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Swine Producers To Meet

College Station -- The 19th Annual Swine Short Course is scheduled for April 6-7 at Texas A&M University, according to Dr. William B. Thomas, swine specialist with the Texas AgriculturalExtension Service. The meeting, to be conducted in the Memorial Student Center, brings together leaders in research, Extension, industry and production for talks on all phases of swine production.

In addition, the 1969-70 win-ners of the Litter Testing Pro-gram and the Master Pork Producers Award will be presente ed.

Programs will include information by several out-of-state speakers. Gerald Gehlbach, a Lincoln, Illinois pork producer will outline how he developed a successful confinement system. Dr. H. W. Dunne of Pen-nsylvania State University will discuss a swine health program for the 1970's. Several pork producers will serve on panels to discuss management pract-ices and sow confinement. Bob Fleming of the Texas Water Quality Board, Austin, will take on the pollution problems fac-ing the swine industry.

Potential for increasing num-bers of pigs at farrowing will be discussed by Dr. D. B. Hudman of the Wilson Agribusiness Com-pany of Oklahoma City. He was formerly Extension swine







Don't separate the three parts of the form. Take it to the county tax office or substation in one piece. Doh't send your application to

the Highway Department in Austin; and, remember, the deadline is passed for ordering license plates by mail from your tax office.

If you did not receive a threepart registration form by mail, or if you have lost it, take last year's motor vehicle registrat-ion receipt and your car title to the county tax collector's office or sub-station. Your vehicle registration will be processed as before, and you'll receive a time-saving computerized form
