### Plant Disease Of The Week Crown Gall of Ornamentals

Crown gall disease occurs in all areas of Texas, but is of a problem in areas of limited rainfall. Many people discover the disease on dead shrubs or trees when replanting. Galls up to the size of walnuts or larger are present on roots or the stem at ground line. Affected plants lack vigor and may die during a perio of severals months or years. A die-back condition of limbs may be present before the trees or shrubs

ain species of bacterium. The disease occurs frequently on apple blackberry, camellia, catalpa, cottonwood, euonymous, gardenia. hibiscus, eigustrum, peach, poplar, rose and many others.

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
