Texas Democratic Primary Run - Off Election Saturday

Texas Democrats will go to the polls Saturday, June 2 to vote on four state-wide races and one district race in this Democratic Primary runoff election.

Keen interest is shown in this area in the race between Representative candidates for the 91st District, Bill Clayton of Springlake and B. M. Nelson, publisher from Dimmitt. Bill Millen, a conservative Democrat of Lubbock defeated in the Primary election by a margin of votes, told News personnel here that he has pledged his votes to Bill Clayton, who is also a conservative Democrat.

The state races have been a hotly contested campaign with all candidates touring the state, making campaign speeches to small and large audiences alike.

In the upcoming election voters will decide on the following: For Governor: Don Yarborough and John Connally.

For Lt. Governor: Preston Smith, Lubbock and James Turman, Gohber.

For Congressman-at-large: Judge Woodrow Bean of the El Paso District and Joe Pool, Dallas.

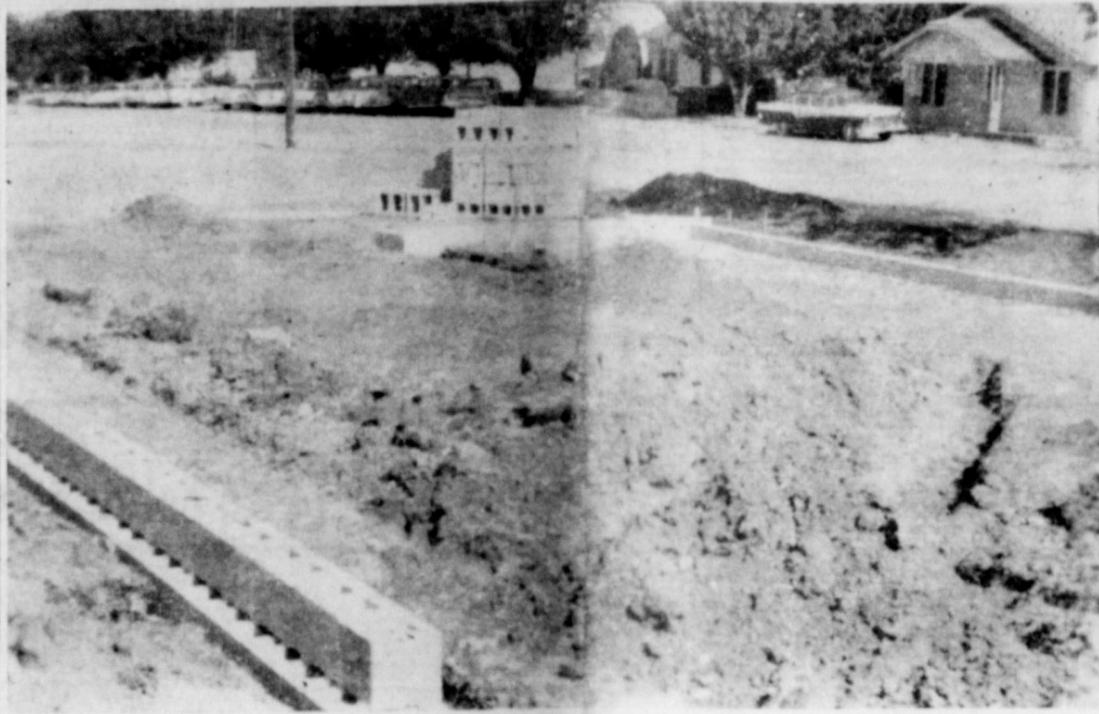
For Attorney General: Waggoner Carr, Lubbock and Tom Reavley, Austin.

The winners will face Republican candidates in the November general election.

The G. O. P. candidate for governor is Jack Cox; Bill Hayes for Lt. Governor; for Congressman-at-large, Don Barry and for Representative for the 91st District is Frank Ford of Hereford.

The Democratic polling place in Earth will be at the City Hall. Polls will open Saturday at 8 a. m. and close at 7 p. m.

Election judge will be O. B. Whitford.

It was chartered under state laws and will be inspected by the State Banking Association.

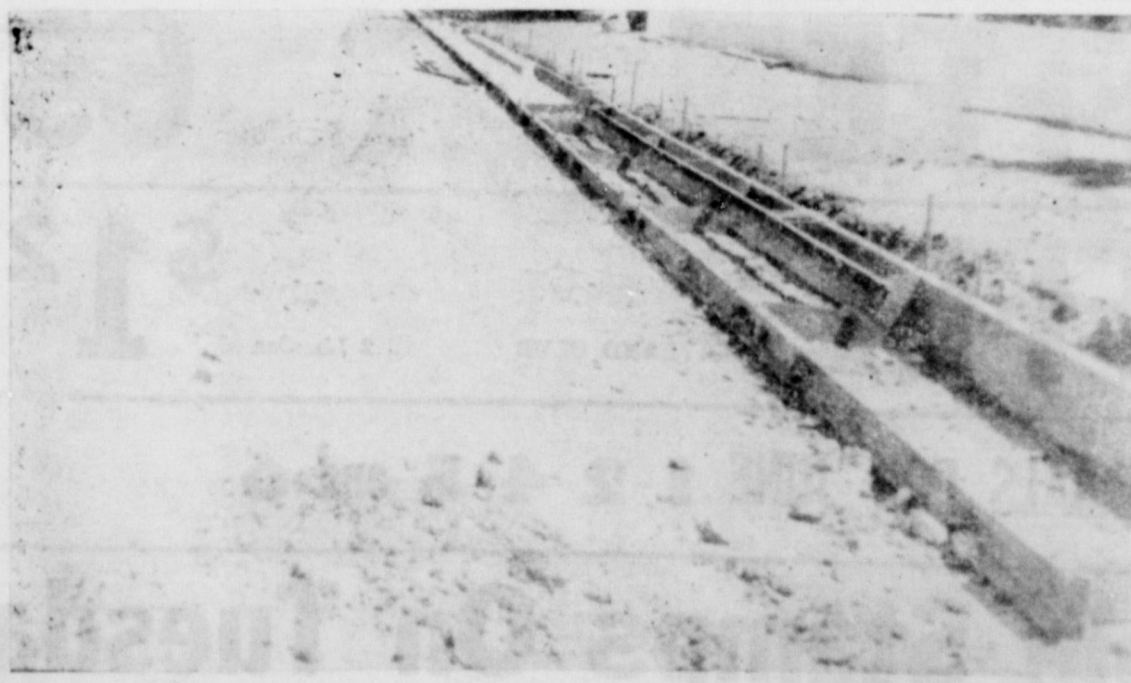

Proceeds of a Memorial Fund started recently totals over \$300. This will also be used for maintenance and supplies.

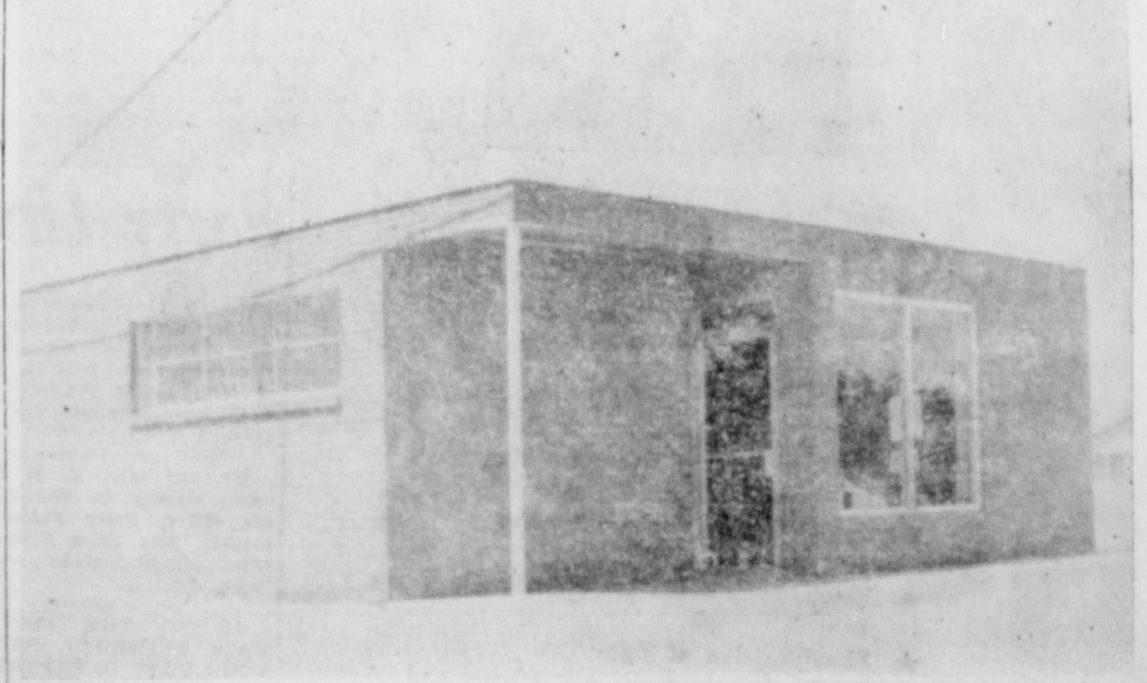
Mrs. Zou Wilson reports this has been a big project but it has finally come through.

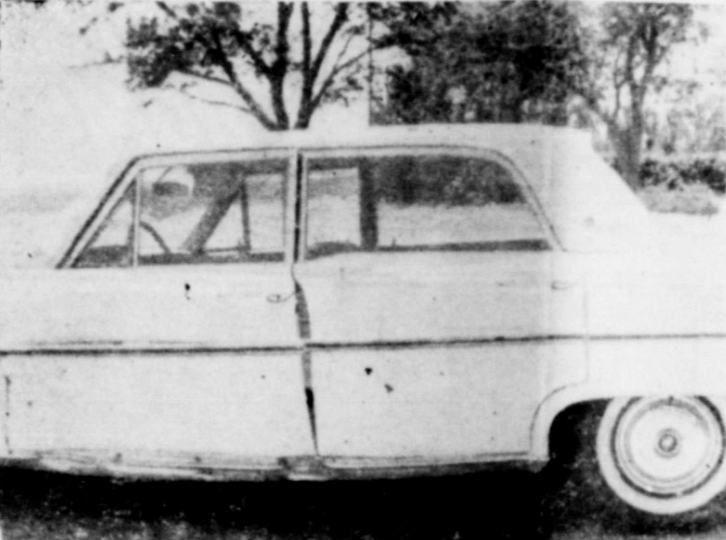
