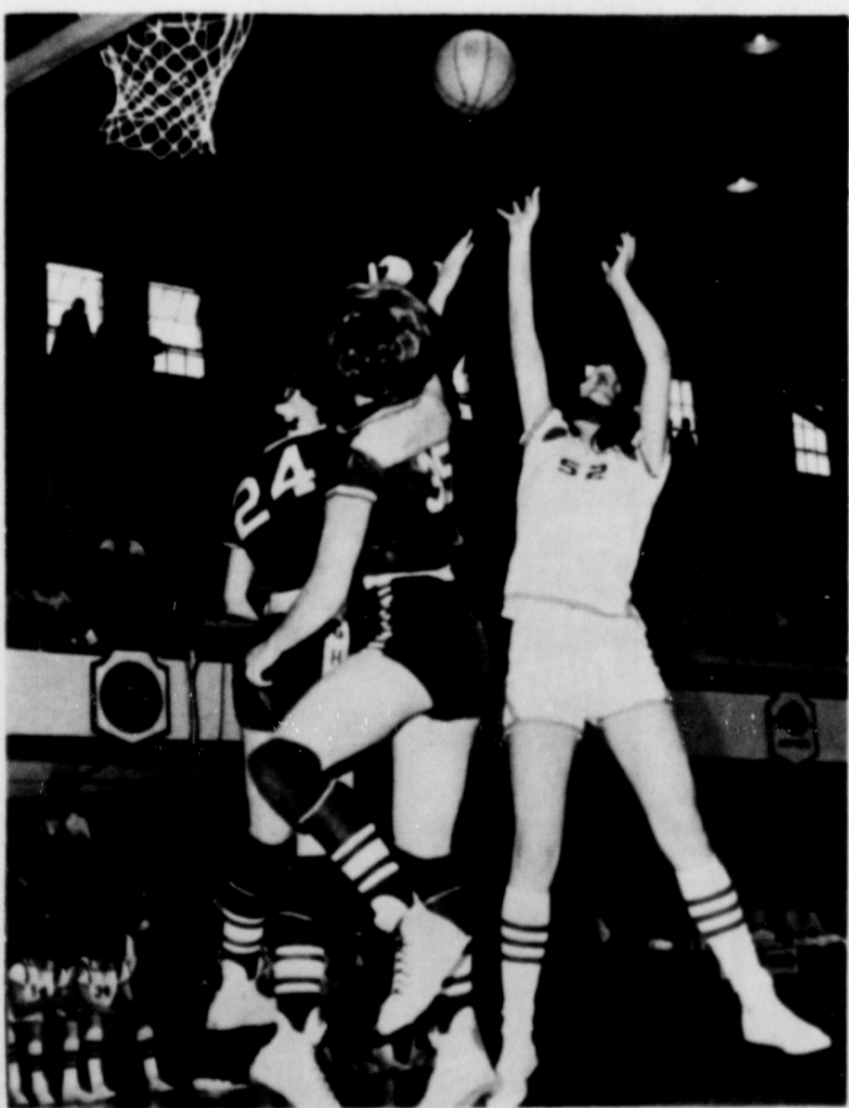

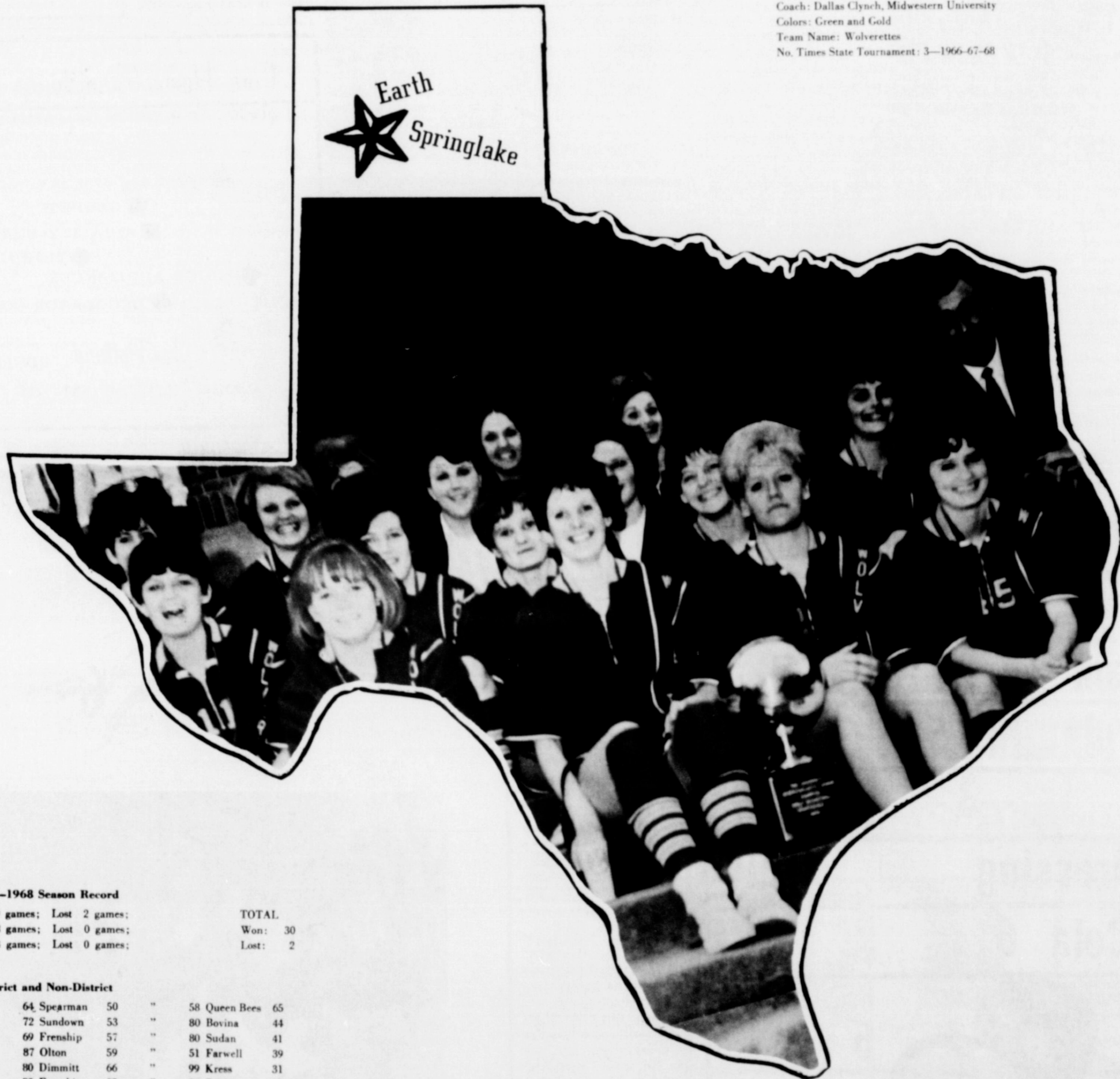

## Hints To Homemakers

Have you ever tried to put water in your steam iron (even with a measuring cup) only to have it spill all over the place? Buy a baby-sized ball syringe and it'll work beautifully when you fill the ball and squirt the water in the iron.

Did you know that if you add a teaspoon of salt to the warm water when sprinkling clothes they won't smell of mildew when the ironing isn't done on time?

If you'll cover the ironing board with a couple of strips of foil before putting on the pad, the heat from the iron will reflect on the foil and bounce back with twice the heat, therefore making your ironing go twice as fast!

Do you know that you can make a wonderful pin cushion by covering a steel wool pad with a scrap of material. It keeps the needles and pins very sharp.

If you use a razor blade to slice off the end of your lipstick tube diagonally, it will give you a very sharp outline when applied. It seems to fill out those minute lines and cracks around your lips. Put the discarded lipstick ends in a small jar and use them with your lipstick brush.

After shampooing your oily hair rinse about 1/2 can of beer (stale beer is even better) through it and set it. The smell will not remain, and you'll find it helps the oiliness and gives your hair a marvelous sheen and extra "body."

QUICK TRICKS: Grease the "threads" on glue and nail polish bottles and they won't stick.

## Census Bureau To Collect Data During March

Questions aimed at developing up-to-date information about the number and characteristics of the Nation's households and families will be asked in this area as part of the Census Bureau's monthly Current Population Survey the week of March 18, Director Francis H. Wilner of the Bureau's Regional Office in Denver announced today.

The March Survey contains inquiries on family composition, migration, employment and unemployment, and sources of family income including earnings, social security payments, pensions, dividends, etc. Basic statistics on these subjects were gathered in the 1960 Census of Population and they are updated each year through these sample surveys.

The monthly survey is taken in a scientifically selected cross-section of households in several hundred areas throughout the United States, according to Director Wilner.

The identity of those questioned is kept completely confidential and the facts collected are used only for statistical purposes.

The Census Bureau interviewer who will visit households here during the March Survey is Mrs. Rosemary McNeese of Amherst.
