Soybeans Respond To Fertilizer

Do soybeans respond to fertilizer??? A better question might Do some varieties or strains of soybeans respond to fertilizer better than others, and, if so, which one and to which fertilizers?"

Dr. Douglas Owen, Agronomist at the High Plains Research Foundation, is attempting to find some of the answers to these is attempting to questions. A preliminary study was started in 1967 to evaluate a total of forty varieties and experimental strains under both fertilized and non-fertilized conditions. Two identical test areas were planted, with each containing all varieties and strains. One area received no fertilizer, and the other received a total of 147 pounds of nitrogen and 96 pounds of phos-pate. The sources of fertilizer included a pre-plant appli-cation of 8-16-0 and a side-dress application of Ammonium Ni-

Slight increases in yield were obtained from most varieties and strains tested. However, two specific varieties did show better-than-average response, and several experimental strains showed definite promise. showed definite promise. Yields of up to 59 bushels per acre were very encouraging, and the test will definitely be continued. No recommendations can be made as yet. but complete results of the 1967 test will be printed in the Annual Research Report of the Founda tion.
