Sugar Beet Interest Gains Momentum, Local Association Formed

Several area farmers and busi nessmen attended the sugar beet meeting held in the Springlake School Auditorium at 7:30 p.m.

Lee Bennefield, Hereford, President of the Texas Sugar Beet Growers Association spoke to the group on the benefits derived from growing sugar beets and what procedures were needed for area farmers to grow sugar beets.

Bennefield stated that sugar beet growing was very important to the community and Plains area. The beet tops are good for graz-ing cattle and the cattlemen will pay an average of \$20.00 per acre for grazing. The Beets will yield approximately 20 or 30 tons per acre. Beet sugar is as pure as cane sugar. Around 75 percent of our sugar comes .from outside the United States, and it will take two million acres of sugar beets to replace sugar that was transported from Cuba to the United States.

Sugar beets won't grow on dry-land as they need lots of water for growing and must be irrigated

It is estimated that the growbeets increases the value of land as much as \$100.00 per

Other speakers at the meeting were Austin Rose, Jr., Jack L. Kassahn and J. W. Witherspoon, all of Hereford.

A local Sugar Beet Association was organized at the meeting and board members elected.

A fee of \$10.00 dues per year will be charged for membership. The organ-ization will be called Earth-Springlake Sugar Beet Association.

The farmers in this area are very enthusiastic over this new crop and are hoping to interest all the businessmen, cattlemen and everyone else, in the importance of growing sugar beets in this area. Local farmers seems positive its becoming a major money making crop for the Plains if enough acreage can be obtained.



But, according to an article in the current issue of the magazine, this year's Christmas gifts probably will be paid for when bestow ed, curbing the credit practices of the immediate past.

Surveying the outlook for Christmas sales, the magazine found stores around the country reporting stable prices, good quality and ample supplies—and that people have money to spend. What is needed to bring the business in, the editors correlated in the property of the property of the state of the property of the prop the editors conclude, is a strong dose of promotion, and that is what the merchants have in mind.

As a result, the magazine predicts there will be a rush of pre-Christmas promotions — prices slashed, great buys in gifts—designed to break down shoppers caution which has been building up in recent months.

The best buys, according to the article, will be in appliances with prices down and values good. The stores will come up with other good buys, the editors note, but there won't be any bargains in sweaters, gloves, lingerie and other apparel items. Price levels are high on these and not likely to budge for the holiday buying

The magazine notes that the cloudy business weather of recent months will make people leery of running up their indebtedness, and nonpayments are on the increase, causing merchants to be reluctant to give credit too freely. The result of both reactions, the editors state, will be a lot of Christmas presents paid for in






