AUSTIN, TEXAS

GREETINGS:

Today, more than ever before, the importance of our schools is being realized by an awakened Nation. A new perspective has been taken on by education, both in scientific and liberal arts fields.

As we rush to train scientists and place satellites in outer space, however, it is important to remember that our public schools will furnish our leaders of tomorrow with the basic human, moral and spiritual foundations necessary for more advanced training and knowledge.

In an effort to make Texas public schools the finest in the Nation, the citizens of our communities are urged to take an active interest in the school systems and to cooperate with the respective school boards, superintendents, principals and teachers.

For the past nine years Public Schools Week in Texas has been set aside as a special time each year to place increased emphasis of our educational system. Parent visitation is encouraged and each citizen is urged to recognize the tremendous importance of our public schools.

THEREFORE, I, as Governor of Texas, do hereby designate the week of March 2-6, 1959, as

Sanitation and Water Departments Inspected

An inspection of Earth Water Works and sewage disposal plant was held last by State Health Officer Hancock of Lubbock.

The Earth Sewage Disposal system was in the best condition of any he had inspected, not to have a full time employee for that purpose, Hancock said.

Hancock also stated, that a State approved Waters System sign could be had at the City Limits if the City had an automatic gas chlorinator installed.

Hancock pointed out that several things must be remedied before summer for fly and mosquito control, such as open garbage pits and barrels and other things within the City Limits.

Preliminary Engineering Completed On Springlake Telephone Exchange

All preliminary engineering has been completed toward the establishment of the new Springlake exchange, according to R. E. Saunders, district manager for General Telephone Company of the Southwest.

Subscribers in Springlake now are served as rural customers out of the Earth Exchange. Saunders said. With the establishment of the new exchange, Springlake and Earth subscribers will have Extended Area Service which will permit calls between the two points without a specific charge for each call.

Saunders explained the equipment will now be ordered from the manufacturer who will manufacture it especially for the Springlake exchange based on the engineering which is now completed. Other major steps to be accomplished before the establishment of the exchange, includes canvass of the area and engineering of outside plant facilities.

Completion date of the entire project will be during the first quarter of 1960, Saunders said. According to a commercial forecast, which is a projected estimate of the number of telephones which will be served at a future date, there will be over 140 telephones, not including extension telephones, served by the Springlake exchange at the end of 1960. There are now approximately 50 telephones in Springlake.

PAST PTA PRESIDENTS HONORED

Jarvis Angeley, president presided over the business meeting and appointed a nominating committee for the election of new officers.

Mrs. E. E. Watkins introduced the program.



Mrs. Marvin Sanders gave an inspirational talk on the Founder's Day of PTA and the five objects of the PTA since it was founded 62 years ago.

A brief history of the Springlake PTA was given by Mrs. Billy H. Hodge.

Highlighting the PTA meeting was a panel discussion on "Teenagers and Their Views." The panel was composed of Dick Evans, Mike Burgess, Eldon Davis, Sharon Hay, Verdena Curtis, Mrs. John Lawrence and moderator, Bud Irvine.

Irvine opened the discussion by pointing out the importance of the attention we as parents give our teenagers on their views and the interest we must give them, "though we as parents," Irvine said, "have complete control of the home and authority of them in our homes, but we must pay attention to our teenagers problems as they may be foolish and simple to us, but very important to them."

Irvine spoke of the two extremes in the interest of students and parents. One extreme, was to start a child to school with the idea of letting the teacher teach and not participate or show any interest in the child. The other extreme was making daily or weekly visits to school and blaming teachers with all the bad marks of the student.

The first question on the panel was, "how much interest should a parent take in their education?"

Verdena Curtis, gave her views first, by saying, "The parents should be interested, but a teenager is mature enough to work out their problems, with the teacher sometimes with out the parents' help."

When asked the question, Mike Burgess said, "He believed parents should show a lot of interest in the students grades and he wished he had been made to study more," he said, "now that college

was staring me in the face it scares me to death."

"Teachers and parents should know each other better, as this sometimes helps work out problems better that comes up" said Sharon Hay.

Dick Evans stated, "He believed students tried harder if he was encouraged by parents and interest was shown in his grades."

From a teachers standpoint, Mrs. Lawrence said, "It is very important to know each parent and the home which the child comes from, as a teacher wants the best out of every child. By working together more good can be done."

Eldon Davis, said, "If a parent comes often, the teacher knows the student and parent better."

Irvine said "he believed the teachers were interested in our children, but we all take pride in our

work and everyone wants recognition. Not only a student wants to be recognized by his teachers, but students want the parents to recognize their work, compliment them if they make good grades in school, or how much interest do they want

the parent to show in their work?"

A humorous answer was given by Sharon Hay, "I'm always glad to show my parents my good grade, so maybe they will let me go somewhere that night."

Dick Evans said, "I feel my parents are also proud when I make good grades and are proud to know if I have learned something when I tell them of the things we have studied and done."

The third question asked by Irvine was, "Is it necessary to go to college if a boy plans to farm or

a girl plans only to be a housewife?"

Mrs. Lawrence spoke first, saying, "She believed a high school graduate was just beginning on education when he entered college. A college education was necessary to compete well in the world now, also that no student should go to college unless he or she had the desire and ability to learn."

"Though a boy plans to farm, I believe a college education in an agriculture college is essential, as farming is unlimited and the service of agriculture is untouched and wide open. They should gain all the knowledge they can for future farming and their service duty also," said Eldon Davis.

"Yes, I believe a girl should

get some or all the college education she can," Verdena Curtis said. "She may be left a widow and have the need to work and support a family, then she has the background to do a better job."

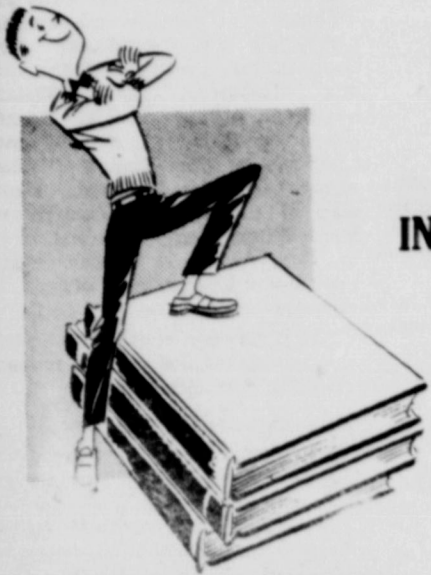
Mike Burgess said, "I believe by going to college you learn how to live with all people and learn different people from all parts of the country, thus having a better understanding of people."

Following the reading of this telegram from J. H. West, Bishop, Texas, president of the Texas Farm Bureau to Secretary of Agriculture Ezra T. Benson, concerning the recent announcement of the price support on grain sorghum. This telegram was released to the public Tuesday afternoon.

West to Benson:

Cut in price support to 75 percent of corn come as a shock to sorghum growers in Texas. Farmers are hurt, sorghum growers realize that milk must compete with corn and that adjustment have to be made when prices are out of line. However this cut in support prices in one year make adjustment difficult to producers and poses severe hardships on him. It also fails to take into account the past policies of the department. It will encourage the production of corn in uneconomical areas which is contrary to your philosophy, also it will reverse normal flow of corn from corn belt. I urge you to reconsider this action.

H. L. "Hub" King, District II director of the Texas Farm Bureau made this statement to the county leaders. "If Farm Bureau recommendations had been inacted into law this cut on Grain Sorghum price support would not have occurred. Farm Bureau recommended that the price support on all Feed Grains be tied to corn, taking into consideration the relative feeding value, normal price relationships & storability. However Congress added five other factors, these are apparently the ones used by the Secretary in lowering the price support on Grain Sorghums.

Texas Story

We've heard about a Texas cottonman who has stopped his friends from wearing synthetic shirts . . . when they show up wearing the synthetic he just presents them with a wash and wear cotton shirt, tells them to try it and then wear the better shirt . . . says there's no problem thereafter.

We Insist

Despite what we recently said, some farmers seem to think they can choose "B" plan and later get permission to switch to "A" if they get a poor stand or don't plant all their acreage . . . they are going to be disappointed . . . the law does give the Secretary of Agriculture permission to allow a switch to "A" . . . but you can be certain he isn't going to permit changes unless you have conditions that will melt the heart of a wooden Indian.

Veto

People who know say President Eisenhower will veto any bill to make direct payments to farmer . . . can the veto be overridden?? if Congressional leaders feel it can, there'll be quite a fight in the not too distant future.

Recovery in Certain Areas of the Machine Tool Industry

Average monthly new orders for machine tools for 1958 were only a little over \$23-million compared with \$43-million in 1957 and an average of over \$60-million for the five years 1952 through 1956. In fact, 1958 was the poorest year for the machine tool industry since 1949. The business recession was of course responsible in large part for this slump, but there were other factors involved. Productive capacity in many industries has reached a point where it may not be exceeded by consumer demands for at least two to three years. Therefore there has been a significant decline in the building of new plants and consequently the purchase of plant equipment which has not only hurt the machine tool industry but may slow up its recovery somewhat in the next couple of years. Offsetting this, however, is the demand for automation, labor-saving devices by which greater productivity may be accomplished with less manpower. Furthermore, the constant development of new products requires the need of new machines. For this reason it appears likely that the machine tool industry should recover to some degree.

As a result of the poor performance of the machine tool industry in 1958 many of the stocks of the companies have been depressed marketwise. Recognizing that there should be a substantial improvement in 1959 earnings, that most of these companies enjoy strong financial positions and that the statistical value offered in many of the stocks are relatively attractive in the present market, investment in some of these stocks appears desirable for any investor.

sified portfolio. Although the machine tool industry generally has been highly cyclical in nature, there are some companies which can qualify in the growth category by virtue of their participation in the expanding field of automation.
